

ou can find the area on a map, but you might not know which countries belong to Scandinavia.

Norway, Sweden and Denmark form this region, but what do you really know about Scandinavia? Yes, there are the Vikings, pickled herring and the Northern Lights. There are also whales, beautiful scenery, unique museums and fabulous outdoor activities. Here's what makes Scandinavia so much more.

DENMARK —

"The Little Mermaid" and "The Emperor's New Clothes" are familiar stories from our childhood. Hans Christian Andersen, one of the country's most famous authors, lived and worked in its capital, Copenhagen. Today, one of the best ways to get a glimpse of the author's life and a view of Copenhagen is to book a Hans Christian Andersen Walking Tour. A guaranteed stop on the tour is Denmark's most photographed attraction, The Little Mermaid.

Looking for a little amusement? Perhaps, the most famous of Denmark's parks is Tivoli Gardens. This fairy-tale-like park's summer hours are from April through September. Over the years, it has been maintained and improved, and its seasonal themes and decorations are breathtaking to see. The small park has some wonderful and modern rides and roller coasters, as well.

Copenhagen can also boast about its shopping and dining experiences. The Strøget, located in the historic district, is Europe's longest pedestrian-only shopping zone. While you can dine at any number of fine restaurants, why not dine at a place that you know will be a culinary experience? Try Noma, one of the top-ranked restaurants in the world.

For an adventure outside of the capital city, take the train along the Danish coast from Copenhagen to Helsingør. Not only is the town quaint and vibrant, but its nearby castle, Kronborg, is also a wonder to see. From the castle, Sweden is only four miles across the sea, and served as a military fort. It was also the setting of William Shakespeare's "Hamlet."

NORWAY -

A visit to Norway's capital, Oslo, can provide an abundance of unique sightseeing opportunities. Plan to see the Kon-Tiki Museum, which follows Thor Heyerdahl's crossing of the Pacific Ocean in 1947 by using rafts made of balsa wood. Continuing on a boat theme, Oslo's Viking Ship Museum contains the best-preserved wooden Viking ships from the 9th century.

The most visited tourist attraction in all of Norway is the Holmenkollen National Ski Arena. The arena hosts various World Cup Nordic skiing events each year, but what is an incredibly impressive sight is the ski jump. Visiting in September or October? Adrenaline enthusiasts will want to schedule time to take the zipline from the start gate to the finish. It is an exhilarating and thrilling ride.

To know Norway is to get out and explore the countryside, and there is no better way to do it than to book a train ticket on the Bergen line. The seven-hour journey links Norway's two main cities. The train climbs Europe's highest mountainous plateau at 1,222 meters above sea level. While on this journey, take a side trip

on the Flåm Railway where you will climb steep mountainsides and view incredible waterfalls and ravines. There are several tour companies with packages that include a journey on the railway from Oslo to Flåm, a fjord cruise and transportation to Norway's second-biggest city, Bergen. While there, spend a couple of days exploring the quaint port city before taking the train back to Oslo.

Head north for an unparalleled experience above the Arctic Circle. Lofoten is a cluster of mountainous islands 100 kilometers off northern Norway's coastline. In late fall through early spring, it is one of the best places in Scandinavia to view the Northern Lights. Most people, however, go to the islands for whale watching. From October through mid-January, head out on a tour boat and search for killer whales, sea eagles and seals.

SWEDEN -


Sweden is the largest of the Scandinavian countries. Its capital, Stockholm, consists of 14 islands and more than 50 bridges and is frequently hailed as being the most beautiful capital in the world. The oldest and most visited of its neighborhoods is the Old Town, Gamla Stan. It was the original Stockholm and today, this medieval neighborhood boasts cobblestone streets, trendy shops, and beautifully maintained 17th-century buildings. A stop in

Gamla Stan must include a visit to the Royal Palace. It is one of the largest in Europe with more than 600 rooms and several museums, which are open to the public.

The Djurgården neighborhood is not only Stockholm's summer recreation area, but it is also the location for some of Stockholm's most unique attractions. In 1628, the warship Vasa sank within a few minutes of its maiden voyage. In 1961, it was salvaged and reassembled. Today, a museum encases the original warship.

If you are a lover of ABBA, then you cannot miss the ABBA Museum. It has been designed to let you experience what it is really like to be part of the late 1970s rock group. Or perhaps a literary tour is more your style? Make a stop at the Stockholm City Museum and register for the Stieg Larsson Millennium Tour. Based on the books from the creator of "The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo," the walking tour allows you to follow in the footsteps of Mikael Blomkvist and Lisbeth Salander.

Gothenburg, Sweden's second-largest city, claims that it is the gourmet seafood capital of the country. With several Michelin-starred restaurants, it is easy to support that claim. The food scene is vibrant here. Visit the Feskekörka, or Fish Church, a fabulous indoor seafood market housed in a structure that looks like a Gothic church. Be sure to take a lobster safari! The west coast islands are located only a short boat ride away, and many hotels offer packages including boat trips to catch your own lobster.

Top 5 Countries to Visit



While stationed in Europe, you should certainly take advantage of traveling the continent, visiting various countries and learning about their cultures and history. While Europe has so much to offer, have you considered using this opportunity as a springboard to get to other fabulous countries on different continents? Here are five countries with a vast amount of culture, history and experiences to be had that are located outside of Europe.

United Arab Emirates

The city of Dubai boasts more "World's Largest" titles than most. Here you'll find the world's largest indoor snow park, Ski Dubai. Located in the Mall of the Emirates, you can ski, snowboard, toboggan, zip line and see penguins in this eternal winter. For free entertainment, head to The Dubai Fountain. The world's largest choreographed fountain system is located on the man-made Burj Kjalifa Lake in downtown Dubai. With 6,600 lights, 50 colored projectors and water shooting up to 500 feet, it is truly spectacular.

Not far from Dubai is another bustling city, Abu Dhabi. Here you'll find the Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque, a masterpiece of Islamic architecture that personifies the Islamic message of peace, tolerance and diversity. A variety of post-modern architectural designs were used to create this religious building between 1996-2007. It covers over 30 acres and holds a whopping 40,000 worshippers!












