

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## An officer and a DJ

Yokota squadron commander keeps the beat on base

YOKOTA AIR BASE - When a party at this airlift hub in western Tokyo needs an experienced beatmatcher at the turntables, "DJ Darrick D" steps

by his father. Seven years later, he put his drumsticks aside in favor of competitive wrestling. But he couldn't resist the urge to spin vinyl. While at Fresno State in 2000, he bought turntables and records and learned to match beats.

Beatmatching is the foundation of DJing, Duran said. The DJ mixes songs with the same speed and time so the beat syncs up seamlessly while transitioning to the next track.

Duran noticed he had a knack for DJing, so to make extra money, he started working the turntables at Club Dance, a hip-hop and R&B nightclub in Fresno, under a mentor, DJ David Harris

"He was a music lover, and it was easy because he learned fast," Harris said via Facebook Messenger on Sept 1. "He had started slightly before I met, and he fit right in."

Duran was working at the Fresno County Health Department when his wife, Alena Duran, talked him into joining the Air Force as a public health officer. He commissioned in

Duran took command at Yokota on June 28, 2022. By day, he oversees the active-duty clinic at the 374th Medical Group, along with the mental health flight, public health, audiology, optometry and physical therapy.

"After I joined the military, I was under this impression that I had to leave the DJ scene," Duran told Stars and Stripes on Aug. 28. "My wife and I used to joke about 'You can't do both; you can't be an officer

"I feel like even though it's extra work and time, it's something that I really like doing," Duran said. "And it's my way to connect people because music brings people together.'

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
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
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### Tricare prices to increase for young adults, reservists

oung adult military dependents enrolled in Tricare will see their health care costs rise starting next year, when monthly premiums go up by as much

Tricare premiums are also going up Jan. 1 for reservists, retired reservists and separating service members and their families, according to new rates published Aug. 31.

Tricare Young Adult Prime for those between ages 21 and 26 will cost \$637 per month starting in January, compared with the current \$570 a month. The premium has skyrocketed by more than 250% since 2014, when it was \$180 a month.

Tricare Young Adult Select, meanwhile, will jump from \$291 per month this year to \$311 in 2024, an increase of 6.9%. The Select package has deductibles and more outof-pocket costs.

Tricare Young Adult plans are available for purchase by unmarried adult children of service members between the ages of 21 and 26 after they age out of other Tricare plans. Coverage includes medical and pharmacy benefits but excludes dental and vision.

The latest round of premium hikes for military families with adult children is especially disconcerting, said Eileen Huck, the National Military Family Association's government relations senior deputy director.

"We are absolutely concerned that these rates are pricing military families with young adult dependents out of health care,"



she said. "Our concern is that these young adults are going without health care coverage altogether, just because there's no affordable option.'

The program is part of Tricare's premium-based plans, Peter Graves, a Defense

Health Agency spokesman, said in a statement Sept. 6. The premiums reflect costs to the Defense Department, which by law cannot subsidize the program, he said.

'Based on past actual costs of the program, DHA actuaries calculate the future cost of health care for these type plans, and premiums are established based on these cost projections," Graves said.

Higher usage and care costs for a health plan like Tricare Young Adult result in higher premiums, he said.

Huck is skeptical when she hears that rationale. **EXCLUSIVE NEWS FROM:** 

"I just have always felt that explanation is inadequate," she said. "If that were the case, you'd see some variability, and ...

we've just seen the rates going up.

Tricare Prime is supposed to be the lowest-out-of-pocket plan to the beneficiary, Huck said, since it's assumed that many young adults covered under Prime receive care at DOD facilities.

"It doesn't make any sense to me that those premiums would be so high," Huck

Young Adult Prime beneficiaries have access to care through their assigned military or civilian primary care manager.

All Tricare beneficiaries are eligible for care at military hospitals and clinics, but Tricare Young Adult Select beneficiaries have access only if space is available.

Other rate increases include Tricare Reserve Select. Those monthly premiums will go up to \$51.95 for the individual, from \$48.47 in 2023; and to \$256.87, from \$239.60, for the family option.

Retired reservists can expect to pay at least 6.5% more. Individuals will pay \$585.24, up from \$549.35 in 2023; and families will pay \$1,406.22, compared with the current \$1,320.76 per month.


