

Train travel made easy with useful app

ublic transportation in Korea is abundant and on the cheap side when you are looking to get off



base and explore. Of course, there is always the language barrier. But don't worry, if you are traveling on the train, there is a handy mobile app that will help you navigate the rail system in English.

KorailTalk is used by many foreigners, so you should give it a try. Just type in "Korail" in the app store and KorailTalk will pop up. Set the app to English and off you go. You can book a ticket on the app and just show your reservation info from the phone if the train employee asks for your tickets.

If you are not into apps, here's a helpful






- 1. Type a 'Korail' in the app store search bar and install it.

ifteen local spots in Busan, Ulsan, and South Gyeongsang Province made the list for recommended places for Koreans and tourists to visit this year.

Gamcheon Culture Village, Busan -The site of the residence of refugees during the Korean War began to call attention when the students of Dong-A University drew murals in the Village as a part of their voluntary service activities in 2008 which has now become bustling with cafes and small museums.

Taehwagang Bamboo Forest, **Ulsan** – Only an hour out of Busan, the stunning scenery of the ecological park alongside the Taehwa River is a perfect place to take a respite in the city as well as a destination for those in need of nature's healing hands.

> Hapcheon Haeinsa, Gayasan **National Park, South Gyeongsang** Province - Located on Gayasan, Haeinsa Temple is home to the famed Tripitaka Koreana, the most complete collection of Buddhist texts, which was engraved on 80,000 woodblocks between 1237 and 1248.

Marine City, Busan - The first time to make the recommended list, spectacular day and night views, massive high rise buildings and fine dining are what make a worthwhile trip just down the road from Haeundae beach.



Tongyeong Skyline Luge, Tongyeong – Skyline Luge Tongyeong sits directly below the Hallyeosudo Cable Car which takes visitors to Mt Mireuksan and offers stunning views across Tongyeong City, the sea and surrounding islands.

Songdo Beach, Busan - Songdo's revitalization continues, and a visit on the cable car to see the views of the western part of the city are a definite must.

Plunge into the deep

S cuba diving in an indoor pool might sound boring. There are no tropical fish or coral reefs to admire below the surface, only tiled flooring. But before you swear off indoor diving, consider a dive into Gapyeong's K-26 pool— the deepest in Asia.

Ranking in at around 26 meters deep (the second deepest is in Taiwan at 21 meters), K-26 challenges experienced divers and first-timers alike. It is a great spot to practice freediving and scuba diving without having to deal with freezing cold weather outside. The temperature of the pool's clean water is maintained at 29 degrees Celsius year-round, making it a cozy experience.

As an ideal training spot for any level of diver, the pool increases gradually in depth from around the 1.3-meter mark, up to the 2.5-meter, 5-meter, 10-meter mark until finally opening up to the 26-meter depth. Inexperienced divers are only allowed up to the 10-meter mark, but the facility offers certification lessons to build up to the max depth.

From the outside, the modern, grey recreational building hides the 26-meter-deep marvel it houses inside. However, as soon as I entered the front, two enormous windows gave me a view of the clear blue water and divers immersed deep inside. I couldn't wait to dive in!

Diving right in

I filled out paperwork at the reservation desk and then received a short safety and basic diving skills lesson. I chose the Diving Experience program (120,000 won or \$102.78 including equipment), which doesn't require prior certification or for you to be an experienced diver to try it out.

During this course, participants learn diving physiology, proper equipment use and scuba hand signs inside a small classroom on the second floor with knowledgeable PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors)-certified instructors. The hand signals are essential to learn as they help avoid miscommunication during risky situations that may come up underwater. Unfortunately, this course is taught in Korean, so you'll need to have a



guide or friend who can translate for you.

After the short lesson, I walked up to the third floor where the deck of the pool sits. The closer I got, the faster my heart started to beat. Excitement and, I admit, slight fear swept over me. I stretched and hastily slipped into my skin-tight wetsuit to learn basic diving skills and techniques in the 1.3-meter-deep area of the pool.

The 1.3-meter-deep area of the pool was safe enough for me, but I needed to bend my knees in the water to get fully underwater. In this portion of the program I learned essential skills for diving safely, clearing my mask if water got in, purging water from the regulator, recovering the regulator if it fell, controlling buoyancy and equalizing my ears to re-balance the water pressure. At first, breathing from my mouth instead of my nose was a challenge, which led me to breathe in water many times during

the practice session, a concern

Overcoming fear

Soon, the thrill I felt at the beginning was overshadowed by more fear. My instructor Park, Jaejun could sense it and read it on my face. "You look very nervous, never hold your breath, just breathe through your mouth slowly - inhale and exhale deeply, but comfortably," he advised.

The first dive on the deepest end is the same height as a 10-story building. "What if something bad happens to me," I thought to myself. Having an instructor to guide me through it helped me push those fearful thoughts away.

"It's going to be a wonderful experience. I think you're going to make it," Park, reassured me. "Just do it!" I screamed at myself and sank into the water as Park gve me the thumbs-down hand signal, which means "go down" underwater.

Participants are allowed to explore the pool and try different depths at their own pace. My instructor checked on me at every depth and he

encouraged me to g pace.

