An assignment to Poland is a unique and exciting opportunity to experience a foreign country. The closest full-service U.S. Army Garrison is USAG Bavaria at Grafenwöhr, which is roughly six hours away; however, you should have access to all you need during your time at USAG Poland.

The Republic of Poland is a central European country and member of the European Union. It is made up of 16 distinct "voivodeships" or administrative districts. Warsaw is its largest metropolis and the nation's capital. Poland has a population of 38 million who speak Polish, a Western Slavic language. As a flourishing and innovative country, the cities are bustling and the towns are friendly, with great food and art scenes. A thousand-year "Polski" legacy tells a story of survival in its people and culture, through wars, revolutions, and cultural tumult, to create the vibrant land and the ardent NATO ally that Poland is today.

IN-PROCESSING

Garrison in-processing occurs every Tuesday 9:30-10:30 a.m. and is followed by an off-post housing brief. Culture college is every Wednesday from 8 a.m.- 3 p.m. at Camp Kosciuszko in Bldg. 28. This is required for all personnel and contractors are highly encouraged to attend as well. There are three days of classes and activities along with a checklist that soldiers must complete within seven days.

MAILING SERVICES

The post office in Poznań has basic USPS retail functions where you can mail a parcel or letter out the same way you can at a USPS Post Office in the U.S. For outgoing mail, there are two ways to mail letters and packages:

A personal USPS Click-N-Ship® account (created by you). You can also use this account to order stamps directly to your PSC box if you wish. Click-N-Ship® enables you to print your own mailing labels. Once you

have an account, complete the data about the package to include height, width, length, weight, addresses, and customs information. If you need assistance, visit the Post Office. Learn more at cns.usps.com.

• Pirate Ship® is another personal shipping software available for your use. You can create an account for free and Pirate Ship has partnerships with both USPS and UPS. If you need help, they have live online chat support for 14 hours a day as well as a support email for out-of-office hours. Learn more at pirateship.com.

As a reminder, the APO service is provided for you as an authorized patron. The Post Office may not be used as part of any home-based business or used to provide a tax-free import for local nationals or others not entitled to the service themselves.

Size restrictions to APO

Packages may not exceed 66 pounds and size is limited to 42 inches maximum length and 72 inches maximum length and girth combined. Visit the U.S. Postal Service website (www.usps. gov) for additional item restrictions.

SERVICES IN POLAND

BANKING

Getting an account through a local bank or international banking mobile app will eliminate headaches when paying bills, transferring money, making purchases, getting cash and managing funds between U.S. dollars and Polish złoty.

Poland is a member of the European Union; however, it has not yet adopted the Euro. The Polish currency is the złoty (PLN). A single złoty is equal to 100 of the coin currency, Grosz.

The cost of living is generally lower in Poland than in the U.S. However, you should be aware that you will have upfront expenses as part of your in-processing and establishing yourself in Poland. Discuss your entitlements and allowances with your current finance office for your respective location.

MONEY EXCHANGES

You can change money in banks or Kantors (exchange offices). Banks will likely charge a commission/currency exchange fee, whereas the Kantors (found in malls, rest stops and at the airports) usually provide better exchange rates and don't charge a commission. It is recommended to avoid exchanges located in airports, as they provide less advantageous rates.

ATMS

ATMs are widely available throughout Poland. Check with your CONUS bank or credit union for currency conversion fees and daily limits (some banks, such as USAA, will waive international ATM fees), also consider not accepting conversion offers which increases the ATM fee/cost. When using a debit/credit card, it's generally better to charge the purchase in the local currency. Not using the local currency may increase your purchase by eight percent.

DEBIT & CREDIT CARDS

- Some Polish businesses accept debit and credit cards, but some may not.
- It's always best to carry Polish złoty when off installation.
- There might be transaction fees when using debit cards, so using cash is often the most efficient option.

MOBILE APPS

These "portable" international banks are a great tool to get local bills paid in zloty, and often with competitive exchange rates and low fees.