Thailand

To take in some Thai culture, visit Pattaya, home of the Sanctuary of Truth at Rachvate Cape. This religious building is over 22,765 square feet and doesn't have a single nail to hold it in place! The front faces the sea as a welcome to visitors and a four-faced Brahma sits peacefully on the gable. Inside boasts various religious sculptures from traditional Buddhist and Hindu motifs. The sanctuary was designed to reflect the ancient vision of earth, knowledge and Eastern philosophy.

Vietnam


This Asian country has a little bit of everything, from staggering natural beauty to crowded cities. To experience a hyperactive pace, visit lively Hanoi, one of the world's most ancient capitals. The Old and French Quarters are two of the main neighborhoods where you'll find lots of cheap local beer and fantastic street food. For a true taste of Vietnamese culture, go to the Thang Long Water Puppet Theater, which dates back to the 11th century. Another great activity to attend is the Hanoi Weekend Night Market, which is bursting with things to see and endless food vendors with items like "bun thang," "pho" and "bun cha".

If the big city isn't for you, consider visiting Mỹ Sơn. Built by the kings of Champa between the fourth and 13th century AD, this area is a cluster of abandoned Hindu temple ruins dedicated to worshipping Shiva. Once a burial place for Cham royalty and national heroes with over 70 temples, it is now a UNESCO world heritage site.



Indonesia is home to the Borobudur Buddhist Temple, the largest Buddhist temple in the world. This magnificent ninth century temple was built during the reign of Sailendra Dynasty and combines elements of Indonesian indigenous cult worship and the Buddhist concept of Nirvana. With a mere nine stacked platforms, 2,672 relief panels and 504 Buddha statues, it's nothing short of a stone monstrosity.

For an outdoor adventure, head to Mount Bromo, an active volcano that is part of Tengger Semeru National Park. It stands at 7,641 feet and you can often see plumes of smoke puff from the top. The volcano sits in the middle of a plain called the "Sea of Sand," which is a protected nature reserve. This area has rolling plateaus with valleys, scenic lakes and numerous marked trails to wander through.



Morocco

An easy country to visit outside of Europe is Morocco, particularly the city of Fez, which is potentially home to the largest car-free urban area in the world. Fes el Bali is the world's largest surviving medieval city and a UNESCO World Heritage Site. It is comprised of thousands of narrow alleyways, shops, stalls, mosques and schools, which make the area moderately difficult to navigate. It's worth the challenge though, because here you'll find the world's oldest university, University of Al-Karaouine. To take the guesswork out of your visit to the medina, look into hiring a local guide.

To get away from the city, book a private glamping (glamourous camping) trip with Sahara Luxury Camps (www.saharaluxurycamps. com). They'll pick you up anywhere in Morocco and bring you to a luxury or royal camp in the desert. Here you'll be pampered with all the comforts of a luxury hotel and get to experience the Sahara Desert on camelback and have the opportunity to go sandboarding. This is truly a once-in-a-lifetime adventure, as you'll see spectacular sunrises and sunsets, sleep under the sparkling stars that seem to be scattered to the edge of the universe and marvel at the beauty the desert has to offer.

EUROPE'S MOST

BEAUTIFUL Nature Parks

/ hen the hustle and bustle of city life becomes too overbearing and the wilderness starts calling, Europe is rife with options for outdoor adventures. Pick a country and plan to spend some time outside hiking, biking, horseback riding or even canoeing. The options are endless when you discover these nature parks in Europe!



Oulanka National Park, Finland

The Kitka River rushes throughout this park and is surrounded by a rugged, yet beautiful, landscape. Here you'll find hiking trails galore, hanging bridges, waterfalls and wild rapids. If overnight camping is in the cards for you, look for the wilderness huts where you can make camp. They were once reindeer herder cabins! The Karhunkierros Hiking Trail, which is just over 50 miles long, is the most popular trail in Finland. Along it you'll find rapids of the Kitka River, pine forests and water meadows. If you want to complete the entire trail, plan for four to seven days.



park is home to Monte Perdido, the third highest Pyrenees mountain peak. Of the four deep canyons here, the most famous is Ordesa. Hikers will find four main routes that will take them through the canyon. On either side, cliffs rise over 2,500 feet, while the end showcases Mount Perdido. Head out on your own or opt for a guided tour while you explore this area.

Plitvice Lakes National Park, Croatia

This park is the oldest and largest national park in Croatia. Though the 16 terraced lakes are certainly what draws the crowd, they only cover about 1% of the park itself. Don't miss hiking around both the upper and lower lakes on one of seven routes. You'll find the rushing Veliki Slap Waterfall, at 255 feet high, near the lower lakes. The rest of the park is covered in forest vegetation. The northern region is home to numerous valleys where you can visit a wild deer ranch or go horseback riding.



Rago National Park, Norway

Since 1971, this park has been welcoming visitors to take in the views of thundering waterfalls, peaceful lakes and countless rugged mountain tops. Though this park isn't particularly well known for wildlife, you can enjoy the harshness of the land itself and will occasionally see moose or reindeer. Hike to either Storskogvatnet or Litlverivatnet Lake or take a stroll by the Rago River. For some stunning waterfalls, wander through the Storskogdalen Valley and keep an eye out for furry beavers!


Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park, Scotland

Though you may not find the famous Loch Ness Monster here, you shouldn't rule out this park as a potential place to visit for some fantastic Scottish landscapes. Here you'll find a massive body of water surrounded by rolling bluffs. Climb any of the "wee hills" for a spectacular view of the area. Take a boat to Inchcailloch, a small island in Loch Lomond, and look for wildlife and enjoy views over the loch. Maybe you'll spot a fallow deer! Throughout the rest of the park, keep your eyes peeled as you may witness an otter hunting along the shores or an osprey fishing



Babbling brooks, alpine lakes and vast valleys are just a few of the things you'll find in this park. Add in some diverse flora and fauna and you're in for a treat! This is the only national park in Slovenia and it is located in the eastern Julian Alps. The park is named after its highest mountain, Triglav, which looms at 9,396 feet. While you're there, don't miss the Kozjak Waterfall or the Tolmin Gorges, which are located at the lowest point in the park and connected to the Tolminka River. Hike through the gorges and to Dante's caves for a two hour outing. Pick a lake and go for a swim, or if you're feeling adventurous, go canyoning in upper or lower Predelica. For even more of an adrenaline rush, go kayaking, canoeing or rafting in the Soca River.