For retired reservists with family Tricare coverage, costs in 2024 will be \$200 more a month than 2022's rates.

Service members transitioning out of the military also will pay higher costs if enrolled in Tricare's Continued Health Care Benefit Program, a plan that provides temporary health coverage for 18 to 36 months after the loss of Tricare eligibility.

Premiums are set to rise from \$1,654 per quarter to \$1,813 in 2024, an increase of 9.6% for individuals; and from \$4,134 per quarter in 2023 to \$4,539, a 9.8% increase.

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## Volunteers needed for Zama program housing children in need

CAMP ZAMA - The Army Community Service here is currently looking for compassionate families to potentially provide a safe haven for children in need.

Volunteers in the Emergency Placement Care program, similar to foster care, are qualified to temporarily house a child for up to 90 days until a stable home with a parent or guardian is available.

"We want to make sure the children are going somewhere safe and secure," said Brittany Franklin, manager of the Family Advocacy Program at ACS.

While the EPC program is rarely used in this community, Franklin hopes to enlist more volunteers since providers can leave the country and the process to certify a new provider can take months to complete.

A team of volunteers will also bring continuity to help maintain the health and wellbeing of children who may be dealing with a family crisis, Franklin said.

"It takes a village to raise a child, and children are our future," she said. "And if they're going through something that may be traumatic or is different, there's an adjustment period."

Jennifer Luera, a FAP specialist who certifies providers, the training takes eight hours and covers various topics such as positive parenting, loss and separation, and domes-

tic violence and its effect on children. A home visit and a monthslong background check are also required.

A provider must be a Department of Defense identification cardholder and can be from either a single or married family home that has an extra bedroom.

Luera said those interested in the program

should also be willing to give up their time, since a child could stay in their home for a few "They really have to

understand that it is going to be all about the safety of these children that are placed in their home," she said.

Lucinda Ward, an ACS specialist with a background in child care, is currently one of two providers in the

community.

Ward, who encouraged others to volunteer, saw the position as an opportunity to give back to the community as well as support the Army's priority of placing people

"Knowing that the children will have somewhere safe to go to is my ultimate

goal," she said, "and I know that I can provide that for them."

Luera understands that for many community members it can be difficult to live overseas far away from their friends and family.

To get through the tough times, ACS offers several resources to ensure community members stay resilient.

"There are so many unique challenges with just being here and that is what we try

Luera hopes that with their resources and class offerings, which can range from stress management to conflict resolution and financial readiness, the EPC program will never need to be used.

"All of those are preventive measures, and ensuring they know these resources are out there for them," she said. "If you don't know where to turn, the stressors can build

hoppers and foodies alike can spend countless hours in Tokyo's hipster hotspot Shimokitazawa.

The neighborhood, also known as "Shimokita," is home to hundreds of vintage clothing, book and music shops, as well as dozens of restaurants and cafés to keep your energy up as you shop.

Shimokita is a popular bohemian district that draws thousands of visitors of all ages thanks its many dining and shopping options, restricted vehicular access, and busy squares with buskers, food trucks and periodic flea markets.

New York Joe Exchange, housed in a building that was once a sento bathhouse, offers a unique shopping experience with a touch of the neighborhood's history. Other vintage shops worth a browse are Antique Life Jin and Tokyo Retro a.m.

At the turn of every corner, you'll find cafés like Bear Espresso Café or Bookends Coffee Service. The area is also known for curry houses like Planet Curry and Nan Station. And, since the neighborhood is only a 10-minute train ride from major stations Shibuya and Shinjuku, getting there is quick and easy.

Keep in mind that many of the cafés and restaurants here are quite small, so you may have to wait to get a seat. If you're a larger group, check out the larger izakayas and restaurants in the area instead like Shimokita Rokkaku or Shirubee.

Besides being a center for shopping and dining, Shimokita draws a crowd in the evenings thanks to its thriving live theater and live music houses. The prestigious Honda Gekijo Theater, also inside an old sento bath since 1982, hosts many festivals with famous theatrical troupes throughout the year. For great tunes, check out Half Moon Hall Shimokitazawa, LIVEHOLIC and any of the many live-houses in the district.