MONEY TRANSFERS

- You can use a local MoneyGram vendor for money transfers.
- Mobile apps like TransferGo, Wise and N26 facilitate money transfers as well. You will need the recipient's local bank account number or their International Bank Account Number (IBAN) to complete a transfer.

FEES

ATMs may require transaction fees depending on your account services. Be aware of these charges prior to withdrawing money and compare the conversion rate.

While the exchange rate of currency changes daily, here is a rough estimate for these European currency values. You will use Euros in many of the other EU countries outside of Poland.

- 1 USD \approx 4 Polish złoty (PLN)
- 1 Polish złoty (PLN) ≈ 1 U.S. quarter

EAGLE CASH CARD

The EagleCash Stored Value Card Program will be discontinued by the end of the fiscal year 2025. The card was used as a way to linked to your bank account, allowing you to be able to pull funds in Zloty or Euros.

LEGAL SERVICES

Your on-installation Legal Office can help with simple notaries and powers of attorney on a walk-in basis. Complex notary services and other legal advice is available by appointment.

- Powers of Attorney are recommended for spouses so they may handle paperwork if the military sponsor is not available due to training or deployment.
- Dependents wanting to work while overseas should have their sponsors reach out to their servicing personnel or legal office.
- Tax preparation services are no longer handled by legal offices, but there are numerous free options for simple return preparation.
- Other legal services offered include wills, medical directives, Servicemembers Civil Relief Act (SCRA) issues, estate planning, immigration, debt or credit problems, and other non-criminal issues.
- Assistance with military criminal issues is provided by Trial Defense Service offices.

CELL PHONES

Upon arrival in Poland, getting cell phone and internet service is vital and allows you to stay connected. In accordance with the Service Members Civil Relief Act, a service member can bring a copy of military orders to their U.S. phone carrier to cancel their current contract if desired. If you keep your U.S. phone plan, be sure to unlock your existing phone before departure to obtain Polish phone service or have a dual SIM phone to maintain two phone plans.

Note: When you arrive, put your phone on airplane mode to avoid unexpected charges.

GOOGLE VOICE

Google Voice will allow you to port your U.S. number for a fee (\$20) so you can keep it. You can then use a local SIM card to have a local number and U.S. number simultaneously (with a dual-SIM phone.) Google Voice allows free calls to the U.S. using Wi-Fi. If you don't want to be limited to Wi-Fi and haven't gotten a local SIM yet, **Google Fi** is a paid phone plan that uses T-Mobile's cell towers. Starting either of these processes is much easier while still in the U.S. Visit Google Voice's website for more information: voice.google.com.

PRE-PAY OPTION

Allows you to purchase data packages for weekly, monthly and subscription-based services.







TRANSPORTATION IN POLAND



Common options that permanent-party personnel use to get around are motorcycles, mopeds, scooter rentals, bicycles and public transport, where available.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

In Poznań, public transport is organized by Zarząd Transportu Miejskiego (ZTM) - Urban Transport Authority.

- Download the free "Jakdojade" app to coordinate public transportation by bus or tram. Tickets can be purchased on the app.

DRIVER'S LICENSES

All military and civilian personnel, their family members and any DOD employees stationed in Poland must get a U.S. Army in Europe (USAREUR) driver's license if they will be driving a privately-owned vehicle (POV) or government-owned vehicle (GOV).

USAREUR-AF ONLINE DRIVER'S LICENSE TESTING

The USAREUR-AF Driver's Certificate training and exam can be taken on Joint Knowledge Online (JKO). Individuals with a Common Access Card (CAC) can login to JKO and create an account. Non-CAC holders must request a sponsored account by signing up with JKO. Sponsored accounts must use the USER ID and PASSWORD issued by JKO to access the system. Log into JKO and search the catalog for the course code USA 007. The course must be

completed before the exam, USA 007B. Once completed, the scores are valid for 60 days. You must apply for a USAREUR license within the 60-day window. After, you must retake the exam for your score to be considered valid.