Whether you're after a leisurely horseback ride or a rigid hike, there is something for everyone regardless of which country you pick. No matter where you decide to go, get outside and moving in Europe's beautiful nature parks! ■

Colorful FLOWER OF ESTIWALS of Europe

The reward for having endured the short, gray chilly days that characterize winter throughout much of Europe is a gift from nature: a riot of blooming beauty, as natural landscapes, planted fields and meticulously groomed parks put on their springtime attire. As various types of trees, plants and flowers reach the peak of their beauty. Festivals celebrating the promise of spring fulfilled are quick to follow. Here are just some of the many events in which the glory of flowers combined with human ingenuity take center stage.

Tulpenfest (Tulip Festival)

MORGES, SWITZERLAND | MARCH 20 - MAY 10

Say the word "tulip" and the first country that comes to mind will be Holland, but that's not the only European land to fete this once-revered flower. On the shores of Lake Geneva, the pretty Parc de l'Indépendance beguiles visitors with the sight of row upon row of tulips gently waving in the breeze. Across the wide expanse of deep blue lake, the snow-capped peaks of the Alps appear, adding more drama to the scene. Some 380 varieties of bulbs are planted on site. On the weekends, various programs from ceramic markets to Alphorn concerts to folk dancing are laid on. Entry to the festival is free.

Bloemencorso (Flower Parade)

NOORDWIJK TO HAARLEM, NETHERLANDS | APRIL 25

One of Netherland's top attractions is Keukenhof, which counts among the biggest flower gardens in the world. Although tulips are the main attraction here, there's no end of other blossoming beauties to admire over the seven short weeks the park remains open. A highlight during the park's all-too-short season is the annual Flower Parade, in which 20 brilliantly decorated floats and 30 decked-out vehicles slowly make their way along a 25-mile route stretching from the beaches of Noordwijk to the charming city of Haarlem. The flower-bedecked floats depict fantastical creatures and typically Dutch images. The parade route passes right by Keukenhof, although you may be better off staking out a spot away from there, as the parade attracts hundreds of thousands of spectators. A second chance to check out the floats comes the following day, when they're put on display in Haarlem.

Fiesta de los Patios (The Courtyards Festival of Córdoba)

CÓRDOBA, SPAIN | MAY 4 - 17

Due to Córdoba's hot and arid climate, homes in the area are often built around a central patio with plants and water features. This building tradition started by the Romans and carried on by the Moors makes for not only a clever cooling system but a stunning backdrop for an annual competition. Each May, the heavy doors and iron gates of the city's houses are thrown open to reveal the wonders within. The scent of jasmine and orange



A mix of private and municipal properties compete to have their patio declared the most beautiful. Concerts and flamenco dancing feature on the evening program of entertainment. Entry to the patios is free, although many residences set out a box for donations.

Temps de Flors (Flower Time)

GIRONA, SPAIN | MAY 9 - 17

Flower Time in this gorgeous medieval city in Catalonia is a highlight on its annual calendar of events. The walled city's stone walls, cathedrals and other centuries-old edifices serve as the backdrop to gorgeous floral displays. While the Barri Vell (Old Town) setting is wonderfully aged, much of the arrangements seen here in fact reflect contemporary styles. In addition to taking in the sight of gorgeous blooms, live entertainment in the form of concerts and shows is laid on, clever installations light up the night and restaurants offer special menus incorporating flowers into their meals.

Infiorata Di Noto (Floral Carpet of Noto)

NOTO, SICILY | MAY 15 - 17

Noto, named a UNESCO World Heritage site for its exquisite Baroque architecture, is the backdrop against which an ephemeral floral carpet comes into being. For three days in May, the elegant Via Nicolaci takes on the role of a living canvas. Local and international artists set down floral petals and other natural materials to create an image corresponding to a theme which changes each year. Once their work is complete, visitors can walk along both sides of the street, taking in the kaleidoscope of colors. Parades and shows add to the festive atmosphere. On the last day of the festival, a Monday, the children of the city are set loose to tear through the carpet, symbolic of the divine plan of destruction and renewal. Other cities with a thriving Infiorata tradition include Genzano di Roma, Ovierto and Spello.

Narzissenfest (Daffodil Festival)

AUSSEERLAND - SALZKAMMERGUT, AUSTRIA | MAY 21 - 24

This lesser-known region in the heart of Austria is characterized by pristine nature, crystal-clear waters and bizarre rock formations-a stunning backdrop for wild narcissi in shades of yellow, white and green, stretching as far as the eye can see. These fragrant flowers bloom between mid-May and mid-June, depending on their altitude. Austria's biggest flower festival offers a program encouraging visitors to mingle with the local community and admire their imaginative creations made from narcissi.






Become a gladiator of ancient Rome

While Switzerland is known for its winter sports like skiing, this country offers so much more than playing in the snow. From exploding snowmen to family-friendly hikes, here's why Switzerland is the place to be when spring has finally sprung.




An Exploding Snowman

If you want to ring in spring with a very loud bang, head to Zurich's Sechseläuten Spring Festival in April. This party dates back to the 16th century and is similar to Nevada's Burning Man Festival but with a snowman whose head explodes. You read that right. An 11-foot "Böögg," snowman, is placed on a 32-foot high pyre. The effigy is set ablaze and the snowman's head, filled with fireworks, explodes. Similar to the American Groundhog Day, the faster the fire reaches the snowman's head, the better summer will be. I'll take an exploding snowman head over a rodent's shadow any day.

