t the heart of Starfield Mall in Goyang, west of Seoul, Sports Monster blends traditional sports with digital gaming, offering an indoor experience that appeals to children, teens and adults.

Since opening in 2016, the **EXCLUSIVE NEWS FROM:** indoor complex has provided more than 30 physical and virtual activities, including trampolines, basketball dunk zones and a simulated rock-climbing wall.

Digital offerings range from rhythm games and motion-based soccer to immersive virtual reality stations.

The facility, entirely indoors, is designed to accommodate South Korea's unpredictable weather. The space caters to a range of ages

and energy levels, with staff stationed throughout to assist guests and ensure safety, allowing parents to shop or relax nearby.

Though not all staff speak fluent English, employees are known for being approachable and enthusiastic, helping guide patrons and maintaining a family-friendly environment.


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summer? Hold on! Just an hour's drive from Seoul, there's a place where you can ride the waves without heading to the coast. Located in Siheung, Gyeonggi-do, Wave Park is a massive artificial surfing park featuring a wave pool that measures 220 meters long and 240 meters wide, generating up to 1,000 waves per hour.

Wave Park is a theme park located on Geobukseom Island — a turtle-shaped artificial island that is part of Siheung's marine leisure complex. Popular among both domestic and international visitors, it offers not only surfing, but also diving, water activities, and even caravan accommodations.

The world's largest artificial surfing theme park, Wave Park, kicked off its 2025 Surf Zone season on April 26. The park features Surf Cove — the main surf pool— as well as Surf Village, a land-based training area. It also includes Surf Stage, where various music performances and events are held, and the Land Surfing Zone, where visitors can practice using land surfing boards on solid ground.

Easy and Safe Surfing for Beginners

Wave Park places the highest priority on customer safety. To ensure this, only certified personnel with licenses and certificates from training institutions accredited by the Korean Coast Guard are assigned throughout the park. Lifeguards also undergo intensive in-house training based on scenario simulations to strengthen their emergency response capabilities. In addition, the park operates a 24/7 water treatment system, including filtration and UV-based automatic sterilization, to maintain clean and

safe water quality. Surfing gained widespread attention after being added as an official event in a major international sports competition held in Tokyo in 2020, leading to a rise in public interest. Wave Park offers a group PT (Personal Training) program designed to help beginners develop their surfing skills. Under the close guidance of professional surfer coaches, participants can take lessons tailored to all levels—from beginner to advanced.

In addition, events such as the Siheung Mayor's International Surfing Competition and the WSL (World Surf League) Siheung Korea Open will provide a variety of attractions and experiences for visitors to Geobukseom Island and Wave Park.

How to use Coupang, Korea's top shopping app

oupang is Korea's most beloved shopping app, often referred to as "Amazon in Korea" by Americans. You can find everything from groceries and beauty products to electronics and home essentials. It offers discounts on many products, and more



importantly, most items arrive the next day, sometimes within hours! Try it once, and you'll see why it's part of daily life for millions of Koreans, including myself.

The good news is Coupang now supports English and accepts foreign cards. Your experience may vary, however, depending on whether you have an Alien Registration Card or not. So, here's a guide to help you make the most of Korea's top shopping app. Once you get used to how to use it, Coupang might become your new favorite Korean life hack!

QUICK NOTE: WHAT IS ARC?



HOW TO GET YOUR ARC Alien Registration Card (ARC) is a foreigner's ID used in Korea like a social security number. While SOFA members are not required to obtain one, applying for an ARC can make life significantly easier when using Korean services. Check out the Tip of the Day on how to get your ARC.

USING COUPANG WITHOUT ARC

You might not want to get an ARC due to a short stay in Korea, but you can still use Coupang for fast delivery on thousands of items. Believe me, it's still much more efficient than in-person shopping when it comes to finding good deals. Here's what to expect:

- The app supports English, and foreign credit/debit cards are accepted.
- A minimum order of 19,800 won is required per purchase.
- Features like Rocket Wow, Rocket Fresh and Coupang Play are not available for non-ARC holders.