▶ Getting your License

- ✔ Bring your certificate of completion to the POV registration office, along with your U.S. driver's license, U.S. Forces ID Card, international driver's license, official orders and proof of payment.
- ✓ If over the age of 65, bring a current vision test from an optometrist.

Note: USAREUR licenses applications in Poland are routed through registration offices in Germany, so additional processing time may be required.

INTERNATIONAL DRIVERS LICENSES AND **STATE-LICENSE EXTENSIONS**

We recommend all personnel obtain an International Driving Permit (IDP) from AAA prior to arrival. Generally, international drivers [from outside of the European Union (EU)] require an IDP for driving in Poland or to rent a vehicle. Make sure your state license is valid throughout your stay, as the military exceptions granted by some U.S. states which allow military members to drive on expired licenses are **not** accepted overseas.

REGISTERING YOUR VEHICLE

POV Registration Office Camp Kościuszko, Poznań Bldg. 28, Room 18

The POV Registration Office should be one of your first stops if you plan to drive a POV in Poland. Appointments with an off-installation inspection station and Poznań's registration department (DMV) are needed. It is important to schedule these two appointments through the POV Registration Office as soon as possible. It is recommended to schedule them prior to your arrival, and especially prior to your vehicle's arrival in Poland.

To start the registration process, be prepared to send the following documents to the POV Registration Office.

- Orders
- U.S. Driver's License
- **Passport**
- Car title / registration (U.S. vehicles)
- Registration / title (EU vehicles)

VEHICLE INSPECTION

Each vehicle must be inspected before your Polish DMV registration appointment. After the first inspection, the vehicle needs an annual inspection. Before the initial inspection in Poland, make sure that your car is in a good technical state and that you don't have tinted windows on the front side windows as they are not legal in Poland. There is an option to take off tinting at the inspection station, free of charge. Please see the garrison website for a list of exemptions from Polish technical requirements.

FUEL

There is no gas station on the installation, so you will have to fuel up on the economy. There are no discount fuel cards.

INSURANCE

In Poland you have two types of insurance:

- OC liability insurance (compulsory)
- AC (Autocasco) full coverage insurance (non-compulsory)

See the POV Registration Office for a list of Polish insurance options. USAA does not currently insure vehicles in Poland.

To insure your vehicle in Poland, it must first be registered in the Polish system, the local DMV, which is done via your appointment with the POV Registration Office.

There is an option to get short term insurance (30+ days) that allows you to drive with your U.S. plates, if needed. With short term insurance you can use the vehicle prior to your Polish DMV registration and before you get a Polish insurance plan, but it is recommended to keep this driving to a minimum.

SHIPPED VEHICLES

If you shipped a vehicle to Poland, it will take at least 45-60 days to arrive. It's important that you do not send any of your vehicle documents with your HHG. Bring the documents in your personal baggage. Vehicles must be picked up in person at the Poznań-Ławica Airport.

The owner must bring the vehicle's valid registration documents for pick up.

▶ Requirements

Make sure you hand-carry the following original documents when traveling overseas:

- ✔ Original title
- ✔ Original Bill of Sale (This is your primary proof of ownership in Poland. If you cannot locate it, ask the dealer for a duplicate.)
- ✓ Current registration document from previous station (the actual registration document, not just a fee payment confirmation).
- ✔ Vehicle recall verification (proof you took care of any factory recalls)
- ✔ Current and valid license plates
- ✔ Driver's record from your previous insurance company covering the last seven years.
- ✓ If you don't have a clear title for your vehicle (i.e. your bank holds a lien on the title), there are additional requirements and paperwork needed prior to shipping your vehicle from the U.S. You will need a prior

- written bank consent to register the vehicle in Poland. The process to obtain such authorization might take weeks or months, so it is essential that you complete it before shipping your vehicle.
- ✓ If your vehicle is old, or has body damage, it might be difficult to pass the required local inspection, and repairs may be required to complete the inspection.
- ✓ Vehicles shipped directly to Poland must have a valid registration (U.S. plate, import plate, or EU plate).
- ✓ Vehicles must have basic insurance before they can be driven.