Family-Friendly Spring Break

Switzerland is filled with sensory trails. These are kid-friendly hiking trails with interactive stations that play on the senses. Kids can run through mazes, walk a barefoot path, balance like a bug on a leaf and swing from a zipline. Many of the trails are stroller-friendly and low-elevation. The top ones to check out are Frick Sensory Trail, Seebach Sensory Trail, Zugerland Sensory Trail, Zugerberg and Sihlwald Nature Trail.

In Baar, families can explore the 3,000-year-old Höllgrotten Caves filled with colorful stalactites and stalagmites. For indoor fun, hit up the Aathal Dinosaur Museum, just 20 minutes southeast of Zurich. Fossilized skeletons and life-size models teach families all about paleontology. At Baden's Swiss Children's Museum, kids can experience how children their age lived up to 300 years ago. This is a great interactive museum that will keep children occupied on a rainy day.

Springtime Hiking

Many trails in Switzerland won't open until June but there are a few gems open for spring hiking. The trail that leads to Aare Gorge, one of Switzerland's most photographed sites, opens in mid-April. Hiking through a gorgeous alpine river gorge with stunning rock formations and light blue water piercing through it will help you forget about the dark days of winter.

Another great trail to hit in the spring is Trümmelbach-Waterfalls, which opens at the start of April. The UNESCO natural heritage site has 10 glacial waterfalls inside a mountain. This is a photographer's dream, catching these fast-moving waterfalls while hiking through incredible caves.

One can't-miss trail is Grindelwald-First. This is no ordinary trail. It is filled with not only stunning sites but attractions that give you a literal bird's eye view. If you're not scared of heights, take the First Cliff Walk by Tissot. This is a sky bridge hugging a cliff that gives wide views of valleys and pastures so green, they almost don't look real. Don't worry, if you're not a fan of heights the bridge only takes about 10-15 minutes to cross if you're not stopping for pictures.

If you love heights, this area also offers the First Glider ride. You'll feel like an eagle as you and three others glide over the mountains going as fast as 50 miles-per-hour! It's definitely a rush any daredevil is looking for.

Advanced hikers can hit the trail that leads from Grindelwald-First to Schynige Platte. This trail takes a good 6-8 hours but is absolutely worth it. Along the way, the path offers six astonishing viewpoints of mountains, valleys and sparkling lakes. This is one for the hiking bucket list.

Thermal Baths

In need of some serious R&R? Switzerland has thermal baths and spas that can warm you up after a long winter and melt away stress. Walliser Alpentherne and Spa in Leukerbad is the largest spa complex in the country. You can gaze upon the still snow-capped Swiss Alps while floating in a very big bath of very warm water.

Alpenbad Spa in Hinwil is one of Switzerland's top-rated spas. You can relax in your personal "alpenbad," a heated wooden tub filled with spring water. Feast on fancy fondue while admiring the mountains sitting alone in your steamy tub.

Cities

Zurich

While it's hard to beat an exploding snowman, Zurich has other fantastic events in the spring. The city throws a fabulous "Fasnacht" or Carnival. It's similar to the parades in Germany, but with Caribbean, Latin American and New Orleans jazz weaved through the celebrations. There are colorful parades and parties for all age groups.

Hit the water to see the gorgeous skyline with several companies offering guided sailboat tours and cruises around Lake Zurich. If rain clouds move in, Zurich has more than 150 museums and art galleries.

Geneva

For a taste of France, head to Geneva where modern meets Medieval in the "Capital of Peace." Cafes line narrow streets in the city's historic area that give you that quintessential European experience. The old town's centerpiece is St. Pierre Cathedral, a 4th century Roman Catholic cathedral turned Protestant during The Reformation.

Science-lovers can head to CERN, an impressive gold globe that houses the European Organization for Nuclear Research. The ground floor is the "Universe of Particles" exhibit that takes you all the way back to the Big Bang.

Lugano

If you and your traveling partners can't decide whether to go to Switzerland or Italy, you're in luck. You can do both. The Swiss region Ticino is an Italian-speaking state along the Swiss-Italian border. Swiss collided with Mediterranean culture in the 15th century when this Italian area was annexed to the Swiss Confederacy. Lugano is on the northern shore of a lake where palm trees dot the shores with mountains in the background. You can spot the Swiss-Mediterranean fusion in the city's food and architecture. Experience a very different hike by hitting the Olive Tree Trail and learn about the area's centuries old groves.


DOESN'T MATTER Tiny European Nations to Visit

During rather brief geography lessons as young students, we learned where the "big" European countries were—England, France, Italy, Germany, Spain and maybe a handful of others. However, hiding among the bigger nations are smaller, almost minute locales filled with spectacular scenery, glamour and fascinating stories just waiting to be discovered. Here are seven tiny countries worth putting on your bucket list.




Andorra

Perched in the valleys of the Pyrenees between France and Spain is the alpine nation of Andorra. This small but mighty country is the home to the highest capital city in Europe, Andorra la Vella. Ruled jointly by France and Spain for more than 700 years, the official language is curiously Catalan (and also French and Spanish). The jagged peaks lend themselves to excellent winter sports with more than 180 miles of ski slopes. Dense forests are home to fantastic hiking trails in the summer. Only accessible by land, walk across the serene landscape via the Gran Recorrido País trail, or slide your way through three miles of the La Rabassa forest on an alpine coaster.



Liechtenstein Doubly landlocked (meaning it's landlocked and its neighbors are as well) between Austria and Switzerland, Liechtenstein is the fourth smallest country in Europe—measuring 160 square kilometers and 40,000 inhabitants. With awe-inspiring mountains, it's no wonder Liechtensteiners excel in skiing. Earning 10 Winter Olympic medals, the country has never medaled in the summer games. They share a strong customs union and alliance with Switzerland; however, because of the unmarked border, Swiss troops accidentally invaded the country in 2007. The Liechtenstein government had no idea until it received a formally apology for the incident. At one point, rapper Snoop Dogg once tried to rent the entire country for a music video, whose request was

politely declined by the government.



