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SERVICES IN NORTHERN ITALY

BANKING

Getting an Italian account with an International Bank Account Number (IBAN) is necessary for paying bills and transferring money. It is also helpful for making purchases, getting cash and managing funds between dollars and euros. Note that the DoD will not deposit paychecks into Italian banks.

USING DEBIT CARDS

- Chip and Pin cards are the norm throughout Europe.
- Smaller Italian businesses may not take credit cards.
- Always carry euros when off-installation.
- Some U.S. banks charge international transaction fees when using debit cards, so check with your bank.

MOBILE BANKS

Online banks are a great tool to get local bills paid and often offer competitive exchange rates and low fees. They have international banking apps that allow you to create a European account with an IBAN so it is possible to pay rent or bills in euros.

- **Wise:** Wise safeguards customers' funds to make sure they're always available whenever they're needed and offers simple to use web and app access to money. www.wise.com
- **N26:** N26 is a 100 percent mobile, fully licensed bank, which provides the same level of security and regulations as traditional banks. Their European banking license protects your funds up to €100,000 by the German Deposit Protection Scheme. www.n26.com

PAYING BILLS

Italian bill paying is different than in the U.S. There are three methods you can use.

- **Pay in cash.** Bring your bill and cash payment to a tobacco store (Tabaccheria) or bank teller. Expect a small fee.
- **Online bank transfer.** Set up a payee account with an IBAN number via your local Italian bank or European online bank.
 - ✓ Verify the euro amount and date for payment.
 - ✓ Include your account number (codice cliente) and bill number (numero Fattura).
- **Online via the billing company's website.** This can be done with an Italian-issued credit card, or an IBAN.

EXCHANGE RATES

- Off-installation ATMs (bancomat) may have transaction fees, but usually have better exchange rates.
- Check conversion rates before transferring large amounts between U.S. and euro accounts.

LEGAL

Your installation Legal Office can help with simple notaries and powers of attorney on a walk-in basis. Complex notary services and other legal advice is available by appointment.


- Powers of Attorney are recommended for spouses so they may handle paperwork if the military sponsor is not available due to training or deployment.
- Dependents wanting to work while overseas should discuss SOFA regulations with the legal office.
- A tax center is available during the tax season.
- Other legal services offered include wills, medical directives, Servicemembers Civil Relief Act (SCRA) issues, estate planning, immigration, debt or credit problems, identity theft, divorce counseling and Italian legal issues.

ITALIAN PROVIDERS

Most people prefer using either a pay-as-you-go service or pre-paid plan with a local provider in Italy. Both allow you to purchase a European SIM card that includes a large amount of data to use within a single month. You can then set up automatic monthly payments with a web account, or add data as needed online, and at grocery and convenience stores.

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TRANSPORTATION IN NORTHERN ITALY >>

DRIVER'S LICENSES

AVIANO AIR BASE REQUIRES AN AFI LICENSE FOR ALL DRIVERS.

The Allied Forces in Italy (AFI) license is only valid in Italy. Obtain an International Driving Permit (IDP) for trips outside of Italy.

- The active-duty sponsor must be issued their AFI license before dependents may apply.
- All drivers must be 18 years old or older.
- Download study material from 31fs.com/driving-overseas.
- Complete the online test. It has 100 questions, and you may only miss 10 to pass.
- Submit application online.

USAG ITALY REQUIRES A SETAF LICENSE FOR ALL DRIVERS.

The Southern European Task Force (SETAF) license is only valid in NATO countries, though not all recognize it. An International Driving Permit (IDP) or Italian driver's license is recommended for trips outside of Italy.

- Drivers must be 18 years old or older.

You have the option to take the SETAF course and exam in person or online.

- In person: Take the driver's orientation class at the Central Processing facility, take the SETAF license test and submit documentation at the Driver's Testing Office.
- Online: Register at jko.jten.mil, take the USA-007 U.S. Forces Driver's Training Program for Europe course and pass exam, print both pre-course and final exam certificates and submit with documentation at the Driver's Testing Office.

Required documents:

- ✓ AEF 1901T
- ✓ Current U.S. driver's license
- ✓ Military ID
- ✓ Copy of Orders
- ✓ SETAF course certificate

INTERNATIONAL DRIVING PERMIT (IDP)

To drive outside of Italy, it is recommended that you obtain a yearly IDP from www.aaa.com/vacation/idpf.html for \$20.

ITALIAN DRIVER'S LICENSE

It is possible to get an Italian driver's license which is valid for five to ten years, depending on your age. This license will allow you to drive in any European country. These cost roughly 270 euros and requires an application, a SETAF/AFI license, a Codice Fiscale and copy of your passport. Visit the Driver's Testing Office for applications and details.

MOTORCYCLES

If you want to ride a motorcycle while in Italy, you must have a motorcycle classification on your U.S. license, have an AFI/SETAF license, attend a motorcycle safety course or have an approved rider course card. Motorcyclists can only operate a motorcycle of 35 kW or less.

VEHICLE REGISTRATION

AVIANO

At Aviano, vehicles must be registered at the 31st Security Forces Squadron AMVRO before the vehicle can be picked up from the Vehicle Processing Center (VPC).

Steps for registering and picking up a shipped vehicle at Aviano:

1. Receive the vehicle arrival email from VPC. Complete the attached 302 customs form. Receive an email with a cover plate assignment.
2. Set up insurance.
3. Complete registration online or make a reservation to complete it in person.
Required paperwork:
 - ✓ PCS orders / Logistical Support Letter (DOD civilians) / DOCPers (contractors)
 - ✓ CAC or Dependent ID
 - ✓ U.S. driver's license
 - ✓ AFI driver's license
 - ✓ Five euros in cash
 - ✓ Proof of insurance (with VIN, policy number and dates)
4. Receive a registration completion email. Pick up vehicle registration and plates.
5. Go to the VPC to install plates and pick up the vehicle. Bring safety equipment to place in the car (orange vest, triangle and first aid kit).
6. Safety inspection at VPC.
7. Submit safety inspection at the registration office and receive fuel card authorization to take to AAFES for Fuel Card (primary vehicle only).