Tip: If you have Korean friends or coworkers with Rocket Wow, they can always help you out, especially for items that are difficult to find in stores.

THOSE WITH ARC

Once you register your ARC and link to your phone, you can unlock Coupang's full features through a Rocket Wow membership. If you're living off-base or staying longer than a few months, this version of Coupang could truly transform your daily routine.

Rocket Wow membership

This service offers diverse features, including Rocket delivery, discount offers, free return within 30 days, access to a streaming service and free delivery with Coupang Eats, all for a monthly fee of 7,890 won.

WHY COUPANG IS SPECIAL

1. Fast delivery


Coupang is beloved for the lightning-fast delivery. If you're a Rocket Wow member, most items will arrive by the next morning or day. Even without the membership, delivery is still quick, usually within a day or two.

2. Discount offers

I used to browse cosmetics, clothing, and shoes in stores, but now I simply grab my phone. Items are usually 10–30% cheaper on Coupang. After a few price checks, I gave up in-person shopping.


3. Free return policy

Online shopping is convenient, but comparing multiple items can make it hard to choose the right one and returns are costly. With Wow membership, you can return any item, even if it's already open and undamaged, within 30 days.



4. Rocket Fresh

Place a grocery order by midnight and receive the delivery by 7 a.m. the next morning. Even your ice cream stays frozen! In many cases, the grocery items are even fresher than what you'd find at local supermarkets. Also, Rocket Fresh includes hard-to-find items in stores like organic products, protein snacks and sugar-free foods.



5. Coupang Play

Rocket Wow members get free access to Coupang Play, a streaming service with dramas, movies and variety shows, both Korean and global. Many Korean programs include English subtitles, and the platform features many American TV shows, sometimes making it better than Netflix.



6. Coupang Eats

Baemin may be Korea's top food delivery app, but Coupang Eats is quickly gaining ground. With Wow membership, delivery is free and since tipping isn't customary in Korea, you just browse, order and enjoy. Without a Wow membership, delivery fees range from 2,000 to 4,000 won.

7. Reliable customer service

Coupang offers 24/7 customer support and is one of the most trusted platforms in Korea since they are constantly monitoring to reduce delays and flag fake sellers.



4. (Optional) Join Rocket Wow

If you have an ARC and plan to live more like a local, you can consider subscribing to Rocket Wow for a more convenient life.



5. Start shopping!

Browse by category or use the search bar. Foreign cards are accepted for purchase. Enter your address in Korean for better accuracy. If your building has an entry code, make sure to include it in the address details. Once you place an order, it's already on the way!

IF YOU LIVE ON BASE

Coupang and most Korean delivery apps can't deliver directly inside U.S. military bases, so here are a few workarounds to consider:

Convenience store pickup

Many convenience stores like CU, GS25, and 7-Eleven offer pick-up locker services. Just make sure to visit and see if the nearby store supports this service and how it works before selecting it as your delivery address.

Use a friend's off-base address

If you have Korean coworkers or friends who live off base, ask if you can use their address for deliveries. I often help my American friends with this, especially for urgent deliveries.

Fun family beach day only a short drive from Pyeongtaek

s the weather gets hotter, there's nothing like a quick beach getaway close to home. Fortunately, Pyeongtaek is a short drive from Korea's west coast with several beaches to enjoy.

Before heading out, check the tide schedules since the western coast has large tidal ranges and wide mud flats. Due to the location, the water on this side of the peninsula tends to be a little muddy compared to the clear blue waters on the East and South Coasts. However, the West Coast mud flats boast a diverse marine life. At high tide, enjoy water activities, and when the tide recedes, explore the shore for crabs, clams and other sea creatures

Here are seven great beaches to explore with your family near Camp Humphreys and Osan Air Base!

Jebudo Beach (제부도 해수욕장)

Jebudo Beach is a popular choice for beach trips among locals from Seoul and Gyeonggi-do due to its proximity and a variety of facilities including accommodations, restaurants and various recreational activity options. The beach features a unique tidal

road that opens twice a day, allowing visitors to witness the "Miracles of Moses." Check the tide schedule before visiting, as entering the island is only possible via the West Sea Cable Car when the water comes back to close the road. Visitors can explore diverse marine life on mud flats, enjoy swimming, and numerous water sports such as fishing, surfing, kayaking and jet skiing.