Luxembourg Coming in at a whopping 999 square miles, Luxembourg is the largest country on this list. The only Grand Duchy in the world, this regal nation is landlocked by France, Germany and Belgium. Home to many European Union (EU) functions, the capital of Luxembourg City sits atop stunning cliffs cut from the Alzette and Pétrusse rivers. Beneath the city stretches 17 kilometers of underground tunnels. Originally built in 1644, the tunnels were used as air raid shelters during World War I and World War II. Venture to the Mullerthal region, also known as Little Switzerland, where visitors can hike through lush forests, view tumbling waterfalls and explore castle ruins.




<u>Malta</u>

ing back to the Phoenicians, Malta is a mere 316 square miles. Just south of Sicily in the Mediterranean, this impressive nation was unfortunately occupied throughout much of its storied history. This former British colony gained independence in 1964, after rebuilding much of its infrastructure that was destroyed by the Germans and Italians during WWII. The country is actually an archipelago comprised of seven islands—Malta, Gozo, Comino and four uninhabited islands. Sunken WWII ships dotting the pristine coastline provide great adventures for divers. Dating back to 3600 B.C., Malta boasts Megalithic Temples, which are some of the oldest man-made structures in the world.

Once an important trading post dat-




Monaco Full of glitz, glamour and plenty of vacationing celebrities, the secondsmallest country in the world is situated along the crystalline waters of the Mediterranean. Bordered by France, Monaco is ruled by Prince Albert II, whose mother was Hollywood starlet Grace Kelly. The elegant Place du Casino beckons high-stakes gamblers from around the globe. Adrenaline and racecar enthusiasts revel in the pageantry and excitement of the Monaco Grand Prix each May.





San Marino Completely landlocked by Italy and founded on the craggy slopes of Monte Titano is the world's oldest surviving republic. Founded in 310 AD, San Marino is the fifth smallest in the world. During WWII, San Marino stayed neutral despite being surrounded by Italy. Although occupied and invaded several times over, three medieval towers perched on cliffs watch over the nation. Interestingly enough, President Abraham Lincoln was an honorary citizen.

Vatican City Last, but certainly not least, is Vatican City. The smallest country in the world in population and size is also one the most visited places in the world. Just a mere .44 square kilometers, the Vatican's population consists of Roman Catholic clergy from around the world. Home to St. Peter's Basilica and the Sistine Chapel, the entire country is the only one in the world to be designated a UNESCO World Heritage site. Beneath the foundation of the basilica is a complex of catacombs, including what is believed to be the tomb of St. Peter.

Berlin

East meets West on this half-hour tour through recent history. Board bus 100 at the Zoologischer Garten train station. Its 19-stop route passes by the Emperor Wilhelm Memorial Church, the spacious Tiergarten park, Victory Column, Reichstag and Brandenburg Gate. It rolls by the classical buildings lining the bustling Unter den Linden, the Museum Island with its world-class museums and the Television Tower before ending at Alexanderplatz, Germany's largest square.

Lisbon

The quaint yellow trams rattling along the steep city streets resemble relics from the past because they are: the trams serving the E28 route date back to the 1930s. This classic route passes through the popular tourist districts of Graca, Alfama, Baixa and Estrela. Sights you'll see include the Basílica da Estrela, the main plaza of the funky Bairro Alto, the Se Cathedral and Saint Anthony Church and the Portas do Sol, from where splendid views over the Tejo Estuary can be taken in. During peak hours, your best shot at a seat may come by boarding at the Martim Moniz or Campo Ourique departure stations.

London

Board bus number 11 on the upscale King's Road in Chelsea and travel in a northeasterly direction, passing the posh residences of Belgravia, Westminster Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, Big Ben, Houses of Parliament, Trafalgar Square, the Royal Courts of Justice, through the financial district, St Paul's Cathedral, the London mayor's official home known as the Mansion House and on to the bus's terminus at Liverpool Street station. Just a short walk from there, you'll find Spitalfields market, along with trendy Brick Lane and Shoreditch.

Milan

The city's excellent public transportation system includes several delightful vintage yellow trams. A great introduction to the city is provided by the route of Tram 1. Sights along the way include the Sempione city park, the Arco della Pace, Castello Sforzesco, Cadorna, Piazza Cordusio, Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II, La Scala opera theater, Montenapoleon, Piazza della Repubblica and Giardini Pubblici before terminating near the grand Centrale Station. Note you don't have to purchase the Tramilano tour package which comes with an audio-guide in order to ride the old, wooden-benched trams. Those who've posted in tourist advice forums stress the importance of validating one's ticket before boarding the tram, as zealous inspectors eager to fine unwitting tourists are on standby.

Paris

Tour along the Right Bank of the Seine with bus line 72. This route runs alongside the river from the Eiffel Tower to the Hotel de Ville and circles around the Louvre and the Tuileries for good measure. When traveling from west to east, sit on the right-hand side of bus to soak up the best views.

Prague

A ride on Tram 22 will take you past countless landmarks. Boarding in Vinohrady, where vineyards once stood, you'll pass by the Gothic New Town Hall, Diamant cubist house, a giant model of Franz Kafka's head and the National Theater with its golden roof. As you cross the river, Prague Castle looms in front of you. From here you'll pass through the Mala Strana and steeply upward before reaching the castle and its sprawling grounds. You'll also be close to the Strahov Monastery, which has a lovely library and a brewery.

Stockholm

Bus 2 moves from north to south, cutting through the heart of the city as it takes in and spits off passengers along 22 stops. Should you board by the Royal Library, you will pass by Kungstradgaden and the pretty red Saint James Church before crossing over into the Gamla Stan, or Old Town, where Stockholm Castle and the colorful houses of the Stortorget square await exploration. The bus continues to Södermalm, an island and city district with charming cafes and an artsy vibe.

Vienna

The trams traveling along the Ringstrasse pass by this majestic city's best bits. Hop on board Tram 1 at Schwedenplatz, heading in the direction of Stefan-Fadinger-Platz. This circular route takes you past the Monument to the Victims of Fascism at the former Gestapo headquarters site, the Stock Exchange, the Votive Church and City Hall. Change onto Tram 2 at Staiongasse/Parlament and pass by Parliament, the Athena Fountain, the statue of Empress Maria Theresa and State Opera House before returning to your starting point. ■










The Alps.