PURCHASING A CAR

You have the option to buy a new or used car from dealers and private sellers in Poland. Buying a vehicle in compliance with U.S. specification from another military member is tax free. Be aware that vehicles sold in local dealerships are not in compliance with U.S. specification. If you buy a vehicle in Poland, contact your local vehicle registration office for guidance.

- All vehicles are required to be insured and registered (registration first, insurance second) with the POV registration office.
- There is no established value-added tax (VAT) program in Poland. If you wish to purchase a vehicle and take advantage of a VAT program, members can purchase a vehicle from a dealer in Germany and drive or ship the vehicle to their duty station in Poland. ■

HOUSING IN POLAND

Housing in Poland is modern, but you'll have the option of selecting historical apartments and houses as well. Houses and apartments in Poland may be a different size or layout than you are used to; however, the Housing Office will assist you in finding something that fits your needs.

There is no on-post housing. All personnel will live off post if they are on PCS orders.

All service members must check in to the Housing Office within 48 hours of their arrival. The Housing Office is a one-stop shop for all personnel who will reside off base. Staff will assist newcomers in locating a residence off base by providing a variety of services.

- Providing a list of approved rental agents and managers.
- Assist with translation between your landlord.
- Negotiate and finalize your rental contract.
- Covering detailed housing market information.
- · Leasing contract administrative services.
- · Housing-showing service.

Prepare to pay up to three months' rent upfront to cover first month's rent, realtor fee and security deposit. Ensure that you are financially prepared for this. If you foresee a monetary shortfall before arriving, you are authorized to request one month of advance Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA).

TEMPORARY LODGING

Upon arrival, Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA) is received for temporary lodging and meals. You may receive up to 30 days of incoming TLA, with an approved extension up to 60 days. TLA will be paid and processed in 10-day increments (processed by the Housing Office). The Housing Office is able to grant up to a maximum of 60 days of Temporary Quarters Subsistence Allowance (TQSA) for government civilians. For this reason, it is recommended that you ship your HHG early.

Upon arrival, Temporary Quarter Subsistence Allowance (TQSA) is received for temporary lodging, meals, and laundry.
 Note: This entitlement is not automatic.

OFF-POST HOUSING

Houses can range from fully furnished to unfurnished. Do not ship your U.S. washer, dryer, microwave, oven or refrigerator due to different voltage requirements. Poland uses a different voltage than the U.S.; be sure to look at your appliances to see if they are dual voltage or not. Poland is 220V and the U.S. is 110V. Purchase plug adapters and transformers in advance for electronics that are dual voltage. There are no loaner services available; however, a majority of the apartments are equipped with washing machines. Dryers are typically not available and storage space is limited. It is a common practice in Poland to have a heated drying rack.

Traditionally in Poland, a lease agreement would have collateral, which would be another owned property of the tenants or permanent quarters elsewhere. Landlords want the ability to remove someone for non-payment after three months. With this condition, called "okazjonalny" (meaning "occasional"), in the lease, it gives them that leverage. Ask the Housing Office to review your lease **before** signing. The contract should be in English if you do not know Polish.

- Private homes are assessed by the Housing Office or found by a realtor.
- · You are responsible for rent and utilities.
- You will receive Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA) or Living Quarters Allowance (LQA).
- The Housing Office will provide you with the lease agreement based on what allowance you are authorized (LQA, OHA or per diem).

House Hunting online

Polish sites like www.otodom.pl and www. olx.pl provide the best overview of available housing. The housing team will also coordinate viewings in your local area.

House Hunting in person

Stop by the Housing Office to get an approved real estate agency listing. There will be more private rentals to select from by talking to the staff than online.

If you elect to use a real estate agent to locate housing, you may not be reimbursed. Civilian employees may have the opportunity to claim partial reimbursement. Please consult the Garrison Housing Office or your Civilian administrator before agreeing to utilize a real estate agent.

