FAMOUS FORESTS

Walking in the forest is a great way to stay healthy. Spending time in the trees helps you fight off sickness. Plus, being out in nature can calm you down when you are stressed. So, take a walk in the woods near your house, or visit one of these three famously wacky woods.

CROOKED FOREST

The grove of 400 pine trees that grow near the town of Gryfino, Poland all have one thing in common: they are crooked. Each tree bends sharply north at the base and grows along the ground before straightening up and reaching for the sky. It's a mystery why this happens since the trees beyond the grove grow normally.

GESPENSTERWALD FOREST Germany

This forest grows right along the Baltic Sea, above a beach in the northern German town of Nienhagen. The salty sea air and wind have caused the tops of the trees to grow in a funny, twisted way. Plus, they are slanting away from the beach, so it looks as if the wind is always blowing.





SHERWOOD FOREST England

No one can really say who Robin Hood was, but his story has been based in this ancient forest for over 600 years. You can visit this famous forest and hike along the Giants Trail where you can see some of biggest ancient oak trees in Europe, including a massive one called Major Oak.

Not only is it good for us to take a walk in the woods, but forests also help keep our planet healthy. Here are three big reasons forests are so important.

AIR



Forests are sometimes called the lungs of the Earth. All those trees and plants convert carbon dioxide into the oxygen we breathe.

Plus, forests help to filter out pollution and keep the earth at a comfy cool temperature.

WATER



Believe it or not, forests help create drinking water! All the dark, healthy soil cleans the rainwater as it trickles down into the earth or flows into rivers and lakes.

Trees also release water into the atmosphere through their leaves, helping to create rain clouds.

BIODIVERSITY



Forests contain more different species of plants and animals than any other ecosystem on earth. This is called "biodiversity." All those differences mean that resources like food and habitats are balanced out. Humans are part of that balance, too.



There are so many animals and plants that live in the forest. From tree-climbing squirrels to soft, squishy moss, forests are the most diverse habitat in the world.

You can decorate the carton to display your treasures.




Paper Roll Bouquet


Egg Carton Collector

Are you more interested in small bits like nuts, seeds, rocks and shells? An egg carton is a great way to collect items.


Decorate a paper roll and carry it in the woods to create a bouquet of leaves, pine needles and cool sticks. When you get home, trim the stems to help it stand up.

Here are some back to school traditions from all over Europe!



BULGARIA

Games, Flowers and Singing: The first day is filled with poems, silly games, speeches, dancing and singing. Students also give their teachers flowers.



FRANCE

La Rentrée: The first day of school is known as "La Rentrée" (la ron-tree). Leading up to the first day, you will see signs in windows and people will ask students about their excitement for the new school year.



GERMANY

The Schultüte: On their very first day of first grade, each student gets a cone called a "Schultüte" (shoo-l-toot-ah). Pens, pencils, toys, crayons and candy fill the cone. This is a tradition that goes all the way back to the 1800s!



The Bakfiets: Dutch students celebrate by riding to school in a "bakfiets" (bahk-feets), a cargo bike. Their parents can peddle them to school.



A Grembiule: Students wear their "grembiule" (grem-bew-lah) on the first day. The grembiule resembles a smock or apron. Students put on a special ribbon to show what grade they are in.



SWITZERLAND


Leuchtweste or Lüchzgi: On the first day of school, students receive a special yellow vest, "Leuchtweste" (Loy-shh-t-vest-ah) or a triangle, Lüchzgi (loo-shh-tee). These items are for their trips to and from school. This helps drivers keep an extra special eye out for students.



UKRAINE








ARE SUPER COOL





TASTY WAYS TO

TOP YOUR APPLE

iving an apple to a teacher is well known to students. With this craft, you get to keep the apple AND eat a yummy treat. This apple craft is all about what YOU want. Younger kids will need an adult to help them.

You will need

- ☐ apples (see how many below)
- □ toppings*
- ☐ syrups and/or melted peanut butter
- ☐ wooden skewers or popsicle sticks
- ☐ parchment paper or cupcake wrappers (for apples to rest on)
- bowls for toppings

For candy apples (makes six)

- ☐ 1/2 cup light corn syrup
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- ☐ 16 drops red food coloring, if desired
- □ 3/4 cup water
- $\hfill \square$ candy thermometer

For caramel apples (makes 8–10)

- lacksquare 22 oz. caramels, unwrapped
- ☐ 4 tablespoons heavy cream
- ☐ A pinch of salt, if desired

For chocolate-dipped apples (makes 10)

☐ 2 pounds semi-sweet chocolate, chopped

*Topping Ideas: Crushed nuts, candies, cookies, breakfast cereal, graham crackers, Pop-Tarts or pretzels. Or, try sprinkles, marshmallows, heath bits, granola, coconut flakes, toffee pieces, popcorn, gummy bears, cinnamon, pumpkin spice and whatever else you can think of.

Step One: Choose Your Apple

Choose from tart Granny Smith (my pick), tangy McIntosh, sweet Red Delicious or the crisp Gala. Ask an adult to help you put your skewer or popsicle stick into your apple.

Step Two: Melt the Dip for the Apple of Your Choice

.....

Coatings can be very hot, so have an adult help you melt your dip safely!

For candy apples

Boil sugar, water, corn syrup and red food coloring in a pot over medium-high heat until the temperature of a candy thermometer reaches 300–310 degrees Fahrenheit (about 15–20 minutes). Remove from heat.

For caramel apples

Put caramel candies, heavy cream and salt in a microwave-safe bowl and microwave the mix for a few minutes, stopping and stirring every 30 seconds until smooth.

For chocolate-dipped apples

Place semi-sweet chocolate into a metal or glass bowl and set over a pot of lightly simmering water. Stir until the chocolate is melted and remove from heat.

Step Three: Dip and Roll

Choose your topping. Next, dunk your apple into your dip and then roll your apple into your favorite topping.

Step Four: Let Your Apple Cool

Set your apples on cupcake wrappers or parchment paper and let them cool for 15–20 minutes at room temperature (caramel apples should be placed into the fridge).

----- OPTIONAL -----

Drizzle with your favorite syrup Once your coating has set, drizzle your apple with melted chocolate, caramel, white chocolate, Nutella® or peanut butter.

Step Five: ENJOY YOUR APPLES!






You will need: Two sheets of construction paper, a pair of scissors, glue or a stapler and a small rock.

Cut **four big strips** about a finger wide, along the length of a piece of construction paper, and cut **four small strips** across the width of a piece of construction paper.




Glue, or staple, each set of strips together into **two star shapes,** one big and one small.



Glue, or staple, the tips of each star together to **form two balls.** The big one is your cat's body, and the small one is its head.

Try wavy lines and different colors, or add eyes, whiskers and paws!





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
