





GOURMET MARKET

(NEW THIS YEAR!)

Located at the Place de la Cathédral, this gourmet food market is new in 2023. Master chefs will be on hand to create culinary masterpieces for the discerning visitor. From appetizers to desserts, there will be delicious dishes to match every palate.



INDOOR CRAFT MARKET

Adjacent to the old town market, the Koïfhus is a 15th-century building that hosts local craftsmen and women. Inside you will find items from master glaziers, cabinet makers, wood sculptors, jewelers, hat-makers and other traditionally-skilled artisans.





Let your kids sip their own warm beverage, ride the mechanical horses or drop a letter in the giant mailbox for Père Noël. Near the Petite Venice area, in the Place des Six Montagnes noires, this children's market has 43 cute cottages for shopping, plus a pretty nativity scene.



ALSATIAN VILLAGE MARKET

This market in the Place Jeanne d'Arc is surrounded by charming half-timbered buildings giving it an old-fashioned village atmosphere. Here you will find booths selling traditional local craft items and foods like foie gras, schnapps and bredalas de Noël (Christmas cookies).



TURCKHEIM

(15-minute drive)

This quaint village market is open daily from Nov. 24 to Dec. 30, 2023 (closed Dec. 25).

REOUEWIHR

(25-minute drive)

This extremely scenic, traditional Alsatian town hosts a market daily from Nov. 25 to Dec. 21, 2023.

RIBEAUVILLÉ

(30-minute drive)

A medieval-themed Christmas market takes over this picture-perfect village for two weekends, Dec. 2-3 and Dec. 9-10, 2023.

KAYSERSBERG-VIGNOBLE

(25-minute drive)

A local market and fir garlands line the main street of this town on the weekends from Nov. 24 to Dec. 19, 2023.

EOUISHEIM

(15-minute drive)

The market at the center of this circular medieval village is open from Nov. 24 to Dec. 30, 2023 (closed Dec. 24-26)

COLMAR

Apart from the Christmas markets, Colmar offers many activities and sights to enjoy.

Head to the MUSEE D'UNTERLINDEN to see modern art by Monet, Picasso and Renoir, plus incredible medieval paintings and statuary, including the famous Isenheim Altarpiece by German painter Mathias Grunewald.

Stroll along the canal at PETITE VENICE. This stunning neighborhood possesses delicious canal-side restaurants, quaint bridges and colorful half-timbered houses built on the edge of the Lauch River canal.

For high-end French cuisine, try ATELIER DU PEINTRE, an elegant French restaurant on Rue Schongauer. From foie gras to grilled scallops, your taste buds will not be disappointed!


Unique romantic atmosphere in the heart of the city

ights twinkling above the beloved holiday stands, the Tannenbaum (Christmas tree) adorned with red and gold ornaments, the aroma of roasted chestnuts filling the air and a cup of glühwein warming up your cold, almost numb hand — nothing puts us more in a holly, jolly mood than Germany's famous Christmas markets. The Mainz and Wiesbaden Christmas markets in particular know just how to transform the Scrooges into Buddy the Elf.

Mainz Christmas Market

Creating an atmosphere that can only be described as magical and festive, the Mainz Christmas market is set in the historical area of the city's 1,000-year-old St. Martin's Cathedral. 100 jovial and brightly-lit stands blanket the city and provide opportunities to do some last-minute Christmas shopping or to even buy souvenirs for loved ones back home.

Considered to be the traditional cultural event, the Staatstheater Mainz will also be performing a Christmas spectacle that even Santa will be proud of!

In front of the printing shop of the Gutenberg Museum, the Mainzer Weihnachstdorf, or Christmas village, provides an option for a large group to gather in a Christmas barrel and hut surrounded by a festive campfire. Be sure to reserve early as there is a high demand.

To see more Christmas festivities sprinkled in Mainz, head to the Schillerplatz and Neubrunnenplatz to enjoy Christmas décor, lights and an overall joyous spirit.


Things to see outside the market

Aside from the famous cathedral where the market takes place, Mainz is also home to the Gutenberg Museum which commemorates Johannes Gutenberg, the inventor of the printing press. While at the museum, go to the printing shop where visitors can print their individual Christmas cards.