VIEWING A HOME

- Go in person to the Housing Office to request a day and time to view a home.
- If utilizing the real estate agency, which
 is also available in the Housing Office,
 the agency will be the one to show you
 a home.
- Many apartments in Poland come fully furnished with a bed, refrigerator, washer (no dryer), dresser/closet and television.
- It is important that you do not sign any lease agreement until the Garrison Housing Office has reviewed it.

RENT AND UTILITIES

The tenant pays the landlord/property management directly. This includes rent and utilities such as electricity and water.

- It is preferable to pay via a certified check or an electronic fund transfer using an IBAN.
- The first month's rent is due on the move-in date.
- Rent is due every month on the movein date.
- Keep a record of all your rental and utility payments.
- Electricity
- The electric bill will be maintained under the landlord's name, so you pay it alongside your rent amount.

TELEVISION SERVICE

American Forces Network (AFN)

AFN Provides programming from current U.S. networks and prime channels. You can use a decoder and satellite for AFN when living on the German economy, or sign up for the AFN Now streaming service.

Streaming Services

Show variety and availability may be limited because you are outside of the U.S. Use of a Virtual Private Network (VPN) can allow you to access certain U.S. programming. Examples include Amazon Prime, Netflix, Hulu, etc.

ALLOWANCES

Service members on PCS orders typically receive a monthly OHA.

- You must aggressively seek off-post housing while at TLA. You are required to view three listings within the first 15 days and then a minimum of five listings each additional week while on TLA.
- Your OHA rate is based on your rank and location. Visit www.defensetravel.dod. mil/site/oha.cfm to get the current OHA amount.
- Another financial entitlement is Dislocation Allowance (DLA). DLA is used to offset or reimburse expenses due to a PCS. Talk to the Finance Office for more information.

GOVERNMENT CIVILIAN PERSONNEL ON PCS/TCS ORDERS TYPICALLY RECEIVE A MONTHLY LQA

You should have received an LQA Determination of Eligibility from the Civilian Human Resources Agency. If not, please see your civilian administrator prior to locating temporary lodging. TQSA may be approved up to 60 days and submissions must be made every 30 days.

MOVE-IN HOUSING ALLOWANCE (MIHA)

MIHA is a one-time allowance to cover the move-in costs associated with moving into a new place at the start of a PCS.

- Use www.defensetravel.dod.mil/site/ oha.cfm to get the current MIHA amount.
- Check with the Housing Office for any other allowances you may be entitled to.
- Military and civilian personnel on longterm TDY orders receive per diem.
- Personnel should consult with their
 Organizational Defense Travel Official
 to determine if "Rental/Contract" housing
 is authorized. If authorized, please visit the
 Housing Office to determine your options.

HOUSEHOLD GOODS

Contact your local transportation office when you have your orders to schedule your three authorized shipments (total weight cannot exceed 18,000 lbs.). Ship light as many of the apartments or homes are fully or partially furnished.

Three shipments:

- Unaccompanied Baggage (UB) up to 350 lbs.
- Household goods (HHG) being shipped to Poland.
- Non-Temporary Storage (NTS). Since NTS is authorized for this location, you may want to leave some of your larger furniture and appliances in storage for the duration of your overseas tour.

Once your household goods arrive, make sure every box that was shipped has arrived. Mark each item off your inventory list as everything is being unloaded.

INSPECT YOUR HOME

In order to avoid liability for damages to your home or property caused by the movers, take note of the damages on your household goods paperwork. Note everything that isn't right such as missing boxes or damaged goods. Be sure to make copies of all the paperwork and take pictures of any damages.

FILING A CLAIM

You have 75 days to submit a notice of loss or damage report in the Defense Personal Property System from the scheduled delivery date. From that point, you will have nine months to submit your claim in order to be eligible for a full replacement value.

- Be sure to have photos and receipt purchases of your damaged goods.
- Keep any paperwork until all claims are processed.

APPLIANCE TIPS

- You will need a power converter/transformer to use your American electronics (110-v plug) in your Polish home.
- Transformers are to be negotiated with the landlord.
- Check with your landlord for specifications on appliance size. ■

The Hero Care Center verifies all information before composing a delivery message and sending it to the deployment team for delivery to your command. Once delivered to command, command will deliver message to the service member.