With five hotels, 18 themed areas, a plethora of thrilling rollercoasters and play areas for little ones, it's a fantastic spot for a long weekend.



Witness the impressive military might of the Royal **Edinburgh Military Tattoo.**

No, this isn't a royal ink tattoo convention. Rather, a spectacular display of military performances from the Royal Armed Forces throughout the United Kingdom and the British Commonwealth. Set against the mighty Edinburgh Castle, the tattoo runs through most of August with performances usually twice a day. Evening shows are capped off with a volley of fireworks.

Discover the Colosseum in Rome.

This amazing architectural wonder has stood the test of time and is well worth the visit. Although it's likely to be on almost everyone's bucket list, there's a good reason for it. 



However, these scenic spots are actually located in the English Channel, just off the coast of Normandy, France. Welcome to the Channel Islands, an archipelago of eight small islands (three of which are uninhabited) falling under British crown dependency. With its own government, laws, storied history (the only bit of British soil occupied by the Nazis during World War II) and unique mashup of British and French culture, the Channel Islands make a perfect weekend getaway.

JERSEY

The largest of the islands, Jersey is the southernmost. Just 45.5 square miles, it's easy for visitors to explore. Discover secret rooms hiding deep within Mont Orgueil Castle (also known locally as Gorey Castle). Or depending on the tide, walk or sail your way to Elizabeth Castle. Dating back to the 16th century, this bastion commands sweeping views of the island. Feeling hungry? Head to a charming beach cafe for cream tea or hit up one of the Michelin-starred restaurants. History buffs won't want to miss the Jersey War Tunnels. Excavated by the island's own residents under the helm of the Third Reich, the tunnels have become an homage to the suffering and heroism of the islanders during the war.

GUERNSEY

The second largest of the Channel Islands, Guernsey was once home to the famed French author, Victor Hugo, while in exile from 1855-1870. Visitors can stroll through the five-floor home overlooking

the English Channel and French coastline or walk through the fragrant gardens where his imagination let loose. Those seeking a little more adrenaline can check out Portinfer, which boasts some of the best surfing, highest tides and tidal fluctuations in Europe.


ALDERNEY

The northernmost island is also the most remote with very limited flights to and from Southampton and Guernsey. Lined with deteriorating war fortifications, Alderney is best explored by bicycle or on foot. Keep an eye out at night for the elusive and rare blond hedgehog which is native to the island. Visitors can walk along the cobblestone streets and alleys lined with charming storefronts.

HERM

Step away from the hustle and bustle and go completely car-free on a small slice of beach heaven. Just three miles off the coast of Guernsey, Herm is a great spot for relaxing, unwinding and unplug-





ging. Camp out on the white sand beaches and bask in clear, turquoise waters.

SARK

Another car-free island, the smallest of the Channel Islands is a mere 2.1 square miles. Designated one of the world's first Dark Sky Islands, the stargazing is almost unparalleled on Sark. Adventure seekers can traverse their way around the rocky island by coasteering, kayaking, hiking and paddle boarding. ■



Held under Moorish rule...

from the 8th to 15th century, the Andalucía region truly captures the essence of Spanish culture. From the food to its cities, this region in Spain is home to some of the country's best cities. Below are four wellknown places to add to your itinerary.

SFVILLE _____

The capital of Andalucía, Seville is the epitome of what you think of Spain to be—Flamenco dancers (the birthplace of this dance), sangria and tapas. However, it is also arguably one of the most beautiful cities in this region. One thing you'll notice as you're meandering through the streets is how many awe-inspiring buildings Seville has, Bombarded with Gothic architecture, the Seville Cathedral is a sight to behold and commands your attention with its intricate façade. This Roman Catholic cathedral is the third-largest church in the world and is also the largest Gothic one of its kind. Another jaw-dropping building is the Real Alcazar, a royal palace that was built for the Christian King Peter of Castile and showcases Mudejar architecture which encompasses part Gothic, part Islamic style. If you're a "Game of Thrones" fan and think to yourself how this palace resembles Dorne, you'd be right as this was the location for the kingdom. Because of its popularity, buy tickets online ahead of time as they are likely to sell out quickly. The amazement in popular landmarks continues with Plaza de España, a plaza in the Parque de Maria Luisa. Here you'll find clashes of Baroque, Renaissance and Moorish influences. Lined with orange trees, exotic flowers and an impressive water fountain, the plaza can be described in one word: breathtaking.

MÁLAGA _____

Located on beautiful Costa del Sol, Málaga is a popular port city that attracts many throughout the year. Resorts, ranging from kid-friendly to adult-only, dot Costa del Sol's shoreline. Beach bums are also spoiled for choice when it comes to beaches to soak the sun's rays. However, like Seville, Málaga's infrastructure is also dominated by Moorish and Renaissance elements such as the Alcazaba, the well-preserved citadel in Spain that sits mighty on top of the city's hill and the Málaga Cathedral. This Roman Catholic Church is nicknamed "La Manquita," or "the one-armed woman," due to a second incomplete tower. Because the Alcazaba is perched on top of a hill, you can catch the best views of Málaga and can see where the old town meets the new.

Since Málaga is a port city, people watching and taking in all the sights at the port is a must. Puerto de Málaga is peppered with many restaurants with fresh seafood




options and ritzy yachts. There are also a handful of beaches to enjoy, for those who want to escape from the city life, even for a few hours. If you want to forget you're in a city, step foot in La Concepción Botanical Garden, located outside the city center. With over 2,000 plant and bird species from all over the world, the garden welcomes you to an oasis like no other. For those who love to shop, Calle Marqués de Larios is the ideal spot to either window shop or fill your shopping bags. The street is one of Málaga's busiest shopping areas lined with marble floors and houses all the best names in retail.