The mix of old, new and vintage you'll find in Shimokitazawa is what keeps visitors coming back for more. There is always something new to discover here, so you won't want to miss out on the lively, laidback scene.

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# My faves lanese frozen food

ast year was an important year for the frozen food industry in Japan. The year marked the 100th anniversary of the first time Hokkaido fish was commercially frozen, according to the Japan Frozen Food Association.

What started with frozen fish has evolved to include a wide variety of foods through the last 10 decades. In the 1930s, for instance, frozen mashed strawberries and frozen sliced fish arrived on department store shelves for general consumers.

In the 1940s, precooked food called "home meat" and "home stew" made it to store freezers.

In the 1950s, frozen fish and croquettes were introduced to school lunches and also adopted by an expedition team to Antarctica.

And the 1960s, frozen food reached Olympic heights when, at the 1964 games held in Tokyo, frozen food was used to prepare meals at the athletes' village and the response was golden. Following this success, hotels and restaurants began using frozen food for dishes on their menus.

Given the historical context, the year 2020 was understandably expected to be very special. It not only marked the 100th anniversary of Japanese frozen food but was also the year when the Olympic Games were originally scheduled to take place for the second time in Tokyo.

Although the Olympic Games ended up being rescheduled, the year still turned out to be something special for the frozen food industry.

In 2020, the pandemic caused frozen food sales to soar, according to the Diamond Chain Store Online. While dining out was restricted, people resorted to stocking up with frozen food from their local markets and convenience stores. The variety and shelf life of frozen food makes it a hot commodity for those who prefer to stay at home.

Not only can you enjoy croquette, hamburger, fried shrimp, and dumplings at home, but you can also get frozen ramen noodles, yakitori (skewered grilled chicken), Takoyaki, baked onigiri and more. You can even find French dishes like croissants, red wine beef stew and Tarte aux fruits in stock in the freezer aisle.

Before the pandemic, I didn't eat frozen food often, but the stay-home period changed my mind. I took a chance and gave some of the frozen food offerings at my local market a try.

Below are a few of my picks from the frozen section. Frozen meals and food items are a great way



to introduce variety and different flavors into your cooking at a reasonable price. Bon appetite!

#### ■ Takoyaki

(Octopus dumpling by Lawson, 210 yen or approx. \$1.92)

Traveling to Osaka may still not be an option. And while nothing compares to enjoying steaming octopus balls near Dotonbori, this snack food from Lawson's convenience store will take you there — gastronomically, at least.

#### ■ Yaki onigiri

(Roasted Rice Ball by Nichirei, 278 yen)

This is a kind of food I would buy at festival food stalls or highway rest areas. Its crispy-on-the-outside-but-soft-on-the-inside texture is well-replicated in the pre-cooked versions as well.

#### ■ Gvoza

(Dumpling by Ajinomoto, 198 yen)

If you haven't noticed, pre-cooked dumplings are big in Japan. If you go to a local supermarket, you will find various labels of frozen dumplings there. Some bear the names of famous gyoza restaurants such as "Osaka Ohsho" and "Min Min," allowing customers to enjoy the authentic taste of their favorite dumpling at home.

#### **Ebi fry**

(Fried Shrimp by Tolona, 138 yen)

This is arguably one of the most popular food among kids for bento meals along with hamburgers and croquettes. Most frozen ebi fry are meant to be fried in a pan, but you can find many are now conveniently microwaveable, too!

#### **■** Karaage

(Fried Chicken by Ajinomoto, 398 yen)

Whether for an appetizer or for a bento meal, precooked karaage can be a great choice. "ZaHKaraage," a popular label pictured in the photo, is especially worth a taste since it's been a hit since its release last September. The garlic, soy sauce, and spring onion oil seasoning on these juicy karaage can be addictive.

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# A stroke of luck with delicious imokinton

ith the return of fall, grocery stores stock up on sweet potatoes and seasonal snacks with satsuma-imo (sweet potato) flavors. These purple root vegetables are considered the aki no mikaku, or taste of autumn in Japan.

In Okinawa, the obsession with all things sweet potato is deeply intertwined with the history of the islands.