USAG ITALY

- **Camp Darby:** The vehicle registration office in building 113. Vehicles are picked up at the Livorno VPC.
- **Vicenza:** Vehicles are registered and picked up at the VPC in Torri di Quartesolo. A shuttle bus is available to the VPC.

USAG Italy (Camp Darby and Vicenza) steps for registering and picking up your vehicle:

1. Receive the arrival email from VPC.
2. Register the vehicle. Required paperwork:
 - ✓ Military ID
 - ✓ SETAF driver's license
 - ✓ U.S. driver's license
 - ✓ Proof of ownership (title)
 - ✓ Shipping document
 - ✓ PCS orders, DOCPers (contractors), Logistical support letter (DOD civilians)
 - ✓ Cash for registration fees
 - ✓ Power of Attorney, if needed
3. Get a license plate number.
4. Set up and print proof of insurance.
5. Pick up registration and plates at the office. Bring proof of insurance and all other documentation.
6. Vehicle Inspection at the VPC.
7. Install License plate (best to bring tools to the VPC).
8. Vehicle Safety Inspection. Bring all paperwork and required vehicle safety items: orange vest, warning triangle and first aid kit.
9. Submit the inspection form to registration office and get fuel coupon to take to AAFES for Fuel Card (one vehicle only).

VEHICLE INSPECTION

AVIANO

Vehicles assigned to Aviano require an annual inspection if the manufacture date is less than five years old.


Things to double-check before an inspection:

- Vehicle registration is valid.
- Safety equipment is in the vehicle: First-aid kit, warning triangle and reflective vest.
- Lights are all in working order.
- Tires are not excessively worn. During winter, all-season or M+S tires must be used.
- Brake pads are not worn.
- Windshield is not cracked.
- Vehicle body is not missing parts.

USAG ITALY:

All vehicles assigned to USAG Italy are required to be inspected and registered annually.

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BUYING A CAR

You have the option to buy a new or used car from dealers and private sellers in Italy. There is no tax when buying a vehicle from another military member.

- Any vehicle that doesn't have U.S. specifications (specs) cannot be shipped to the U.S.
- Used automatic transmission vehicles may be difficult to find.
- Get approval through a bona fide financial institution if financing a vehicle.

FUEL CARDS

NATO Forces Fuel Cards are only available to be used with one primary vehicle. The cards exclude Italian taxes, which saves roughly 40 percent of fuel costs.

NATO FORCES FUEL CARD

The vehicle's engine size, engine base, horsepower and fuel requirements determine the monthly fuel allowance. After registering your vehicle, you will receive fuel card approval. Take this to your local AAFES to get your Fuel Card.

► Where to get gas

- There are no gas stations on U.S. military installations in Italy.
- Two Italian gas station companies will accept your fuel card: AGIP and ENI.
- Use your fuel card like a debit card at the pump. At some stations, attendants will operate the card machines.
- Fill up at "Fai da te" or "Iperself" pumps to avoid paying extra for full service.

► Italian Fuel Terminology

- "Benzina" - Unleaded gas
- "Gasolio" - Diesel
- "Fai da Te" - Self-service station
- "Servito" - Full-service station
- Blue pump - Diesel+
- Green pump - Super unleaded gas (95 Octane)
- Yellow pump - Super-S (98) or Super+ (100)

DRIVING IN ITALY

- Winter tires (M+S/All Weather) are required from Nov. 15 to Apr. 15.
- Italians do not consider it rude to tailgate.
- Horns are used excessively, so it is difficult to determine who they are intended for. Try to notice what is happening and ignore the extra beeping.
- Hazard lights are used to indicate that traffic is slow, and attention is needed.
- Turning right on red is illegal unless marked.
- The Italian law allows you to overtake traffic to pass on the left only.
- Some intersections have no stop lights, stop signs or traffic control. In this situation, the vehicle on the right has the right of way.
- Traffic circles or roundabouts are common. When entering a circle, yield to traffic already driving (from the left) in the circle.
- Drunk driving is an extremely serious offense in Italy. In Italy, a blood alcohol level of 0.05 is positive proof of drunk driving. If you are under the age of 21 or have been a licensed driver for less than three years, the legal limit for alcohol in your system while driving in Italy is 0.00. ■





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

HOUSING IN NORTHERN ITALY

There is plenty of variety when it comes to housing in Italy. Whether you end up living on-installation or find a house locally, it will be exciting to settle into your new home.

ON-BASE HOUSING

AVIANO

There is no government housing for accompanied personnel on base at Aviano. You will receive an extensive Housing Brochure at the Wyvern Welcome that outlines the steps that must be taken to secure a rental home. Spouses are also welcome at the briefing.

Unaccompanied airmen E-1 to E-3, and E-4 with less than three years of service will be assigned to an on-base dormitory at the UH Campus near the flight line in area F.

Key and essential personnel have access to governmentally leased housing that is within 15 minutes of the base.

USAG ITALY—CAMP DARBY

You will meet with Housing representatives during mandatory In-Processing. There is no family housing on Camp Darby, however, government-leased homes will be offered. Barracks are available for single soldiers.

If no government-leased housing is vacant, you must secure a private housing rental. Lists of approved homes are available at the Housing office.

USAG ITALY—VICENZA

You will receive a *Housing Day 1 Briefing*. Spouses are welcome to attend. Additionally, soldiers meet with a Housing representative at the Central Processing Facility (CPF), Building 393 to determine eligibility.

► Family Housing

Government family housing is available on-post in the Villaggio Della Pace community. The community includes the DoDEA schools, child development center, youth centers and a shoppette. You will not receive an Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA) if you are assigned on-base family housing.

► Government-leased Housing

Government-leased homes are typically entire apartment buildings or multi-home units leased by the U.S. government. The housing office is responsible for assigning homes to incoming families. The government pays for rent, utilities and maintenance, much like traditional on-post housing. You will not receive an Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA) if you are assigned government-leased housing.

If no family or government-leased housing is available, you will need to seek a rental home off-base.