Say good-bye to hunger pangs at Geumgang makguksu

s anyone who has ever spent a few hours swimming will know, the hunger pangs experienced after can be intense! To appease my hunger, I headed to the closest restaurant serving up dak galbi, or spicy stir-fried chicken that is a must-eat local dish in the Gapyeong and Chuncheon area.

Based on a quick search, my phone led me to the Gapyeong's famous Seorak Makguksu Chuncheon Dakgalbi restau-

rant. Much like the diving pool won't allow solo divers, Seorak Makguksu Chuncheon Dakgalbi also doesn't serve solo diners like me.

The reason is that for their dishes, the staff heats up a tabletop grill, which is a lot of work for only one person and one entrée.

You can, instead, opt to take out some of their famous chicken, but it is a two-order minimum.

I was disappointed that I would have to remove the mouth-watering dak galbi I had put on my wish list for this trip. But, to make up for it, I headed to try a different local specialty – makguksu, or buckwheat noodles. This is a specialty of Gangwon Province, which Gapyeong shares a border with.

For this dish, I drove about 20 minutes from the K-26 to Geumgang Makguksu, a restaurant housed in a traditional home

which serves as a good example of northeastern Korea's early architectural style. Tucked away on a country town road and surrounded by mountains,

the restaurant's courtyard is enclosed to keep out the winter chill.

Many dak galbi restaurants

also have makguksu on their menu, but normally the star of the show in their eateries is the spicy stir-fried chicken. Geumgang Makguksu's focus, on the other hand, is firmly on the buckwheat noodles.

I ordered makguksu and buckwheat pancakes (Korean Memil Jeon), both for 7,000 won each (or about \$6.08). Before my order arrived, I was served a bowl of hot beef broth which soothed my empty stomach and warmed my body.

A sign on the wall demonstrated a "delicious way to eat makguksu" involving adding vinegar, mustard and shredded radish to the cold chicken broth.

I decided to follow the gentle suggestion of the sign when my meal arrived. Makguksu has always been a favorite of mine and this eatery's offering did not disappoint.

In addition, the homemade kimchi that came with my order wasn't overpowering or too salty. The buckwheat pancake had a light taste and an unforgettable mugwort scent. I recommend you pair the pancake with makgeolli, if you have a designated driver.

Get your caffeine fix at 9 BLOCK

ocated in the Stay HEAL-ING PARK, the 9 BLOCK café is known in the neighborhood for its high-quality coffee. While many tourists use this spot as a caffeine fix break, the park is also home to a spa, swimming pool, bakery, fitness center, art gallery, and therapy room. There is also a nice strolling path around the building.

Though there were many customers in the café when I visited, the spacious location, music, lighting, and artwork combine to create a comforting atmosphere. While there, I made a stop at the bakery for some of their naturally fermented bread but all of they were sold out, so plan ahead if you're interested in the special baked goods served here.

Though I knew this place is known for their coffee, I opted against

a caffeine jolt and ordered the lemon tea. I settled into a comfy seat and waited for the cozy tea. At first sip, the lemon tea was disappointing. The hot tea was only lukewarm and because of this the tea powder had not melted and was instead floating at the top. That's what I get for ordering a tea at a coffee joint, I suppose.

But, don't let my mistake discourage you from making a stop at 9 BLOCK. The café area is nice and is a good place for a break during your travels solo or with your family and friends.

A sense of accomplishment

Once above the surface and from the safety of the deck, I felt a sense of accomplishment. I made my first dive and once again overcame my old phobia of nearly-drowning as a child. I felt comfortable using my regulator to breathe and the worry I had about breathing in water through my nose was no longer an issue.

This experience has inspired me to try to get my scuba certification at K-26. The pool offers PADI-based scuba diving and freediving certification for open-water and professional diving, which is recognized globally. The license sessions split into a few days, allowing you to master the basic diving skills that will enable you to safely embark on all your future diving adventures.

The lessons are probably not as expensive as building your own dive pool, but they're not cheap either. The courses start at around 700,000-800,000 won and are only taught in Korean. If you're interested in English-friendly certification courses, Aquatic Frontier Korea in Suwon offers those classes.

If you're already certified, get to K-26 and get some practice in. Solo dives at K-26 are prohibited and all divers are required to have a certified buddy with you. If you're an open water diver, then your dive buddy must have a higher experience level.

I'm already looking forward to getting my certification, going beyond the pool and exploring the open sea!





What are those 'big marshmallows' on the farms around Camp Humphreys?

eading out on the roads of Pyeongtaek, home to Camp Humphreys, you may have stumbled by an unfamiliar sight. There, scattered on some of the surrounding farms, objects resembling giant marshmallows sit in fields of grass.

Pyeongtaek's name means "plain with lots of swamps," so like its name there are many farms in the area— and many of these field marshmallows.

Though they look like marshmallow, they are obviously not the soft and sweet confection used for s'mores or Rice Krispies Treat.

If you've grown up in a rural area in

the States, you may already know what these field marshmallows are really.

Bale Silage are what these large white round objects are actually called. These serve as alternative silage tanks, weigh around 500 kg and are about one meter in diameter. Bale silage holds fodder for livestock made of harvested rice straw.

If you look closely at the silage, it is covered by plastic wrap to keep it at a certain moisture level for ideal fermentation. When the winter is over, wellfermented rice straw is fed to the cattle.

So next time you're driving by one of these, you'll know those aren't giant marshmallows for humans, they're giant marshmallows for cattle!