Gungpyeong-ri Beach (궁평리 해수욕장)

Similar to Jebudo, Gungpyeong-ri Beach offers visitors the opportunity to explore tidal flats and enjoy fishing during low tide, while high tide is ideal for swimming. It's closer to Pyeongtaek and more peaceful compared to Jebudo. The beach is also popular for camping and car picnics, allowing visitors to stay overnight in their cars or tents.

Designated camping areas charge about 10,000 won and there are also free spots available for camping. As there are limited facilities close to the beach, it's recommended to bring your own food or visit Gungpyeong Port nearby for stores, ocean-view cafés, and rentals for fishing and mud flat experiences.

Waemok Village Beach (왜목마을 해수욕장)

Waemok Village Beach, located at the northern tip of the Taean Peninsula in Dangjin City, offers stunning skies including sunsets, sunrises and moonrises. The beautiful beach is ideal for swimming, rock fishing, and exploring tidal flats.

Camping is allowed, and nearby facilities provide convenient access to accommodations, fishing gear rentals, restaurants, stores and changing rooms.

Manripo Beach (만리포 해수욕장)

Manripo Beach, located on the western side of Taean Peninsula, is known as one of the three major beaches on the west coast along with Daecheon Beach and Byeonsan Beach. It offers great opportunities for swimming, surfing and sand play, as well as

diverse water sports. During low tide, visitors can explore the muddy sand to discover clams and other sea creatures. Manripo features a variety of convenient facilities, accommodations and recreational options, making it a fun destination for family vacations.

Padori Beach (파도리 해수욕장)

Padori Beach takes its name from the Korean word "pado" which means wave in English. The charming pebble beach is renowned for clear, shallow waters and beautiful waves that make soothing sounds over the small stones. Padori is truly a quiet retreat. The water is

> very clear and beautiful, making swimming very enjoyable. However, the beach can be rocky, so it's wise to bring water shoes. Also, it's a great spot for catching crabs and other sea creatures during

> There is a stunning sea cave, famous as one of Taean's best photography spots. Accessible only during low tide, it's recommended to check the tide schedule. Due to its proximity to Manripo Beach, one of Taean's most famous beaches, many visitors to Manripo also stop by Padori to capture photos of the sea cave.



Do note that this beach belongs to the Taean Coastal National Park, so collecting pebbles and bringing pets are prohibited.

Tips for your West Sea beach getaway!



- What to bring: Bring a small shovel, hoe or basket for collecting clams, or get creative! I usually bring a butterfly net for shrimp, gloves and kitchen tongs to catch crabs. A headlamp is essential if you're exploring at night since many sea creatures are nocturnal. Be sure to track the tide times and avoid venturing too far as the water returns quickly.
- What to catch: Clams are easy to find year-round while crabs, octopuses and other marine creatures appear depending on the season. The best time for mud flat exploration is between May and September. Note that some beaches may have seasonal restrictions on catching live creatures, so check for signage at the site.
- Check tide times: The website offers tide times but make sure to use the Chrome browser for English translation.



- Picnic rules: Regulations at the beach can vary depending on location and season. Some beaches may allow picnics with prepared food but prohibit cooking. Picnic mats are permitted, and tents are usually allowed during the day but may need to be removed at night.
- Camping rules: While many beaches allow daytime tent pitching, overnight camping rules can vary. Look for designated camping zones near the beach that permit cooking and tent setup, which may require a fee. Some open fields allow car camping and cooking without fees, but some restrictions may apply such as only allowing cooking and sleeping in vehicles
- Pet rules: Unless specifically prohibited, accompanying pets are usually not a big issue at most beaches. However, during peak season (July-Aug.), there may be restrictions on dogs swimming. Note that national parks in Korea don't allow pets, and Taean Peninsula on the West Coast has a designated coastal national park, so most beaches at Taean ban pet entry only except Manripo, Kkotji, Galeumi and Kkujinamugol beaches.