OFF-BASE HOUSING

Many newcomers to Northern Italy find private housing in the local community. Homes must be assessed and approved for use by your installation Housing Office before you sign a lease. If you lease a private house, you will be responsible for paying rent and utilities and are expected to provide basic maintenance. You will receive an Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA) to defray these housing costs

FINDING A HOME

- Search for available and approved rentals at www.homes.mil. Houses come and go quickly, so check the site daily.
- You may choose to use a realtor; however, you are responsible for realtor fees (usually one month's rent and 22 percent tax), and the Housing Office will need to approve your final choice.

VIEWING A HOME

Aviano

Arrange to view a home by using the contact information in the house listing on homes.mil. If you do not have a vehicle, your sponsor should assist in transporting you to house viewings. All units must be inspected by a housing specialist before the approved Rental Agreement can be signed. Expect to pay a deposit to hold the home.

USAG Italy

Request to view a home in-person at the Housing Office. This request holds the home for you until you can view it. You may have two homes on hold at one time. Housing will schedule a time for a taxi and interpreter to take you to view the home; this service can only be used to view five homes. You have 24 hours after viewing a home to notify the Housing Office of your intent to rent. Lease signing will be scheduled at the Housing Office with a lease counselor and the landlord, you will then be driven back to the house to note any problems and receive the keys. You must pay a deposit before moving in and submit a copy of the payment to the Housing Office.

ALLOWANCES

Visit www.travel.dod.mil/Allowances to find current allowance rates.

TEMPORARY LODGING ALLOWANCE

Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA) reimburses temporary quarters costs while you are searching for a home or waiting for government housing. To be eligible, service members must be actively seeking housing.

- Personnel must get TLA approved through the Housing Office before submitting to their Command.
- Utility activation after signing a lease can take 10-15 days, so account for this time within your TLA maximum to avoid paying out of pocket.

OVERSEAS HOUSING ALLOWANCE (OHA)

The HSC will provide your OHA form for starting the allowance when you sign a lease.

- Rental allowance is a reimbursement of your exact monthly lease cost.
- The utility allowance is a flat rate amount given monthly to defray costs of electric, gas, water, garbage and other recurring home maintenance costs. It is not intended to cover phones, internet, gardening, cleaning, pools, etc.

Personnel can contact their Command to request an advance OHA payment to cover security deposit, first month's rent or other startup charges.

LOANER FURNISHINGS

AVIANO

Temporary loaner furniture is available from the Furnishing Management Section (FMS) so you will have basic items like beds, dressers, a table and a couch while you wait for your household goods shipment. In addition, appliances are available to borrow for the duration of your tour. These consist of a washer, dryer, refrigerator and stove.

USAG ITALY

At your lease signing, you will choose what temporary furniture you would like delivered to your new home. This includes basic items like beds, dressers, tables and couches, plus appliances like a washer, dryer, stove and refrigerator. You will need to call the Furniture Warehouse to have temporary furnishings removed from your home. This may be done twice, typically before your household goods arrival and before you move out.

UTILITIES

Installation and setup fees for utilities can be high. Italian bills are sent every two months and are usually due within one week. Keep a record of all rental and utility payments in case they get lost or misrouted.

ELECTRICITY AND HEATING

Aviano

Visit the Home Fuel Office to set up natural gas and electricity rental agreements. This tax exemption program can greatly reduce your utility costs.

Homes heated with *Gasolio* (diesel fuel or oil) may also be able to use the program if they do not share a heating system with adjacent apartments or units.

USAG Italy

At your lease signing an appointment will be made for an interpreter to accompany you in person to the electric company. Be prepared to pay a fee and deposit. Roughly 10 days later, your initial bill and contract will arrive in the mail. These must be taken to the Housing Office so they can submit the contract on your behalf.

You are responsible for establishing and paying your heating bill. This is usually in the form of natural gas or oil. Visit your Tax Relief Office to sign up for the Utility Tax Exemption Program (UTEP) to avoid paying taxes on heating fuel.

WATER

Water bills are typically paid directly to your landlord and may only come every two, three or six months.

INTERNET

Your landlord is your best resource for finding good internet service at your new home. Be prepared to wait. Installation appointments are often scheduled two to four weeks out and are commonly cancelled and rescheduled. Even after it is installed, services may take up to a week to begin working.

TAX RELIEF PROGRAM


Local provincial fiscal authorities determine who is exempt from paying the Italian national Value Added Tax (VAT) on purchases. For this reason, different locations have varying policies.

AVIANO

Military members stationed at Aviano are exempt from paying tax on vehicle repairs. Visit the base Legal Office with your registration to receive a notarized VAT form. This can then be used to eliminate taxes when paying for repairs.

USAG ITALY

Military members stationed at USAG Italy are exempt from paying the Imposta sul Valore Aggiunto (IVA), otherwise known as VAT, on household goods and car parts from specific businesses in the region. The exemption only applies to purchases over 150 euros at a single business. Visit the Tax Relief Office (TRO) for detailed instructions. ■

GIVING BIRTH IN ITALY

Giving birth in an Italian hospital can be a wonderful experience. Before delivery, you can choose which local hospital fits your birthing needs, and you will be able to tour the hospital and meet the staff.

DELIVERY OPTIONS

- At your own expense, and without a TRICARE referral, you may travel to the U.S. If you choose to do this, you will need to remain in the U.S. until the new baby's identification documents are established.

FIRST STEPS AFTER GIVING BIRTH

- Obtain a Social Security Number for your baby.
- Enroll your baby in DEERS.
- Enroll your baby in TRICARE.
- Get your baby a Command Sponsorship Memo.
- Take passport photos.
- Get a no-fee U.S. passport.
- Get a U.S. tourist passport.
- Get a Consular Report of Birth Abroad (CRBA).

POST OFFICE

Military postal facilities use gateways in the United States to connect your mail with the United States Postal Service (USPS). Shipping costs and procedures are roughly the same as those in America. All mail must have the following to be sent or received:

- First and last names of both sender and receiver.
- Recipient or sender names must match those affiliated with the military postal box.
- A customs form to ensure the contents abide by local area restrictions.