Prior to the crop's introduction to the mainland, sweet potatoes were first imported to the Ryukyu Kingdom from China in 1605 by Noguni Sokan. Okinawa's soil, which drained well, was well-suited for the cultivation of the crop.

Today, you'll find sweet potatoes in many dishes and sweets in Okinawa, including tempura and ice cream

In particular, beniimo, or red potato, is especially popular. Its vibrant color makes it a great ingredient for many dishes. However, yellow satsuma-imo also proves to be a delicious ingredient you shouldn't overlook.

A recipe you might enjoy if you're a sweet potato fan is imokinton. Kinton is a kind of Japanese sweet that molds some paste of food such as satumaimo (sweet potato), ingenmame (kidney beans), and kuri (chestnuts) into a ball shape. As the name suggests, imokinton is rounded balls of sweet potato paste.

According to Shokuiku Daijiten, a website dedicated to health and food, the name "kinton" originally referred to some round sweets imported from China. Some say the original kinton was similar to wonton.

Now, kinton is spelled as "金団." The letter

"金" means gold, and "団" means a group or a block. Since balls in yellow can be associated with fortune, kinton is now recognized as food to be served up for New Year celebrations.

Wagashi Japanese sweets shops also stock imokinton and other varieties like chestnuts and bean-flavored kinton. You may even find kinton perfected by Japanese pastry cooks in the shape of beautiful flowers or fruit.

Although it is too early to celebrate a new year, I decided to try making one because I saw so many yellow sweet potatoes on the shelf at a supermarket in my neighborhood.

The recipe I followed looked simple and easy to understand on paper, but it turned out painstaking in some ways. Pureeing the paste until it gets smooth took a lot of effort. Plus shaping the paste into balls was very challenging as well. My "kinton" ended up having some creases and wrinkles, far from the smooth and beautiful ones you would find at Japanese sweetshops. Nonetheless, the good flavor of my creation was surprising.

The texture felt soft like gelato and the potato's sweetness wasn't overwhelming and different from other sugary sweets. Although my presentation of the food was not satisfying, I was happy with my first try of kinton, at least in terms of how it tasted.

If you are an artistic type and confident in your dexterity, I would recommend that you try molding the paste into nice flowers and leaves. Even if not, this is still worth a try since the simple recipe will let enjoy the nice sweetness and possibly bring good luck for fortune.

Imokinton pairs nicely with some green tea and other warm beverages, perfect for welcoming the fall season. Enjoy!

#### Ingredients

- ☐ Sweet potato (500g)
- ☐ Milk (100cc)
- ☐ Sugar (60g)
- ☐ Butter (80g)
- ☐ Dry Gardenia flower (one piece)
- ☐ Chestnuts to garnish (or sesame, dried fruits, etc.)

#### Recipe



Peel skin off sweet potatoes and dice them.



Soften the diced sweet potatoes by microwaving or boiling them.



Boil gardenia in a pot of water. To enhance the yellow color, you can boil gardenia with sweet potatoes in a pot. (If you microwave sweet potatoes, you can boil them in a pot and add in the colored liquid to the mixture of sweet potatoes, butter, and sugar.)



Mix sweet potatoes, butter and sugar, and then mash (You can also add salt or mirin/sweet cooking rice wine to fine tune the taste).



Add in milk and mix ingredients further. Mix in yellow liquid from the boiling gardenia (about two teaspoons or more).



Puree the mixture.



Pick up some dough and wrap it with saran wrap before forming a ball. Repeat the process until you have made several dough.



To finish, top each ball with a garnish. I chose pre-cooked chestnuts.

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Katori Jingu Shrine Shinshoji Temple

n leaving the old town of Sawara, we headed to a majestic Shinto shrine and power spot that boasts more than 2,600 years of history and carries the highest shrine status in the nation.

Katori Jingu Shrine has been known as one of the three most prestigious Shinto shrines in Japan, ranked with Ise Shrine in Mie Prefecture and Kashima Shrine in Ibaraki Prefecture.

The enshrined deity, Futsunushi-no-Ookami, is believed to mitigate natural disasters, provide protection,

and is a guardian of martial arts.