Note: The American Red Cross DOES NOT decide whether you go home. That is a command decision. The Red Cross provides information to help make that decision.

Site Management/Administration

The Site Lead is responsible for the management and administration of the deployment site. This includes balancing the budget, recording data events, maintaining inventory of comfort kits and blankets, and maintain the Red Cross pantry called "The Drop Zone." Often this requires the assistance of volunteers.

The Drop Zone

The Drop Zone is the primary pantry of the American Red Cross containing snacks, hygiene items, and other items donated to the Red Cross for the service members. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. or by appointment with the Site Lead. Upon entry, please fill out the customer contact log. They track weekly the number of people that visit. Additional supplies can be found in Bldg. 52, in the MWR on the 3rd Floor and in the cabinets next to the coffeemaker on the first floor of Bldg. 2.

Note: Please be respectful and keep this room clean. Do not abuse the privilege.



PET INFORMATION

When PCSing overseas or outside the continental United States, service members may be authorized a Pet Transportation Allowance for the transportation costs of one pet. The reimbursement cap is \$2,000.

ARRIVING IN POLAND

Pets younger than three months are not allowed to enter Poland. Before you ship or travel with your pet, you must obtain:

- All pets must have a valid rabies vaccination taken at least 21 days before they arrive in Poland.
- ✓ EU Health Certificate, which cannot be older than 10 days before arriving in Europe. Military vets are usually familiar with this certificate, but civilian vets may need several weeks to order the certificate from the Department of Agriculture.
- ✓ Electronic microchip (ISO 11784/11785) 15-digit or compatible pet microchip implant. If your pet already has a microchip implant that is not ISO compatible, you can bring your own microchip scanner (or you can rent it from the microchip's manufacturer)
- EU pet passport certifying a valid anti-rabies vaccination. If more information is required please visit: https://www. pettravel.com/immigration/poland.cfm.

Transportation and Quarantine

Cat and dog transportation and quarantine charges are not a separately reimbursable expense but may be claimed as Miscellaneous Expense Allowance (MEA) as authorized for civilian employees. To qualify, civilians must elect "actual" expense (itemized) verses "flat rate."

Non-transportation and handling pet-related expenses are not reimbursable. See the DTMO website for details on these expenses. When a traveler does not use a City Pair Program airfare because a pet cannot travel on the same aircraft, the government is not financially responsible for costs greater than the most economical travel method.

VACCINATIONS

Poland accepts 1-, 2- and 3-year vaccines. The following lists the vaccines that must be kept current.

Dogs

- · Rabies vaccination
- Distemper combo vaccination (DA2PP)
- Leptospirosis vaccination in the pet's lifetime. Two doses of leptospirosis vaccine is recommended (primary and booster).

Cats

- · Rabies vaccination
- Feline distemper (FVRCP) vaccine in the pet's lifetime

During the summer months, be sure to keep your pet hydrated and provide booties to protect their paws on the hot ground. For airline travel, note that most airlines will not ship pets during the summer months.



POLISH FOODS TO TRY

Breakfast

Kasza Manna | This simple semolina porridge is a staple in Polish kids' (and busy adults') diets. Its base consists of only three ingredients: Semolina, milk and sugar. However, you can make it your own with whatever else you want to add such as fruits, jams, nuts, honey, etc.

Racuchy z Jabłkami | While it may look hard to say, this is another simple Polish dish, pancakes with apples. Simply add thinly sliced or grated apples to your pancake batter and fry. The result is crispy on the outside and fluffy on the inside.

Kielbasa Breakfast Skillet | You can use a variety of Polish foods to create this savory breakfast. Sliced Polish sausage and potato pancakes (placki ziemniaczane) can be the base to which you add your favorite skillet ingredients such as eggs, vegetables or cheese.