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

RESOURCES FOR KIDS

Children may think of moving to Italy as an exciting new adventure. They may also struggle with the big change. Luckily, there are resources to help your kids settle into their new home.

AVIANO

- Two Child Development Centers (CDC) are on base for kids aged six weeks to five years old.
- A School Age Care center provides kids in grades kindergarten through sixth grade structured before and after-school activities and homework help.
- The Youth Programs facility is in Area 1, building 116. Pre-teens aged 9 to 13 may be registered at the Youth Center for after-school activities and clubs, while teens aged 13 to 18 have access to the Teen Center for clubs and a space to hang out. Youth sports and instructional classes are also available, and Military Family Life Counselors (MFLC) are on hand for non-medical counseling.
- The Military & Family Readiness Center (MFRC) helps families connect with EFMP programs.

USAG ITALY

CAMP DARBY

Visit Parent Central Services in Building 726 to register kids for all Child and Youth Services (CYS).

- The Darby CDC and SAC are co-located in Building 726 and offer childcare for kids ages six weeks and up. Before and after school care with homework help is available for students in grades Kindergarten to eighth grade.
- The Darby Youth Center in Building 201 offers a place for young people in grades 6-12 to hang out and attend clubs.
- CYS also offers some sports and fitness classes.



VICENZA

Visit Parent Central Services in building 108, the Davis Soldier & Family Readiness Center, to pick up a Parent Handbook and make an appointment to register kids for Child and Youth Services (CYS).

- There are two Child Development Centers (CDC). One is in the Villaggio housing area and the second is on Caserma Ederle. They offer full-day, part-day and hourly care for kids six weeks to five years old.
- The Villaggio School Age Center is co-located with the CDC and has before and after-school programming for elementary school kids.
- SKIES Unlimited instructional programs and youth sports and fitness programs are offered at facilities on both Villaggio and Ederle.
- The Youth Center in the Villaggio housing area is for tweens and teens in grades 6-12.
- The Teen Center Ederle is for students in high school.

HOMESCHOOLING


Homeschooling is a legal option open to all SOFA-sponsored active-duty military, DoD civilians and contractors. Your children may be eligible for auxiliary services offered by DoDEA. Contact your SLO for more information and to connect with homeschool groups.

ITALIAN SCHOOLS

While stationed in Italy, you have the option to send your children to local Italian schools. All instruction will be in Italian, though most schools will offer remedial language acquisition help. Keep in mind that students will not get American holidays off. You will need a local address to enroll. Visit your installation SLO for local school information.

ITALIAN EDUCATION STAGES

- ▶ **Kindergarten:** “scuola dell’infanzia” or “asilo.” Ages 3 to 6.
- ▶ **Primary school or elementary school:** “scuola primaria” or “scuola elementare.” Ages 6 to 11.
- ▶ **Lower secondary school or middle school:** “scuola secondaria di primo grado” or “scuola media.” Ages 11 to 14.
- ▶ **Upper secondary school or high school:** “scuola seconaria di secondo grado” or “scuola superior.” Ages 14 to 19. There are three types of high school:
 - “Liceo” for high-level theoretical study and university preparation.
 - “Istituto tecnico” is the most common and also leads to a university entrance qualification.
 - “Istituto professionale” is a vocational school for specific trades, crafts and careers. ■

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PET INFORMATION



AVIANO

Pets must be registered via email with the Aviano Veterinary Treatment Facility within 14 duty days of arrival. The veterinarian is available for pet appointments; however, they do not offer emergency veterinary care. You will need to make an appointment to obtain an EU pet passport.

Contact the clinic for a list of local veterinarians for specialty or emergency "Ambulatorio Veterinario," care.

USAG ITALY

Within 10 days of arrival, pets must be registered, in person or via email, with the Army Veterinary Center on Caserma Ederle in Vicenza. Pets may be seen at the clinic. It is necessary to contact the clinic for instructions on obtaining an EU pet passport. Camp Darby does not have a vet clinic.

There is a limit of two pets for families assigned to on-post housing. In addition, certain dog breeds deemed potentially aggressive are prohibited. Exotic or farm animals are also prohibited.

VACCINATIONS

- ▶ **Rabies:** Mandatory annual vaccine for both dogs and cats. Rabies tags must be worn at all times.
- ▶ **Leptospirosis:** This vaccine is highly recommended for all pets. Leptospirosis bacteria has a heavy presence in Italy and can cause kidney failure.
- ▶ **Heartworm Preventative:** Mandatory for dogs and cats.
- ▶ **Flea and tick control:** This is highly recommended year-round.

ITALIAN PET REGULATIONS

- Dogs may not be chained for longer than eight hours and must not be unattended.
- Dogs may not be left in a kennel or crate.
- Dogs kept on balconies, in basements or in garages must be able to enter the house on their own.
- Shelter, food and water must always be provided for your pet.
- While driving, pets cannot interfere with the driver.
- Dogs must be walked: twice daily for apartment residents, once daily for homes with small yards. If the yard is 120 square meters or larger, walking requirements are waved.
- Dog leashes must be less than five feet long. Dog walkers must clean up after their dog and keep a muzzle on hand.
- Feral cats are protected by Italian law, so consider keeping your house cat inside.
- Dogs, cats and ferrets must have a 15-digit ISO-compliant international microchip.
- Choke chains, pinch collars and shock collars are illegal in Italy and punishable with fines.

TRAVELING WITH YOUR PET

- The EU Pet Passport must be kept with your pet when traveling throughout Europe.
- The passport must list the pet's microchip number that is registered with the installation veterinarian.
- The passport must indicate a valid rabies vaccination is up to date.
- Most countries require muzzles to be carried for dogs, especially on public transportation.

PET TRANSPORTATION ALLOWANCE

When PCSing overseas or outside the continental United States, service members may be authorized a reimbursement for the transportation costs of one pet. The reimbursement cap is \$2,000 and it cannot be shared to cover multiple pets. ■

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DINING

The dining culture in Italy is unique, so here are some things to note.

