

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

JULY 4 - JULY 17, 2024 Ukinju Hainju Camagusuku Castle Ruins

> Just a five-minute drive away from Itokazu Castle Ruins is another historic site that is well worth a visit. Legend has it that this castle was built by Amamikyo, a god who created Okinawa. It is one of the sacred sites for Agari Umaai, a traditional pilgrimage to the places where Amamikyo is thought to have lived.

The biggest feature of this historical site is its limestone arch sitting at the top. The narrow structure was hand carved and only allows one person through at a time. According to Nanjo City, its narrowness functioned to prevent enemies from coming inside. The top of the castle boasts an altitude as high as 180 meters, offering a good spot for a photo op.

Every January in the lunar calendar, a famous traditional ceremony is held here to pray for a rich harvest. The rest of the year, however, this is a quiet place to reflect and enjoy the stillness which had a soothing and lulling effect on me.

#### Café The Palm

As I was on my way back home, I stumbled upon Café The Palm, a new establishment on a hill overlooking the south-

This hidden gem in a brown cottage is nestled in the lush greenery. Inside, it felt more like a resort villa in a tropical location thanks to the view of the forest through the large windows.

Café The Palm's menu ranges from Indian dishes to Western dishes. But, after learning that the café's chef, Kathait Hukamushign, Jagbir worked in a five-star hotel in India, I decided to try the butter chicken curry from the eight options available on the menu.

The meal set (1,800 yen) included soup and salad, which I enjoyed. For a drink that came with the set, I chose lassi. The soup had a taste of chicken broth as its base, but it was also mixed with vegetable flavors and spiciness. The savory taste of the soup was intriguing. It took me just a few minutes to finish it.

When my order was brought to the table, I was instantly hooked by the aroma of the curry sauce and naan. As I chose level 1 for spiciness, the sauce didn't burn my tongue. Still, its savory taste felt great. The naan was humongous, so I was not sure if I could finish it myself. But once I took a bite, I realized that

the fresh-outof-oven dough was hard to resist. It took me just about five minutes to eat it all. I can say for sure that the butter chicken curry was one of best I

have had in my life. Enjoying the authen-

tic and delicious curry while taking in the beautiful view of the Okinawan forest made my day.

After my hearty meal, I took a walk in the forest adjacent to the café. This area is considered a place of worship, so the trails and footpaths were wellmaintained and provided a nice place to walk off my full stomach and relax a little before heading home.

# Uishing on two lovers legend

ne of the most romantic and traditional festivals, Tanabata, also known as the Star Festival, is celebrated every year on the seventh day of the seventh month.

The Star Festival originated from the Chinese legend of two stars, Vega and Altair - lovers who were separated by the Milky Way and allowed to meet only once a year on July 7.

The legend of Star Festival in Japan varies according to the region, and one that I was told in my childhood goes like this:

Vega (a weaver and princess called Orihime in Japanese) was a beautiful daughter of King of the Sky. She always weaved celestial cloth for her father by the bank of the Milky Way. There was also a young herdsman named Altair (called Hikoboshi

in Japanese). One day, the herdsman visited the princess Japanese tie fancy slips of colored when she was working with her loom and they fell in love

at first sight. As Vega met her lover more and more frequently, she began weaving less and less. The king, who was suspicious about his daughter's change, finally saw her meeting with the herdsman. In anger, the king separated the two lovers across the Milky Way and forbade them to meet again. The princess became so desperate and continued weeping until her father finally allowed her to meet with the herdsman once a year on the seventh day of the seventh month.

So, if you look up into the evening sky on July 7 and it is clear, you can see the two stars reunited. But if it is rainy or cloudy, know that they will try to meet again next year.

As part of the Tanabata celebration,


paper - blue, red, violet or yellow and white - called tanzaku on bamboo branches. We write our wish on one of the papers and tie it to the bamboo branch, which is also decorated with shiny, metallic decorations, just like a Christmas tree. According to my mother, girls back in the day used to wish that their weaving and sewing skills would

improve, like the weaver princess. However, as weaver princess eventually became a guardian of arts in general, many children today wish improve their skills in handwriting, drawing or singing.

Shopping districts throughout the nation are decorated with colorful bamboo branches. Tanabata is not a national holiday but is a tradition observed by Japanese families. Some regions celebrate this festival on July 7 in accordance with the old lunar calendar, which is