The quiet and solemn shrine is surrounded by rich, green forest. Unlike the striking vermillion-colored buildings of other shrines, the buildings of Katori Jingu Shrine are covered in a unique black lacquer. The main shrine dates back to 1700 when it was built by the Shogun Tsunayoshi Tokugawa and is designated as an important cultural property.

After the shrine, we drove 20 minutes to Shinshoji Temple, another power spot nearby. This temple draws

about 3 million visitors annually for a traditional New Year's

visit – the second largest in Japan, next to Meiji Shrine in Tokyo.

Since its foundation in 940, the temple has been known as a sanctuary to ward off evil.

According to Japanese tradition, ages 25, 42 and 60 for men, and ages 19, 33 and 60 for women are supposed to be unlucky years. When someone turns one of the unlucky ages, they visit Shinshoji in hopes of warding off evil fortune. Although I am not at an age of unluckiness, I visited the large main hall, put my hands together and wished for even better luck.

Whether you're at an unlucky age or not, Shinshoji's main hall, main gate, 3-story pagoda and elaborately-carved Shakado (hall for Buddha) are worth some time to admire and explore.

And, make sure to stop in one of the many shops and restaurants along the approach to the temple for a quick snack and some souvenirs.

Top 10 things to do in Aomori, Japan's northern nature paradise!

Koganezaki Furofushi Onsen is in Fukaura, on Aomori's Tsugaru Peninsula, at the northernmost reaches of Japan's main island of Honshu. The ryokan inn is built on a scenic cape called Koganezaki, known for its beautiful

The name "Furofushi Onsen" originates from the legend that "If you cure here, you will not get old or weak.

#### **ACCESS**

By Car:

Roughly an hour and 40 minutes from JR Hirosaki Station

By Public Transit:

Around three hours from JR Shin-Aomori Station when taking the Resort Shiragami bound for "Akita" on JR's Gono Line. Once getting off at WeSPa-Tsubakiyama Station, the facility is located a five-minute taxi ride away (free shuttle bus services timed to the arrival/departure time of the trains are available. No reservation required)

The inn's distinguishing feature is the full, open bath on the beach. As you soak at the edge of the waves, the horizon is at about eye level and you'll feel as if you're actually in the Sea of Japan.

The bath's water has a brownish hue because it's an iron-rich chloride salt spring that contains sodium and

It has high heat retention that will warm you to the core and is called a "beautiful skin bath" due to its effectiveness in treating skin problems from cuts to skin diseases.

Day trip visits are welcome, but staying overnight is

recommended for the best experience. Day-bathers (last reception 3:30 p.m.) must exit the bath by 4 p.m. before the sun sets and the whole area is dyed golden.

Sunset bathing is a privilege reserved for overnight guests only. The experience of soaking in the hot water while gazing at the glowing orange sunset and the magnificent view of the Sea of Japan will be an unforgettable

\*Those with tattoos are prohibited from bathing.

## 2 Tsuru no Yu Onsen (Semboku City, Akita)

Nyuto Onsenkyo Hot Spring Village is located in the central part of eastern Akita prefecture, in Semboku City's Tazawako district. The village comprises seven hot springs in Towada Hachimantai National Park, which spans Aomori, Iwate, and Akita prefectures.

In the past, the area was often visited by tourists from

both Japan and overseas, and classic Japanese scenery can still be seen in the moving thatched-roof buildings and old huts among the virgin beech forests.

#### **ACCESS**

By Car:

Roughly 30 minutes from JR Tazawako Station

By Public Transit:

From JR Tazawako Station, take a 50-minute ride on the Ugo Kotsu Bus bound for "Nyuto Onsen." After getting off at the "Tsurunoyu Onsen Iriguchi" bus stop, it's a 40-minute walk to the facility (overnight guests can take the free shuttle bus from the "Arupa Komakusa" bus stop, reservations required).

Sansuikaku (Hanamaki City, Iwate)

Hanamaki Onsenkyo is a group of 12 hot springs along the Ou mountain range of southern Iwate Prefecture. One of them, Osawa Onsen Sansuikaku, is a Japanese-style inn built in the mountains overlooking the clear Toyosawa River.

Osawa Onsen has an affiliated inn called Tojiya, and as a guest of Sansuikaku, you can use both hot springs. There is a wide variety of open-air baths and bath rooms along the river, including a semi-open-air bath with a view of the mountains and a private family bath suitable even for small children.