- Wait staff will generally need to be waived over if you would like service, need refills or want to order more food. They respect the socializing of their clients and don't intrude.
- You will need to ask for the bill (*il conto*) when you are ready to go.
- Not every restaurant accepts credit cards, so bring euros.

Coffee Bars are open all day and are most popular at breakfast times, afternoons and evenings. If you are just getting a coffee and snack, order at the bar and stand there to drink and eat. If you are ordering food, or if you plan to spend some time in the coffee bar to chat or read, you can also choose to sit down for service and expect a small additional up charge plus tip.

Lunch times are around to 3 p.m. Restaurants will often close between lunch and dinner.

- "Rosticceria," "Girarrosto" and "Polleria" are shops that primarily sell rotisserie chickens, which make for quick meals.
- "Pasticceria" are pastry shops and are often connected to a bar (coffee shop). Many serve sandwiches, or "panini."
- "Tavola Calda," are counter-service shops with hot food that you choose from a display case.

Dinner restaurants, or "Ristorante" may be open as early as 7 p.m., but many Italians don't begin dinner until 9:30 p.m. The restaurant will typically stay open until midnight. Expect evening meals to last two hours or more. You should order each course that you are interested in receiving; they will come in this order:

- Antipasto: Appetizer, or starter
- Pasta
- Secondo: Main dish of just meat or fish, not side dishes.

- Contorni: Side dishes like vegetables, fruit, cheese or salads. These will come out with the secondo.
- Coffee or liqueur
- Wine, water and bread are available throughout a meal, but you must ask for them.

The bill will sometimes include an additional "coperto" or cover charge, and a "servizio" or service charge of about 10–15 percent.

SHOPPING

- Bring a 50 cent or 1 euro coin to use a shopping cart.
- Use a glove when touching grocery produce.
- Weigh and tag your produce before checking out.
- Bring your own bag or expect to pay for one at the register.
- Many shops close for "riposo" (extended lunch break) between 12:30 and 3:30 p.m. ■



GROCERY SHOPPING GUIDE

Welcome to Italy, where the supermarkets, or supermercato are as full of life and color as the bustling piazzas and serene landscapes. For those who have just moved to Europe, navigating an Italian supermarket can be a delightful part of your cultural immersion. Let's take a stroll down the aisles and discover what makes shopping in Italy a unique experience.

FRESH FINDS



The produce section is a testament to Italy's rich agricultural heritage, boasting a rainbow of fresh fruits and vegetables. Here, the concept of 'kilometer zero' reigns supreme, with an emphasis on locally-sourced, seasonal produce. Do not miss the regional specialties like Roman artichokes, Sicilian oranges or San Marzano tomatoes.

Also, remember that many supermarkets require you to weigh and label your produce before checkout. You will grab a bag and a plastic glove, bag your fruits and veggies, then head to the weigh station where the associate will weigh items and tag them for you. At more traditional markets, you will weigh yourself and apply the barcode sticker.

DELI DELIGHTS

No visit to an Italian supermarket is complete without a stop at the deli counter. It is a paradise of cured meats like prosciutto di Parma, salami, and an array of cheeses from creamy burrata to sharp pecorino. It is a cheese lover's paradise here in Italy. While it is fun to shop at larger chains, don't forget to stop by your local *Negozi di formaggi* (cheese shop) or Salumeria (meat shop). These are the best shops as you'll have the opportunity to try locally made cheese and meats. Use Google Translate to break bread with your shop owner, I promise he will be helpful and happy to assist you.

Another moment to prepare for is the possibility of finding horse meat at the grocery store. While this may be a cultural shock to some, it is deeply rooted in parts of Italy's culture. Horse meat, or *cavallo* is especially popular in Lombardy, Apulia, the Veneto, Friuli Venezia Giulia, Trentino-Alto Adige/Süd Tirol, Parma and the islands of Sardinia and Sicily. Horse meat is used in a variety of recipes: as a stew called *pastissada* (typical of Verona), served as steaks, as carpaccio or made into bresaola.

PANTRY STAPLES

The pantry aisles are a treasure trove of Italian culinary essentials. Stock up on various pasta shapes, artisanal sauces, extra virgin olive oil, sardines, spices and aged balsamic vinegar. These staples are the backbone of Italian cuisine and will elevate your home cooking. I was shocked to find several aisles devoted to these staples, especially pasta and pasta sauces. I counted three whole aisles for pasta and two for sauces at my local IPER.



Another item that may interest you is *Pocket Coffee!* Pocket Coffee is a unique item known for combining the rich taste of chocolate with the bold flavor of espresso. Pocket Coffee consists of an individually wrapped piece of dark chocolate filled with liquid espresso, making it a popular treat for those needing a quick boost.

Italy has an abundance of sweet treats that are packaged as well. You'll find items like *Cornetto* which is a croissant filled with different fillings like chocolate, pistachio and crème.

BEVERAGES AND WINES

Italian supermarkets offer an impressive selection of wines and beverages. There are aisles full of wine sorted by different regions. From robust reds to sparkling Proseccos, the wine aisles are a journey through Italy's vineyards. Pay special attention because at some supermarkets you can pour your own wine. This is called *Vino Sfuso*, or "Loose Wine." Simply put it is bulk wine! Supermarkets often highlight a local producer, and you can simply bring your own bottles to fill, or they will supply the bottles for you at a low rate. There are even whole shops dedicated to *Vino Sfuso*!

CHECKOUT AND ETIQUETTE


It almost seems like it is every man for himself at checkout. You will often need to bag your own groceries. Sometimes everything is happening at an alarmingly fast rate. Take a few deep breaths and just do what you can. It is also common to bring your own reusable bags as a nod to sustainability. Patience is key in Italian supermarkets, where the pace is leisurely (except at checkout) and social interactions are savored. ■





THE 5 VILLAGES

1. MONTEROSSO AL MARE

This is the biggest of the five villages and the only one with sandy beaches. If coming via train from Levanto, it is the first village you will encounter. Monterosso is spread out between the “new town” and the “old town.” “New town” boasts a beachfront promenade lined with modern hotels, restaurants and bars. The paths through Monterosso are stroller-friendly with numerous gelato stands and a beach-side playground. “Old town” includes restaurants, churches and shops nestled in stone alleyways.