Kkotji Beach (꽃지 해수욕장)

Kkotji Beach is the largest beach on Anmyeondo in Taean, and is known for captivating sunsets over Grandma Rock and Grandpa Rock, iconic natural symbols in Taean Peninsula. Stroll along the soft sandy beach, view the beautiful scenery and enjoy playing in the

sand and water. The beach is also famous for crabbing, clam digging and collecting various shellfish in the tidal flats. The beach features many convenient facilities, including accommodations, restaurants, stores and recreational facilities. Close to Kkotji Beach, there is Kkotji Coastal Park, a free theme park open year-round with seasonal gardens, picnic areas, camping grounds and cooking facilities.

Mongsanpo Beach (몽산포 해수욕장)

Mongsanpo Beach in Taean is a family favorite known for plenty of opportunities to collect sea creatures. During low tide, the beach becomes a natural playground where anyone

can easily dig for clams and a variety of sea creatures. Mongsanpo's soft sands make it easy and safe to explore and enjoy swimming with gentle waves. It's also a famous camping spot with many campgrounds around. Campers can enjoy BBQ right by the water or relax under the

pine trees. Just don't forget to bring your own gear and supplies as there are no large markets around. Within a 10 minute drive, visitors can also stop by Mongdae Port for a

tum, a beloved fall destination for seasonal blooms.

Daecheon Beach (대천 해수욕장)

Daecheon Beach is one of the most famous beaches on the West Coast. Known for its wide, blue sea and fine sand, it's perfect for swimming and sand play with children as there are no tide flats. The beach is popular for families and young adults. This is where the famous annual Boryeong Mud Festival is held for two weeks in late July to early August.

Daecheon has plenty of accommodations, cafes, restaurants and leisure activities like ziplining and sky rail bikes. The beach is also pet-friendly.

More importantly, the beach is easily accessible

by train, making it convenient for travelers without a car. Dae-

Korea Tourism Organization cheon Station can be reached in less than two hours from Pyeongtaek Station via the Mugunghwa or Saemaeul trains. From Daecheon Station, Daecheon Beach is a 30-minute bus ride or a 10-minute taxi ride away.



Sinduri Beach (신두리 해수욕장)

For those seeking both beach fun and a quiet escape, Sinduri Beach is a hidden gem. It features soft sand, clean water and marine life in mudflats, perfect for families with young kids. This beach is less crowded than others and many visit to enjoy peaceful sunset views. Nearby camping areas make it a great spot for overnight

stays. What makes this beach truly unique is the Sinduri Coastal Sand Dune, Korea's only sand dune formed after the Ice Age. The sand dunes are a protected area, but visitors can enjoy beautiful trails and stunning views.

Hakampo Beach (학암포 해수욕장)

If you're looking for clean water, sunset views, fewer crowds and fishing, you'll love Hakampo Beach. Hakampo's water is surprisingly clear, often compared to the East Sea. Visitors enjoy swimming, fishing and even snorkeling and during low tide, it's great for spotting marine life. Just make sure to bring your aqua shoes since the beach is rocky. This beach is also popular for glamping, sleepovers at rental camping cars, offering beautiful ocean views.

If you're also keen to take some great photos, you can try the sunset with the backdrop of a beach, by the pier with city lights and the Diamond Bridge, and also by a popular film set spot where a famous TV show called 'Dream' was filmed.

Here are four recommended places around Busan to check out this summer.

Dadaepo Beach

Located at the estuary of the Nakdonggang River and just eight kilometers from downtown, Dadaepo Beach is a great place to chill out and have a picnic, collect a few seashells, and go for a swim in the shallow surf. Just up the river is one of the best places in Korea to check out migratory birds chilling in the marshes. At just under a kilometer

long, it is beautiful but little known to foreigners because of how far away it is from the city center.

TO GET THERE: Take bus number 2 or 98 from Busan Station or get off the subway at Sinpyeong



The Bay 101

Located in Haeundae, The Bay 101 has become one of the spots in the city to enjoy the cool breeze and marvel at the spectacular night view of Marine City.