▶ Lunch

Żurek | If soup in a bread bowl is your go-to Panera Bread meal, then you will feel right at home with this sour rye soup dish that has been served in a bread bowl since its inception. It consists of fermented rye, egg and sausage and is also known to be a good answer to a hangover.

Zapiekanki | Nothing says lunch like a sandwich. These open-faced sandwiches are made with half a baguette and a combination of meats, mushrooms, peppers, cheese and topped with ketchup. They are a great late-night snack after dancing at the disco.

Rosół | This brothy chicken bowl is a great way to dip your toe into Polish foods. This hearty soup consists of onion, celery, chicken, parsley and leeks and is meant to utilize leftovers.

Snack

- Oscypek | You can only find this cheese in Poland. It is so in demand that the EU financially supports farmers and cheese makers in Poland so that they can produce enough of it. It has a unique taste and appearance that is created from smoking sheep's milk and shaping it into ovals or barrels.
- Chleb Żytni with Pflaumenmus | For a sweet snack, spread some Polish plum jam on Polish rye bread. The cinnamon sticks and bourbon vanilla sugar add a tasty kick to the jam.
- Naleśniki | Polish crepes can be sweet or savory. Stuff these thin crepes with meats, cheeses, vegetables, jams, chocolate or whatever you like to satisfy any snack craving.

Dinner Main Courses

- Gołąbki | This traditional pork-stuffed cabbage is a great main dish, or even an appetizer or side dish. Tomato puree tops cabbage stuffed with pork shoulder, rice, onion and bread crumbs.
- Kotlet Schabowy | This is a Polish take on German schnitzel. You can never go wrong with fried breaded pork cutlets.
- Ryba Po Grecku | This fish dish is made from the white fish of your choice, tilapia, perch or pike and smothered in a vegetable and tomato sauce.
- Kielbasa | You cannot talk about Polish food without talking about Polish sausage. You

can make it with whatever meat you have handy, and it goes great with potatoes, pasta or rice.

Side Dishes

- Kluski Ślaskie | These dumplings hail from Poland's southwest region of Silesia and incorporate the delectable ingredients of potatoes and bacon.
- Mizeria | This cucumber salad is similar to tzatziki in taste. This combination of cucumber, vinegar, sour cream, dill and seasonings goes great with a meat and potato dish.
- Pierogi | These dumplings are the most well-known and popular of the Polish dishes and it is no secret why. Stuffed with savory fillings such as cheese, meats or vegetables, there is a pierogi recipe for everyone. You can often find walk-up windows or dine-in options to try them.

Dessert

- Paczki | Polish donuts are made from a sweet, yeasty dough that is fried and filled with your choice of jam, cream, chocolate or lemon curd.
- Sernik | What makes this cheesecake Polish is the use of twaróg cheese, a variation of cottage or quark cheese. Top with fruits or chocolate to make it to your liking.
- Pierniki | These gingerbread treats are both a dessert and a souvenir from the city of Toruń. You can see this treat in cookie or cake form and is mostly a Christmas treat, but you can eat it all year.

SHOPPING

TRAVELING POST EXCHANGE

There is a traveling PX in Poland. Once a month the PX truck comes to Poznań. In addition, Powidz and Żagań host small PXs. Currently there is no commissary available.

OFF-INSTALLATION

The cost of living in Poland is among the most inexpensive in the European Union (EU). Dining out and buying groceries is generally cheaper than in most other European cities but imported items will be significantly more expensive.

Camp Kosciuszko is about one to two miles from the main business district in Poznań. however, there are also parks, shopping options, apartments and grocery stores a couple of blocks off-post.



TRASH AND RECYCLING

Recycling is a requirement in Poland. Each town can be on different trash and recycling pick-up schedules — so be sure to ask your landlord or neighbors for how and when to dispose of waste properly.

Deposit machines can be found at shopping centers, such as the most common convenience store chain in Poland, Żabka. These deposits take plastic and glass bottles, and aluminum cans in exchange for store points or discounts.

Your nearest recycling center or "Ekoport," is the place to drop off bulk or hazardous waste.