2. VERNAZZA

From Monterosso, choose between a two-hour hike or a 10-minute train ride to Vernazza, a narrow, one-street town with a church built on the water. The remains of a castle and old wall that once protected against pirates and a small harbor lined with colorful fishing boats make this town a must-see. This was an easy trip with my little one and made for a great lunch stop.



3. CORNIGLIA

East of Vernazza is Corniglia. From the train station, it takes 365 steps up the cliff, or a long walk on a steep winding road to reach the town center. There is a green park bus you can take to and from the train station; however, the schedules vary and tested the patience of my little one. So, we embraced the vertical challenge and rewarded ourselves with gelato after the climb.



4. MANAROLA

Another one-street town, Manarola is the smallest of the five. It has a small harbor and rocky beach where you can take a swim. Here you can enjoy a unique spot of land from which the most famous Cinque Terre photos are taken.



5. RIOMAGGIORE

This town has one main street, a harbor, a rocky beach, a castle, a church and a dozen restaurants. It also has good train connections and is the closest to the larger city of La Spezia. This was an easy excursion and quick train ride from Monterosso.

The sweet smell of the sea, stunning views, fantastic food and watching my daughter play with the local kids at the park made the Cinque Terre the perfect family weekend getaway.

There is a simple, short train ride from Levanto to and from the villages. Trains run frequently, especially during peak season. Called the **Cinque Terre Express**, it connects all five of the villages. You can purchase a card with unlimited travel from www.trenitalia.com. Kids under the age of four travel free.

BOAT




Ferries operate between all villages, except Corniglia, offering a unique perspective of the coastline. The yellow #2 "Cinque Terre" line connects the villages to Levanto and other towns westward along the coast, while the #3 "Viareggio" line connects to the coastline eastward towards Pisa. Service is weather-dependent and more frequent from April to October. Check schedules at www.navigazionegolfodeipoeti.it.

CAR



In the five villages of Cinque Terre, very few places offer parking, and most villages are closed to vehicle traffic. It's possible to find a central parking lot for a daily fee, but staying in Levanto and taking the train can save money and the hassle.

The food in the Cinque Terre is best described as fresh, local and homemade cuisine that soothes the soul.

1. PESTO

This region is the birthplace of pesto. Basil is ground with cheese, garlic, olive oil and pine nuts, and then poured over pasta. My daughter loved the pesto lasagna at **La Cantina di Miky** in **Monterosso**. By the end of the trip, they knew her name and always had a highchair ready to go.

2. FOCACCIA

This tasty, fluffy bread also originates here. It is simply flatbread with olive oil and salt. Try it at **Panificio Focacceria** in **Vernazza**.

3. TORTA MONTEROSSINA

A wonderful cake named after the village with layers of chocolate and cream. Try it in **Monterosso**. This place became our frequent stop for breakfast. We couldn't get enough of the fresh pastries and cappuccinos.

TIPS FOR A SMOOTH VISIT:

- **Avoid peak hours.** The villages can be crowded between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Plan early morning or late afternoon visits.
- **Travel off-season.** Visit in spring (April-May) or autumn (September-October) for fewer crowds and pleasant weather. Avoid visiting in July and August if you dislike crowds and high temperatures.
- **Pack light.** Narrow streets and steep paths make heavy luggage inconvenient.
- **Dress Properly.** Skip high heels or unsuitable footwear; comfortable walking shoes are a must.
- **Respect the environment.** The Cinque Terre is a protected area. Stick to marked trails and avoid littering.
- **Skip driving.** Parking is limited and traffic restrictions apply in the villages.
- **Be respectful.** Avoid entering private property or vineyards without permission. ■





Outdoor Adventures in the **DOLOMITES**

Rising like jagged teeth above the bucolic high mountain fields of northern Italy are the iconic Dolomites. A favorite spot for mountaineers and rock climbers, the Dolomites are an outdoor sports paradise.

The Dolomites' limestone mountain range lies within the southern portion of the Alps and is largely protected by national and regional parks that dot the area. The beautiful and unique geological landscape was recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2009.

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
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Hiking

The choice for hikes in the Dolomites is endless. The **Giau Pass** near the town of **Cortina d'Ampezzo** is an especially serene area of mountain pastures surrounded by high peaks. At the trailhead, there is an easy family-friendly stroll into the pass or an intermediate hike up onto the rocky Mondeval plateau where a Mesolithic burial was found to be 7,500 years old. For an all-day adventure, the **Cinque Torri** loop passes a First World War open-air museum and continues around the five peaks with open views into the surrounding green valleys.

Another iconic Dolomite hike is the **Three Peaks loop** beginning at the **Auronzo Refuge**, then getting up close and personal with the scree slopes below three of the most distinctive jagged mountaintops in the area. For the committed backpacker, try the 12-day, 125 km Alta Via 1 which traverses the Dolomites from north to south. Starting at **Lake Braies**, this hike can be tackled by staying at mountain refuges along the route. Be sure to book lodging ahead of time and visit www.dolomiti.org for hike details.



Climbing

If you'd rather be climbing the rocks, basing yourself in the valleys near **Cortina d'Ampezzo** is ideal. There are a huge variety of sport climbing crags, especially in the **Falzarego Pass**, with short walk-in times that mean you can be in town for pizza and a beer every evening. Difficulty levels range from beginner routes to a high of 9a, with most climbs in the 8a-8c range. If you're more of a big wall climber, the iconic north face of the **Cima Grande**, at 450 meters and 16 pitches, is a prestigious route to attempt. Other options abound, visit mountainproject.com to find your crag.

During World War I, the Dolomites formed a portion of the incongruous front line between the Italian and Austro-Hungarian forces. Battles were fought in these high mountain passes and scaling the peaks became a goal for both sides.

It was a deadly war, but those fighting in the Dolomites faced the insurmountable challenge of bringing equipment and men into an area prone to rockslides, avalanches and steep cliffs. To tackle the landscape, *via ferrata routes* were built.