Know before you go...

- Open Nov. 30–Dec. 23: Sun.– Thurs. 11 a.m.–8.30 p.m. and Fri. and Sat. 11 a.m.– 9 p.m.
- Public transportation is best, especially if you have plans to eat, drink and be merry...with glühwein. The Christmas market can be reached by almost all of the bus lines of the Mainz public transport company (Mainzer Mobilität).
- As a gift, the city offers parking hours and you can receive a parking voucher at several shops in the city center, depending on your purchases at these shops.

Wiespaden Christmas Market

Haven't had your fill of welcoming this joyous season? The Wiesbaden Christmas market, just 22 minutes away from Mainz, lets you spread Christmas cheer even more! Known as The Twinkling Star Christmas Market, or Sternschnuppenmarkt, Wiesbaden knows how to make the Yuletide gay and get us excited for that special day in December. The market, which opens on Nov. 28, is located on the Schlossplatz between the Rathaus and the Stadtschloss. This market is so highly rated that it was voted "No. 1" in recent years. With colorfully lit stages, Christmas décor that looks like Santa's elves have done the job and friendly vendors, it's not hard to see why. Don't forget to marvel at their unique display of over 70 10-meterhigh lit blue and golden lilies coming to life above the Schlossplatz!

The colorful Christmas lights should be admired from up above as well, so head to the platform of the Market Church to see festive lights and holiday displays. From there, you can even see Frankfurt's skyline!

The Wiesbaden Ferris wheel also provides its guests with a fantastic view of the illuminated and jolly market.

Head on over to Luisenplatz with the kids and explore the Twinkling Star Children's Market where everyone can ice skate.

Things to see outside the market

The capital of Hesse offers fun activities other than its beautiful Christmas markets, so explore Wiesbaden's main spa building known as the Kurhaus. This neoclassical building has many art nouveau touches which can be seen in the glass dome.

A Russian Orthodox church is a rare sighting in Germany, but the golden onion domes of St. Elizabeth's Church on Neroberg hill are worth a visit. Inside the church, you can view the elaborate Grand Duchess Elizabeth Mikhalovna's tomb.

If your children enjoy the zoo, treat them to the Tier und Pflanzenpark Fasanerie. The hunt-






Leather items: Italy

Evil Eyes: Greece & Turkey



A RENAISSANCE TRADITION: The Augsburg Christkindlesmarkt

ugsburg is one of Germany's oldest cities, with a Christmas market which dates back to the 15th century when gingerbread makers held a market shortly before Christmas. Since 1949, it has been known as the "Christkindlesmarkt." Along with being one of the oldest Christmas markets, this market has also been called, "Germany's most beautiful Christmas market." This gorgeous market has plenty for you to do as you are visiting markets across Bavaria.

THE ANGEL PERFORMANCE AND OTHER ENTERTAINMENT

Since 1977, angels have graced the market with their performances. Twenty-four angels gather at City Hall and create a living Advent calendar. Inspired by a Hans Holbein painting, small girls from the town are selected for the task of performing as angels every Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Other entertainment at the market includes folk singers, opera singing, a manger scene, the boys' choir and Christmas songs.

NOV. 27 - DEC. 24, 2023

There are a variety of P+R areas and parking garages in the area; however, these fill up very quickly on Advent weekends. The city of Augsburg highly recommends that you utilize public transportation for ease.

AUGSBURG FAIRYTALE ROUTE

Children can pick up entry cards for a puzzle game at the Tourist Information Office so they can win prizes for items they find on this route. Window displays along the route show how different animals celebrate the holidays and spend the winter: the bears gather their Christmas tree, the ducks try ice skating, etc.

OTHER SITES IN AUGSBURG

Music lovers and history buffs alike will appreciate the Leopold Mozart House. Father of the famous Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Leopold Mozart's house museum contains letters and artifacts that reveal the fascinating story of Leopold, who was an accomplished musician, composer and music manager in his own right.