Enjoy some fish and chips, sip on a coffee or beer, and take a late-night stroll at the nearby Dongbaek Island Park.

TO GET THERE: Take Subway line 2 to Dongbaek Station, exit 1. You can walk straight to the main road for about 10 minutes and it is across the street from the Westin Chosun Hotel.



Gamcheon Cultural Village

This Village, which was the site of residence of the refugees during the Korean War, began to call attention when the students of Dong-A University drew murals in the Village as a part of their voluntary service activities in 2008. Busan City and Saha-gu began to imbue a breath of life into the Village by installing works of art and drawing murals in the intricately intertwined narrow alleyways in 2009. Village art projects, contents convergence type tourism cooperation projects, and hillside and mountainside Renaissance projects were executed.

Photograph and graffiti galleries, smallscale museums, Haneul Maru, House of Darkness (for observation of the constellation), cafés and restaurants, and alleyway tourist information booths were installed in the houses that were not occupied.

TO GET THERE: Take Subway Line 1 to Toseong Station, exit 6. At the intersection, turn right at the corner and walk straight to the hospital bus stop and take either Bus 2 or 2-2.



Chooksung Cathedral

Located in Gijang amongst the blue seas and coastal rocks, this building stands out amongst the coastal fishing village nearby.

Though it is actually not a religious facility, this cathedral was used as the filming set for the popular Korean drama 'Dream' in 2009 which starred Ju Jin-mo, Kim Bum, and Son Dam-bi.

It has become a popular photograph site for couples and weddings due to its unique location though the structure has raised controversy over the years as being 'illegal' by locals.

TO GET THERE: Take bus 1003 to Gijang Simya by the Gijang Catholic Church and transfer to local bus 6 to the end of the line. It may be easier to take a taxi and say "죽성성당드림세트장"

What is Korean temple food?

Temple food is a culinary tradition handed down through Buddhist temples, embodying the spirit of Buddhism. In keeping with the Buddhist precept of non-violence, it excludes animal-based ingredients (except dairy) and avoids the five pungent vegetables—known as "oshinchae" (green onions, garlic, chives, wild chives, and Chinese squill)—as they are believed to interfere with spiritual practice. Another notable feature is that it is both healthy and gentle on the body, as it is seasoned not with artificial additives but with natural ingredients such as mushrooms, kelp, and perilla seeds. Although temple cuisine varies across Buddhist cultural spheres, Korean temple food is particularly distinctive for its use of fermented ingredients and locally sourced produce.

Where and how can you try temple food?

Once reserved primarily for monks as part of their spiritual practice, temple food was not easily accessible to the general public. However, as temple cuisine has continued to earn public interest and recognition as a distinct culinary tradition, a variety of ways and places to experience its charm have emerged in recent years.

1) Visit a temple food restaurant



■ Balwoo Gongyang, Seoul

Balwoo Gongyang is a temple cuisine restaurant operated by the Jogye Order of Korean Buddhism, the largest Buddhist denomination in Korea. With temple cuisine master Venerable Dae An having served as its head, the restaurant is known for offering deeply authentic

temple food. The four signature courses—Seon (Meditation), Won (Vow), Maeum (Mind), and Hee (Joy)—are inspired by the path to enlightenment and feature an abundant variety of clean, healthy dishes that highlight



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
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hinmiyangyo in 1871, known as "U.S. Expedition to Korea," was the first and only U.S. invasion of Korea. In 1866, the American ship General Sherman attacked Korea (Joseon) to demand trade and Joseon forces responded by setting the ship on fire. Five years later, U.S. warships attacked Korea to forcibly open trade in retaliation. Despite strong resistance, Korea suffered a devastating defeat due to the U.S. military's superior firepower, resulting in over 240 Joseon forces killed and around 100 drowning by suicide while only three U.S. casualties occurred. Though the U.S. won the war, they failed to open Korea to trade. Korea believed it as a victory of resistance, maintaining the policy of isolation which delayed its modernization and, in the end, left Korea vulnerable to Japan's imperial ambitions.