#### **ACCESS**

By Car:

Roughly 30 minutes from JR Hanamaki Station

By Public Transit:

From JR Hanamaki Station, take a 25-minute ride on Iwate Kotsu Bus's Yuguchi Line bound for "Hanamaki Onsen." Get off at the "Osawa Onsen" bus stop and take a short walk to the facility (free shuttle buses run from Osawa Onsen Station, Hanamaki Station, and Shin-Hanamaki Station).

The inn is surrounded by nature, and it's refreshing to soak in the hot water while gazing at the mountain scenery

Iconic Tsuru no Yu Onsen has a long history, having opened around 1688. The old wooden structures were used in the Edo period (1603-1867). Some rooms are equipped with a traditional Japanese fireplace and hearth.

While retaining a classic Japanese atmosphere, the washrooms, toilets, and heating are modern so guests can stay comfortably.

The atmosphere is perfect for forgetting hectic daily life by taking a walk through the spacious grounds with family or enjoying a quiet chat in your room.

Many of Tsuru no Yu Onsen's visitors come to soak in the mixed bathing, openair "Tsuru no Yu" bath. Surrounded by beautiful beech trees, the large bath has milky bluish-white water.

It's a mixed bath, where men and women bathe alike, but the milky water provides some privacy, and the whole family can enter.

Meals feature a miso-seasoned hot pot, grilled fish, and seasonal wild vegetable dishes made with yams from Akita. After a delicious dinner, a return to the bath is in order. At night, it's lit only by lanterns, creating a serene atmosphere.

Tsuru no Yu has English-speaking staff members who will gladly explain the rules and policies of the inn and bath.

of each season. The autumn leaves and the snowy winter scenery, in particular, are a must-see.

The semi-open-air, roofed "Toyosawa no Yu" overlooks trees dyed in red, yellow, and green, and the magnificent view of the autumn leaves bordered by the window frame looks just like a painting.

To see the snowy landscape, head to the mixed bathing, open-air "Osawa no Yu." From there, you can see the beautiful scenery of the bridge, the roof of the building, and the surrounding trees white with snow. Osawa no Yu is for women only from 8:00 to 9:00 at night, for women who would rather not participate in mixed bathing.

At Sansuikaku, you'll dine on a Japanese course that makes the best use of seasonal ingredients and a menu that changes monthly.

In addition to wild plants and seafood, Hanamaki's "Hakkinton" brand pork and Iwate's "Maesawa" beef and "Iwate beef" are also available (subject to change, depending on availability). There is also a children's set so the whole family can have a wonderful meal.

## 4 Hotel Shion (Morioka City, Iwate)



at the eastern foot of the Zao mountain range in southwestern Miyagi Prefecture, is a hot spring resort with a history that goes back about 400 years. The spring's hot brown waters



include sodium, calcium, sulfate, and chloride springs.

Onsen Sanso Daikon no Hana is a rvokan inn recommended for those who want a quiet family-only visit to Togatta Onsen. The approximately 33,000 square meter site is divided into five areas, each with its own accommodations. There are a mere 18 rooms in 12 buildings scattered throughout the vast forest, offering plenty of private relaxation.

Roughly an hour from Sendai Station

From JR Sendai Station, transfer and take around a 15-minute ride on the Tohoku Shinkansen Line's "Yamabiko" train bound for Tokyo. After getting off at Shiroishi-Zao Station, the facility is a 40-minute taxi ride

Each building has its own characteristic features, such as a view of a mountain stream or a pond where fireflies live. The "Eboshidake" maisonette in the "Mountain Play" area has separate living rooms and bedrooms and trees growing near the terrace and balcony are close enough to touch.

The maisonette has its own bath so you can use it at your leisure. Family bathing in the refreshing sunrise or under the starry sky is sure to spark memorable conversations.

In addition to the springs and accommodations, the food is another point of pride for the inn. There is a farm on the property, and homegrown vegetables play a leading



# 8 Ginzanso (Obanazawa City, Yamagata)

A popular facility with both domestic and overseas visitors is Ginzan Onsen. This hot spring village rises from a gorge in northeastern Yamagata Prefecture's Obanazawa City. It was built at the end of the Taisho period (1912~1926) and towards the beginning of the Showa period (1926~1989). Illuminated by gas lamps, here you'll find a range of wooden inns and refined traditional Japanese restaurants-enveloping the area in a nostalgic atmosphere that's hard to find anywhere else.