GRANADA _____

This city may seem familiar to you if you've taken Spanish in high school. Along with Seville, Granada was always mentioned by many Spanish teachers, and for good reason. Known as "the Moorish jewel," Granada will not disappoint. Of all the sights in this city, the Alhambra is the best-known attraction and calls roughly 8,500 visitors every day. The Alhambra is a palace that was originally constructed as a small fortress in AD 889 but then became a royal residence. The intricate palace is broken up into three parts: the Nazrid Palace, the Alcazaba and Generalife. Deriving from the Arabic word "Al-Hamra" meaning "the red one," the impressive palace is one to put on your itinerary.

Though Granada is now mostly a Catholic city, traces of its Moorish routes can still be found in not only the architecture, but also Alcaieria, a grand bazaar. Selling spices, leather, silk and other Arab goods, you will be transported to a time when the Moors still conquered Spain. If you're unsure what to take as a souvenir, buy "fajalauza," painted ceramics and "granadino," stained-glass lamps. Be wary of pick pocketers.




CÁDI7

Situated on the Costa de la Luz, Cádiz is a port city that is often overlooked. However, this gem of a city has many traces of history mixed with mythology. This city was named after Neptune's (the god of freshwater and the sea) son and was an important sea route for commercial trade from the 14th to 18th century. Today, you can still see the importance of this once-booming trade route in landmarks such as Torre Tavira, which is Cádiz's impressive watchtower. Other historic, yet gorgeous landmarks include Cádiz Cathedral, which has Baroque, Rococo and Neo-Classical elements, and Castle of San Sebastián, although the castle is closed to visitors until further notice. Because Cádiz is located right on the water, the beaches are definite must-do activities. Playa la Caleta and Plata de la Victoria are the popular ones among beachgoers. Be sure to visit the old town, Barrio del Pópulo, which has many local restaurants, bars and quaint shops that will transport you back in time.

Tapas – Small plates of anything ranging from paella to cheese. Popular choices include a Spanish omelet, Patatas bravas (fried potatoes in sauce), cured ham, cheese, olives, calamari, mussels, paella and cuttlefish. In Granada, Moroccan specialties such as couscous and kebabs are offered as tapas.

"Gambas al Ajillo" – Garlic shrimp drizzled with olive oil and garnished with crushed red peppers. It's also best served as a tapa.

"Arroz con mariscos" - Though Valencia was the birthplace of paella, over half of Spain's rice is grown in Seville. Their Andalusian take on paella will leave you wanting more.

"Coquinas" - Clams with a generous amount of garlic, lemon juice and parsley.

"Pringá" – Slow-cooked pork or roast beef, chorizo or morcilla, and beef or pork fat. This dish is served with crusty bread.

"Cola de Toro" – Slow-cooked bull tail with a red wine and vegetable stew. It's served with potato wedges.

"Huevos a la Flamenca" – Fried eggs with potatoes and vegetables served in a clay pot.

"Patatas a lo Pobre" - Thinly sliced roasted potatoes served with onion, pepper and garlic.

"Churros" – Fried pastry dough sprinkled in sugar. It's best paired with hot chocolate. Tejeringo is a version of churros specific to Andalucía.

Gazpacho - Refreshing, cold soup that consists of raw, blended vegetables.

Jerez Fino – Strong, dry white wine. The grapes used for the wine are from Jerez.

"Granizadas" – This kid-friendly drink is made from crushed ice and flavored syrups.

Sangria – A perfect drink for those hot Andalusian summer nights that consists of red wine and citrusy fruits. Some restaurants will add brandy for an extra kick.


LAGOS, PORTUGAL

CAGLIARI Sardinia's City by the Bay

There is a tiny city on a tiny island in a very big ocean. Sardinia's capital, Cagliari, is only 33 square miles, a blip on the radar when compared to the major Italian cities like Rome, nearly 500 square miles. But Cagliari doesn't care it's often overshadowed by the behemoths Rome, Venice and Milan. There is a very different culture here, one you will find nowhere else.

A City With Personality

Those lucky to call this beachside city home often joke they're not 100% Italian, thanks to Sardinia's long and interesting history. The island has been under Roman, Pisan, Spanish, Austrian and eventually Italian rule in 1861. Over the course of several centuries, Sardinia became a melting pot of European culture. It's also one of the most welcoming cities for immigrants. New culture is infusing with old. Cagliari is the oldest continuously inhabited city in Italy, with residents dating back to 5,000 BC living in the area's vast caves.

It gives Sardinia and its capital a very different personality. Cagliari still has the richness of Italy but with a more laid-back reserved mentality. Don't mistake this for disinterest or aloofness. The people here want to share their city with the world, they're just not pretentious about it. Cagliari is sort of like your really "chill" friend. People tend to move a little slower here, take in the scenery a little more and spend more moments making memories over a good meal and glass of wine. It's a city made to lose track of time.

Walk Through History

Cagliari's history goes back a few millennia and much of it has been preserved over time. The city's Castello district, a hilltop fortified citadel, is still surrounded by ancient walls and towers. The "old town" still sits high above the rest of the city and is only accessible by two 14th century gates. Both the Tower of St. Pancrazio and the Elephant Tower offer amazing panoramic views of the city with ocean and mountain backdrops.

The city is also home to a Roman Amphitheatre built in the second century that once sat 8,000 - 10,000 people. When you walk through the ground level, with the rock and limestone towering above, you will be standing in the exact place gladiators once battled and men fought wild beasts for entertainment. If you hike to the top, you'll see Cagliari's famous skyline.

The churches show you how architecture not only changed over time but with whom was ruling the area. There are seven churches in the heart of

it has been transformed into many styles of the centuries. The church is home to the Sanctuary of the Martyrs, a crypt beneath the altar with nearly 200 preserved relics. Also inside, the "Madonna col Bambino," or "The Virgin and Child" wooden statue dating back to the 14th century.

The Affordable Italy

Italy can be an expensive destination but there is relief in Cagliari. According to travel organization, Budget Your Trip, the average cost per day for tourists visiting Cagliari is 96 euros per day. Compared to Rome's average 130 euros, Sardinia is a steal. Remember, 96 euros is the average, so if you're a thrifty traveler like me, you can get that number a lot lower. Switching hotels for hostels and public transport

for cabs and cars will save you a bundle. Not to mention, Cagliari is small and beautiful, so walking is the best method and it's free.