Adults and children will love the Augsburger Puppenkiste, the puppet theater. Before or after the show, you can tour the on-site museum, which houses famous puppets such as "The cat with the hat" and "Luke the engine driver." The museum also offers guided English tours so you can fully immerse yourself in the experience.

It is not a day in a German city if you do not find yourself at one of Germany's many castles and palaces. Augsburg's Schaezler Palace is a must-see for architecture and art enthusiasts. Completed in 1770, this gorgeous palace is not only an architectural masterpiece but also contains multiple collections of paintings and the Rococo garden of the palace.



While many holiday markets dwindle after Christmas, outside traditional Germanic regions they can last longer. Here are some European markets worth visiting after the winter holidays and into the New Year.

TALLINN, ESTONIADEC. 1, 2023 - JAN. 7, 2024

Wandering the snowy medieval streets of the old walled Vanalinn district of Tallinn is a magical step back in time. Add a quaint Christmas market, and you have the recipe for a memory-making holiday. The market is held in the scenic Town Hall Square where a massive Christmas tree is on display. Plentiful food and drink vendors sell local dishes and a variety of glöggs, or Nordic mulled wine.

The feel of the Tallinn market is locally focused. Handiworks are for sale, and a special house of crafts is set up where visitors can learn creative techniques from local artisans. On the weekend, afternoons and evenings are filled with folk groups performing on the cultural stage. Food and beverages stalls continue sales two hours past merchant stalls closing. DOLOMITE REGION, ITALY NOV. 24, 2023 - JAN. 6, 2024

Christmas in Italy is traditionally celebrated until Epiphany on January 6, and in the mountains of Tirol that means Christmas markets are often open into the New Year. You will find some of the most magical mountain villages in the snowy Dolomite region. Start in the valley city of Bolzano (Bozen) whose market is situated in the central Piazza Walther. The 80 colorful stalls make up the oldest and largest Christmas market in Italy.

Take a drive high into the mountain villages where picturesque local Christmas markets sparkle below magnificent peaks. In Bressanone (Brixon) the market is shadowed by a beautiful cathedral and the nativity scene display is an 800-year-old tradition. The tiny ski towns of Val Gardena and Ortisei host cute markets perfect for an evening après ski. In Brunico (Bruneck) you can wander a few Christmas markets through the old town lanes below the castle. Visit www.dolomiti. it/en for travel information in the Dolomite region.





EDINBURGH, SCOTLAND NOV. 17, 2023 - JAN. 6, 2024

For something off the charts, book tickets for the wild and crazy New Year's Eve celebration that is Hogmanay in Edinburgh, Scotland. Or visit the calmer, free, and family-friendly Sprogmanay events on New Year's Day. After that, the Christmas season continues for another week at the sprawling markets.

The markets are located below Edinburgh's famous castle along the Princes Street Gardens and its adjacent roads in the heart of the historic old town. In addition to shopping at the numerous stalls, eating delicious street food and imbibing a warm beverage, there are other fun activities like an ice-skating rink, a Christmas tree maze and rides. PRAGUE, CZECHIADEC. 3, 2023 - JAN. 6, 2024

Surround yourself with beauty and history in Prague, where many markets dot the city. Three of these Christmas markets stay open after the new year. The largest market is hosted in Old Town Square where numerous stalls are nestled between the oldest working astronomical clock in the world and a turreted 14th-century gothic church. A second large market occupies Wenceslas Square where a statue of St. Wenceslas, who is buried in Prague, watches over a large selection of stalls selling food, drinks and local crafts.

To truly get the historical atmosphere, trek over the river and up the hill to Prague Castle where the Christmas market features 70 selected vendors offering holiday gifts and local Czech food. Be sure to wander out the southern gate for a magnificent view of the city.


• LEMON ZEST (Optional)

(or a non-alcoholic substitute such as Lyre's White Cane spirit)


- 3.4 OUNCE BOX OF INSTANT PUDDING

How to make it:



Add the frozen berries and mix carefully.

Add the instant pudding, cinnamon powder and vanilla plant milk, and whisk the mixture until everything is well blended and smooth.



Shut off the heat and allow the mixture to sit until the berries are defrosted.



Heat the mixture at medium-high for five minutes.



Serve warm or chilled.