Ginsanzo is a popular choice for its fantastic location close to the hot springs! It only takes a five-minute walk to the hot spring village. What's more, you can add to this traditional Japanese experience by renting out a pair of geta, traditional Japanese wooden sandals with an elevated base, at the front desk.

A free shuttle bus for overnight guests runs from Oishida Station. Those who want to use this service must make a reservation by the day before their stay.

#### **ACCESS**

By Car:

Roughly one hour and 15 minutes from JR Yamagata

Urabandai Lake Resort (Kitashiobara Village, Fukushima) Located in the Aizu region's northwest is Kitashiobara Village's Urabandai Lake Resort. This naturally abundant area has attractive sites such as the mysterious ponds of Goshikinuma and Lake Hibara, where you can enjoy cruise tours.

In addition to this, Urabandai Lake Resort is popular for its guided walking tours, canoe tours, and painting akabeko, Aizu's signature red bull toy.

Free shuttle buses that run from the nearby Inawashiro Station can be taken without a reservation if there are less than ten passengers. We recommend checking the official website for departure and arrival times before your trip!

#### **ACCESS**

By Car:

Roughly an hour and 15 minutes from JR Koriyama Station

By Public Transit:

From JR Koriyama Station, take a 40-minute train ride on the JR Ban-Etsusai Line rapid express bound for "Aizu-Wakamatsu." After getting off at JR Inawashiro Station, take another 40-minute ride on either the free shuttle bus or the Bandai Toto Bus's Urabandai Kogen Line bound for "Urabandai Kogen Eki." The facility is right next to the "Urabandai Lake Resort" bus stop.

The resort has breathtaking views of the nearby lake,

# 10 Aizu Higashiyama Onsen Mukaitaki (Aizuwakamatsu City, Fukushima)

Aizu Higashiyama Onsen is located in the center of western Fukushima Prefecture's Aizu region. It is said that the source of the hot spring was discovered 1300 years ago by the monk Gyoki. The hot spring town's river is lined with old inns as well as free footbaths and restaurants.

Aizu Higashiyama Onsen Mukaitaki is a traditional Japanese-style inn that stands out among its neighboring inns. Founded in 1873, it was once used as a recreational facility by the samurai of the Aizu clan.

Aizu Higashiyama Onsen has a luxurious Japanesestyle wooden structure that surrounds a garden. Known for its view along with the Eikanbashi bridge in front of the inn, it is the first Japanese inn to be registered as a tangible cultural property.

#### **ACCESS**

By Car:

Roughly an hour and 25 minutes from JR Koriyama Station

By Public Transit:

From JR Aizu-Wakamatsu Station, take a 15-minute ride on the "Akabe" sightseeing bus. The facility is nearby the "Higashiyama Onsen-eki" bus stop. If you are staying with your family, the spacious threeroom, 32.4 square meter "Special Room Hanare no Ma" suite is recommended.

The Japanese royal family and Hideyo Noguchi (1876-1928), a prominent doctor and bacteriologist from Fukushima Prefecture, are among those who have stayed in this venerable Shoin-zukuri style guest room.

One of the VIP room's charms is its view of the garden with its ponds and waterfalls. In winter, "Yukimi Candles" placed in bamboo tubes light up the garden, making it possible to experience the luxurious lighting with your whole family from the warmth of your room.

Mukaitaki has three privately-sourced natural hot springs that flow directly from the source. They are colorless, transparent sulfate chloride springs rich in sodium and calcium.

As you rest in the 45 degrees Celsius water, you'll feel the minerals refreshing your body. The bathroom is decorated with white granite and marble and has a nice retro atmosphere.

Another of the inn's pleasures is the enjoyment of local Aizuwakamatsu cuisine, such as sweetened carp and pickled herring in Japanese pepper. You can take your time relishing the simple, delicious dishes in the comfort of your room.

#### Aizu Higashiyama Onsen Mukaitaki