Food

You can't write about any Italian city without mentioning the food! There will be the usual Italian dishes like pizza and pasta but it's best to live like a true Sardinian. Swap pasta for "fregula," a toasted couscous very similar to a risotto. Another favorite is "culurgiones," dumplings native to Sardinia. They can be filled with vegetables, spices, meats or cheeses. Since Cagliari is a coastal city, you'll naturally have the freshest and best seafood. Wander the sights and smells of the city's fish markets.

you everything you need from adventure to serene and relaxing views. A word of caution: do not take any sand or rocks from the beaches. It is illegal and strictly enforced with a fine up to 3,000 euros.

POETTO

Poetto is Caligari's main beach and runs nearly five miles. It is also considered one of the most photogenic beaches, making it an Instagram-worthy dream. Poetto is flat; its water clear and shallow, making it perfect for families with young children. There are also lifeguards on duty and entertainment for children. Locals come here to exercise, so you'll see plenty of people getting their morning walk or bike ride in. They won't mind if you join them.

CALA FIGHERA

Poetto can get a bit crowded and windy in the summer. If you're an introvert like me, head to Cala Fighera. While the beach has more pebbles than sand, this small inlet is much more secluded and quiet. Its turquoise waters splash alongside sandstone cliffs providing a peaceful view. This is also where daredevils will leap from the cliffs and into the water, though you should be careful. Cala Fighera is considered "nudist-friendly" so keep that in mind.

CALA REGINA

If you're wanting a more authentic "stranded-on-abeautiful-desert-island" feel, head to Cala Regina. This is about a 40-minute drive southeast of the city but worth it. Cala Regina is another pebble beach but because it's located within a small cove, it's protected from the strong winds that blow over many beaches. An old Spanish watchtower perched on a hilltop gives you a view of the ocean you will never forget. Since the water is so clear here, it's a fantastic place to snorkel and experience life under the sea.

If you've already knocked out your big European bucket list destinations, I encourage you to go off the beaten path and experience parts unknown to the average traveler. The memories you'll make on those trips will no doubt stay with you forever. A good starting point is Sardinia's Cagliari.

Les Halles Paul Bocuse


LYON, FRANCE

Veuve Clicquot, Reims




Moët & Chandon, Epernay

J. de Telmont, Damery



THE FASCINATION WITH ITALIAN LEATHER

Perusing through narrow alley ways in almost any city in Italy, you're bound to smell it first — the subtle, yet indelible musky scent of leather. Brightly colored handbags hang precariously from market stalls, belts are neatly hung on racks against the walls, wallets and coin purses lined up on shelves, all waiting to be purchased as the perfect souvenir. Italian leather is synonymous with high-quality and luxury. With secret processes dating back thousands of years, it's no wonder there's a slight obsession with these fascinating goods.

HISTORY OF Leatherworking

The art of making leather is handed down from generation to generation. With the industry beginning its boon during the Renaissance and Middle Ages, leatherworkers and tanners found their niche in the lush countryside of Tuscany. Intricate handiwork and practices were so closely guarded, many laborers formed special guilds and associations for their trade. Currently, more than 15 percent of global and two-thirds of all European leather production originates in Italy.

Most Italian leather is processed using vegetable tanning. Derived from the bark of oak and other trees, as well as various native plants, tannins are drawn out and mixed with an acidic solution to preserve and protect the leather. Tannins are also responsible for the varying and distinctive hues. Leather is made from various animal hides, but primarily cows from the surrounding area. The tanning process can take anywhere from 20 to 30 months to complete before the material is ready for cutting, stitching, embroidering, cobbling and more.





When shopping for leather, there are two main types to look for: top grain and full grain. Top grain is thinner where the outermost layer of hide is removed. Because the leather is thinner than full grain, it is easier to work with. This type of material isn't as expensive, yet it is much more stain-resistant and yielding — making it much more appealing and practical to the masses. Full grain leather is the highest quality leather you can get. Once tanned, you still have the rough spots, rawness and toughness of the animal.

FAMOUS PURVEYORS OF Italian Leatherwork

Most notably known for over-the-top designs, killer sky-high stilettos and stunning haute couture, many Italian fashion houses have humble beginnings tracing back to the leather trade. One of the oldest icons, Prada, was founded in 1913 in Milan. Brother Mario and Martino Prada opened "Fratelli Prada," a store supplying luxury leather bags, steamer trunks and other travels goods to the local upper-crust society. Similarly, in 1921, Guccio Gucci began selling luggage and custom-made equestrian equipment in Florence. Gucci expanded his vision and has become known for exquisite fashion and merchandise.

One of the first to expand into the U.S. was Salvatore Ferragamo. Starting as a novice apprentice in a cobbler's shop, Ferragamo opened a small business repairing and creating made-tomeasure leather shoes and boots. His designs proved so popular, he moved to the States and quickly became favored with the Hollywood elite. Starlets such as Marilyn Monroe and Greta Garbo gave his creations an air of glamour.

Another recent designer more known for his sand-blasted jeans also began his career work-

ing with leather. Showing artistic talent from a young age, Roberto Cavalli was destined for fashion greatness. He had a knack for working with intricate designs on various types of textiles. He pioneered and patented a unique way of printing designs on the supple material. He also came up with a trademark patchwork pattern created of different types of fabrics, including leather. He quickly expanded his business to include high-end fashion. Although many of his flagship stores in the States have closed, he still maintains a strong presence in his native Italy.

Granted, not everyone can afford to walk away from their dream Italian vacation with a Prada bag. However, there are plenty of affordable options to choose from. With vendors filling the stalls at local markets, and plenty of shops tucked along cobblestone streets, the opportunity to browse and pick the perfect piece of handcrafted leather abounds. Most goods are still made the old-fashioned way — by hand. You'll be sure to have an incredibly unique souvenir which may have just been made by a future famous Italian designer.