Trying a via ferrata is another experience born in the Dolomites, and a must-do when visiting. Meaning "iron path," these mountain routes involve iron cables, steps, ladders and other equipment permanently affixed to the mountain. These paths were created during World War I, but are now used, maintained and created for sports. For those without their own climbing gear, numerous outfitters in the area offer tours. The German language website www.via-ferrata.de is a thorough resource for finding routes.



Farm Stays

Both German and Italian are spoken throughout the Dolomites as the area is part of the historical Tyrol region. Now divided between Austria and Italy, Tyrol was a unified region while part of the Holy Roman Empire of the late Middle Ages when it was ruled by various counts.

Nowadays, the high Dolomite pastures and valleys are dotted with peaceful farms and small villages. Agrotourism is popular and booking a farm stay immerses you within the landscape in a way that a hotel can't offer. Many farm stays have small apartments inside a large house on a working farm where you can visit the cows, pet the barn cats and hike right out the front door. The Roter Hahn organization, www.roterhahn.it, specializes in connecting tourists with farm stays throughout Tyrol. ■



Indulge Your Five Senses in TUSCANY

Whether you are familiar with the Tuscan aesthetic and history or have only gotten as far as the Zuppa Toscana soup from Olive Garden, there is no doubt that the threads of Tuscan culture are woven throughout American culture thanks to generations of immigrants. Get ready to delve into this central Italian region using all five senses.

SEE

It is impossible to lists the sites in Tuscany without mentioning the famous **Statue of David by Michelangelo** and the collection at the **Uffizi** in Florence featuring art by Botticelli, Leonardo, Raffaello and Caravaggio.

Nestled in the Tuscan Archipelago, one incredible historic site to see is the **medieval village of Isola del Giglio**. Travel back in time with a visit to Giglio Castello, whose medieval walls and atmosphere have been little touched by time.

If you want to see something atypical to the tourist experience, check out the "**Filippo Civinini**" **Museum of Human Anatomy** in Pisa. You can see an Egyptian mummy, the anatomical tables of Paolo Mascagni as well as anatomical and archaeological collections.



HEAR


In Florence, delight your ears at the famous **Teatro Verdi** in Florence. The **Orchestra della Toscana** maintains a permanent residence here, but you can also listen to a variety of concerts, musicals and theater shows.

If you need a break from translating Italian, you can take in a performance of the choir at **St. Mark's English Church** in Florence. Not only can you catch them at Sunday services, but they also have bi-monthly recitals and concerts at festivals.

As you sip some wonderful Tuscan wine, listen to the live **jazz music** at **unTUBO**. They have a wine list 33 pages long and also feature art onsite. It's a great way to wind down after a day of exploring **Siena**.

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TOUCH

Olive harvesting season runs from October through early December. Take part in the harvest by **hand-picking some olives**. Villa Campestri prides itself on utilizing a completely organic process because their microclimate allows for a "superior" extra virgin olive oil.

Warm up in the Thermal Springs of Saturnia.

These waters are a nice 37.5 degrees Celsius (99.5 degrees Fahrenheit) all year long. There is no life-guard at these free natural sulphureous springs. For a refined experience, there are also wellness spas in the area that use the spring waters. Get a feel for the local area on a **bike tour** to the vineyards around **Chianti**. Often using e-bikes, these tours include visits to historic villages, castles and monasteries, plus delicious local wine tastings.



SMELL

There is no doubt that truffle oil French fries are delicious. However, those tasty treats don't just magically appear. One must hunt for the buried truffles, and you can go along. With the help of Massimo Cucchiara from truffleintuscany.com and his dog (who does most of the smelling) you can hunt truffles in **San Miniato**.

Leather has a rich history in Florence, with the first leather workers' union dating back to the 13th century, and there is no denying it's distinct scent. A handmade leather item is a great Tuscan souvenir, and you can use your nose to help you find some great keepsakes in the **San Lorenzo Market**.

Fall is the time of year to catch some final botanical beauties before winter sets in. Take in the **floral scents** of the **Botanical Garden of Lucca**. On-site you will find over 200 types of trees and shrubs, a botanical museum and greenhouses filled with tropical plants, rhododendrons, camellias and more.



TASTE

Castellina is a medieval village found in Chianti; it is also home to cultivators of olive oil and wine. Several places in town allow you to book olive oil and wine tasting tours. **La Castellina Winery** also boasts an exquisite extra virgin olive oil grown from their highest altitude fields.

Italy is known for great food and each region boasts its specialty. Even within one region, cities have their own distinct flavors and styles. After taking your obligatory photo at the Leaning Tower of Pisa, make sure to sample some **Pisano-style food** which is known for meat-based dishes such as Pisan tripe and wild boar mixed with local vegetables and fruit. **Pienza** is the birthplace of **Pecorino cheese**. Whether you like strong Pecorino di Pienza DOP cheese or a mild Pecorino di Grotta, there is a Pienzan cheese for you. This cheese is so popular that every September a fair is held in its honor, the **Fiera del Cacio**. ■





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GET TO KNOW THE AVIANO AREA

Many people stationed at Aviano find homes near Sacile and Pordenone. These thriving Italian towns have much to offer and are fun to explore.

SACILE

In the Middle Ages, the garden village of Sacile grew along a trade route that protected the crossing of the Livenza River. At this time, a small shrine was built that would later be replaced with the **Duomo di San Nicolo**. Inside its typical Venetian architecture are some incredible 15th-century frescoes. The Duomo makes a great starting point for a walk around town. Down the road is the **Torrione di Pra Castelvecchio**, a portion of the medieval city wall that is tucked into the Giardini Ortazza Park that straddles the river. There is a small pedestrian-only bridge that makes a scenic stroll to the other side.

As part of the former Republic of Venice, the town of Sacile became a haven for noble families who built their palaces along the Livenza River. You can see a series of opulent political frescoes by visiting the **Palazzo Ragazzoni** near the park. Now an event center, the palace courtyard hosts a local market on Thursday mornings.

Crossing back over the river will bring you to the heart of this scenic village. Many of the restaurants and bars around the **Piazza del Popolo** have patios that open onto the **Livenza River**, which seems to surround the town. Sacile's historic center is actually built on two islands within the river. For a quintessentially Italian experience, finish off your day in Sacile by having a drink or tasting some gelato at one of the many riverside terraces.

PORDENONE

The Noncello River that runs adjacent to Pordenone was an important byway during the Middle Ages. After a dock called the Portus Naonis developed on the river's edge, the town grew around it and became an active trading site. It is still a great place to go shopping. The cobblestoned **Corso Vittorio Emanuele II**, or "Corso" leads north from the river and into the old city center. It is a walking street with plenty of Italian charm. The road is lined with colorful, historic shuttered buildings, outdoor cafes and many local specialty shops.

Elite families residing in Pordenone were an active part of the Italian Renaissance, and their artistic patronage can still be seen in the city's center. Many of the building facades have colorful frescoes or friezes that were restored for the city's "Corso Facades Project" in 1991. One such building is the **Palazzo Ricchieri**, which now houses the **Civic Art Museum**. Nearby is the **Duomo di San Marco** with its stark facade, beautiful bell tower and extensively decorated interior. Across the street is the impressively Gothic Town Hall, which was built in the 1300s.

Take some time along Pordenone's Corso to sit and enjoy the plentiful outdoor cafes. Local food and wine are on show since the town is a member of the Slow Food movement. Try a Friulano or Ribolla wine, a local prosciutto or a cheese and potato pie called a "frico." On Wednesday and Saturday mornings, tents are set up in the area of **XX Settembre Square**. This City Market is the perfect place to mingle with locals, find some deals and try the local Italian cuisine. ■



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GET TO KNOW THE VICENZA AREA

Being stationed in Italy is quite an adventure, and there are plenty of chances to experience Italy in the Vicenza area. Vicenza, as a city, is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and right in your backyard.

TWICE WEEKLY MARKET: What better way to live like an Italian than to shop at the local market? Every Tuesday and Thursday, the Piazza dei Signori comes alive with vendors selling cheese, sausage, flowers, clothing and more. The Thursday market is bigger than the Tuesday one. No matter which day you go, get there early. Food is often sold out around 1 p.m. and vendors start closing down at 2 p.m.

PIAZZA DEI SIGNORI: Translated as the "Square of the Lords," this elegant place will make you feel like a lord or lady of old. It is home to the aforementioned market as well as many events and shows throughout the year.

RIGHETTI (SELF RESTAURANT RIGHETTI): It's up to you to keep up with your food and drink consumption at this "honest" restaurant in Vicenza. Located inside a 17th-century palace just a few steps from the Piazza dei Signori, enjoy a rotating daily menu of Italian fare. You order directly from the cooks and close at the cashier after the meal.

THE JEWELRY MUSEUM: While in Vicenza you can visit the first jewelry museum in Italy. The two-story museum features 11 exhibition rooms and a bookshop. Kids will enjoy the educational activities, and everyone can enjoy the guided tours. The museum often hosts workshops and family activities.

BASILICA PALLADIANA: Architect Andrea Palladio designed palaces, villas and buildings across Vicenza. The Basilica Palladiana is one of his most famous structures. The basilica was originally a medieval town hall. Today, it houses shops, bars, a walkable roof terrace and the Jewelry Museum. Other Palladio projects in Vicenza include the Teatro Olimpico, Villa Capra 'La Rotonda' and Palazzo Chiericati.

MATTEO GRANDI: For an elegant night out, check out the Michelin-starred restaurant, Matteo Grandi, located in the Basilica Palladiana. You can enjoy a seasonal four-course menu and select wine from their extensive wine menu.

ROMEO AND JULIET: In a plot that later formed the famous Shakespearean play, Vicenza is the home of the original author of "Romeo and Juliet," or Romeo and Giulietta as they were originally known. Luigi da Porto wrote the story as a novella and it features familiar characters such as Tybalt, Paris, Friar Lawrence and Mercutio. It was published in 1531 after Porto had died. You can visit his burial site in Vicenza at the Church of Santa Corona. The famous "fair Verona where is lay our scene" is only 30 minutes down the road. ■

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GET TO KNOW THE CAMP DARBY AREA

Being stationed at Camp Darby means having access to quaint canals and a thriving waterfront.

EXPLORING LIVORNO

Camp Darby is in Livorno, Italy. Livorno made a name for itself as a cosmopolitan port town during the Renaissance under the guidance of the Medici family. In 1577, it was designed as an "ideal town" by architect Bernardo Buontalenti. He had previously built Livorno's massive **Fortezza Vecchia**, or old fortress, which you can still see today standing guard on the waterfront. Past the fortress, canals were created to allow for incoming trade ships. There are plenty of local boat owners who dock their vessels along the same canals in the **Venezia Nuova District**.

The port city came under the watchful eye of Ferdinando I de' Medici, who was the Grand Duke of Tuscany. He gave Livorno special privileges as a "port franco," or free port. This meant that international goods could be traded here without taxes. Soon the city developed an international and diverse population. The Medici family built an extensive new fort, the **Fortezza Nuovo**, along the canals on its own huge island. The fort has fallen into disrepair, but it is interesting and free to explore and contains one of Italy's famous protected street cat enclaves.

The **Via Grande** is the city's main shopping road that stretches from the port to the **Piazza della Repubblica**. Modern stores and restaurants line the road in shady covered arcades. While you are here, be sure to try some seafood. The **Mare Matto** stand near the waterfront has delicious budget options and a few chairs for an al fresco experience. Livorno's iconic dish is a mixed seafood stew called *cacciucco*, and the best is found at **Trattoria Da Galileo**.

The Livorno waterfront is where the action has always been in this city, and the ever-expanding port continues this heritage. When you are ready to explore further afield, you can get in on the maritime action by taking a ferry from the **Porto di Livorno** to Corsica, Sardinia or Sicily. The massive ferries are operated by four different companies and offer overnight rooms, car decks and entertainment on longer sailings. ■
