
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
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Mont Saint-Michel

The tiny village of Mont Saint-Michel, France, sits on a tidal island off the west coast of Normandy. Its skyline is dominated by the Abbey of Mont-Saint-Michel, which was founded in 966 at the site of a chapel popular with Christian pilgrims for more than 200 years. Over the centuries more pilgrims came, which contributed to its wealth, increased its political influence and helped with the development of the village.

Until a raised road was built in 1879, the island was only accessible by boat during high tide and surrounded by dangerous quicksand during low tide.

The area was occupied by German soldiers during World War II, and a small contingent of Luftwaffe members was stationed at the island to man an aircraft tracking station built atop the abbey. The island became a popular tourist destination for off-duty German soldiers. On D-Day, the 6th of June 1944, Allied forces invaded France on the northern beaches of Normandy roughly 100 kilometers north of Mont Saint-Michel. As German soldiers fled south, some sought safety at the island with stories of men arriving barefoot and collapsing from exhaustion.

Over the course of the following months, the German military led a massive retreat as Allied forces liberated the region. On Aug. 1, 1944, an Allied publicity unit was sent to Mont-Saint-Michel where they accepted the surrender of any Germans who had been unable to retreat.

In 1979, Mont Saint-Michel was added to the UNESCO list of World Heritage Sites. The abbey remains an active religious order with two monastic groups still welcoming pilgrims.

Roccadion is Stuttgart's newest climbing gym conveniently located 3-4 minutes from Panzer Kaserne. With walls up to 18.5m tall, this climbing gym also sports a bistro with delicious pizza and a few traditional German beers.

My girlfriend discovered Roccadion through one of her work colleagues who asked her to go along to a basic climbing course. Soon after, she earned her top rope certification, and she was hooked.

One Friday night, she asked if I would go with her to try it out. With the promise of learning a new skill and spending some quality time together, I naturally obliged. 45 minutes into climbing, my forearms were screaming, and my heart was full; I could see what she was excited about!

We've been back to Roccadion multiple times, and yet every experience feels different. Because the staff change the "rock faces" every week, we're constantly challenged with new routes to conquer. We've even gotten to the point that we're able to spot each other's next move from the ground, leading to increased conversation and trust while climbing. Rock climbing has quickly become one of our go-to "lazy" date night ideas if we don't want to decide where to eat or what to do.

If it's your first time at an indoor climbing gym, planning ahead will be key for your visit to Roccadion. As with all climbing facilities in Germany, Roccadion requires you to be top rope certified before climbing (and no, not Stone Cold Steve Austin top rope, rock climbing top rope). If you're thinking, "Well, I'm just looking for a fun two or three hour date night idea" then Roccadion probably isn't for you. However, if you're looking for something new you can continually do together as a couple, then start by signing up for their basic sport climbing course. You'll become top rope certified through a member of the German Alpine Club (DAV) and the certification will follow you around for the rest of your tour in Germany.

The course will teach you and your partner how to properly wear the harness, how to use the rope and safety devices involved in rock climbing, and the most important part: how to tie knots! With a maximum of nine fellow adventure junkies, the course requires you and your partner to meet for two 4.5 hour appointments to learn and practice everything required for rock climbing. From there, you'll be turned loose on a 2,800m2 indoor/outdoor climbing course with endless challenging routes. ■

INDOOR ADVENTURES Conical vs

e are always looking for the perfect adventure, but it's hard to decide what that looks like. Do you see yourself basking in tropical waters and sitting on sandy palm-lined beaches? Or, do you prefer the arctic chill of fresh snow and ice, feeling the freeze as you freestyle downhill?

Lucky for you, both adventures can be tackled year-round at indoor facilities across Europe. Here are the two biggest contenders: Tropical Islands Resort, an hour south of Berlin, is the world's largest indoor water park, while SNØ, situated in the suburbs of Oslo, is Europe's largest indoor ski resort. But that is just the tip of the iceberg.

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In the dreariest of German winters, it's not uncommon to fantasize about swimming in sunny, warm waters. At Tropical Islands, that dream vacation can be a reality without the need to fly beyond Europe.

Themed areas allow you to travel around the world. The Tropical Village features restaurants, hotels, and entertainment that reflect the architecture of Southeast Asia. But, these aren't just inspired fantasies, they were traditionally built and created with the help of local architects and the tourism boards from Thailand, Samoa, Bali and Borneo.

The world's largest indoor rainforest is also housed in the Tropical Islands dome. The rainforest is biologically managed and is home to flamingoes, peacocks, turtles, fish and a new butterfly garden. Instead of chemicals, insects and soil bacteria are used to keep the ecosystem in balance. You may see a beetle scurry past the sandy beach and, just like in nature, it has a job to do. The rainforest sits between the waterfalls and grottos of the lagoon and the massive Südseean indoor ocean and wave pool surrounded by a long sandy beach.

There is plenty of adventure, as well, with two beachside water-play areas full of slides and sprayers for the kids (and kids at heart). There are 13 slides in all, plus even more kid adventures to be had out of the water. Between the large climbing playground, indoor hot air balloon, mini golf, and the Treasure Island arcade, kids of all ages can have some dry fun as well.

The Amazonia area is outside, but heated water keeps it open year-round. Here you can try your hand at surfing, or ride along Germany's longest whitewater slide. If you'd rather relax, Amazonia has a massive selection of pool spaces with massage jets, jacuzzi beds and bubbles galore.

In keeping with the scale of things, Tropical Islands also hosts Germany's largest tropical sauna and spa area. This is a textile-free zone, meaning you must be nude but wrapped in a towel. It has numerous hot saunas, spa services like clay treatments and massage, and an air-conditioned gym.

Tropical Islands was first opened in 2004 and is housed in a gigantic former airship hangar. Interestingly, the resort is located on the former Nazi-built Brand-Briesen Airfield, but the airship hangar is a modern development. Following the reunification of Germany, the CargoLifter company bought the airfield intending to develop airships for heavy cargo transit. The giant hangar was built to produce and construct the gigantic CL160 airship, but only a small prototype was ever created. When the company went bankrupt in 2002 the Malaysian-based company, Tanjong, bought the hangar and the grounds to build Tropical Islands.

The resort truly aims to be a destination of its own with numerous unique overnight options, from tent camping on the sand to lodges beside the waterfall, there is a lot of variety. In addition, there are plenty of meal options. A food court satisfies any cravings, while three restaurants offer international and Asian delights. For a special night out, try one of the five waterside lounges to sip a fruity cocktail from a striped paper straw (surprise: you're still in Germany).

SNØ

On the flip side, the magic of winter can be found year-round (yes, even during the hot summer) at Norway's SNØ facility.

There are ski slopes for all abilities, and an indoor controlled climate means excellent slope conditions all the time. With one massive indoor hillside, the five impressive trails are easily accessible to all. So, while you tackle the red Racing Hill, your kids could be improving their skills nearby on the blue Fjon Hill. Three lifts—a chair lift, a button and a magic carpet bring everyone back to the top with ease.

Park rats can hit the jumps and rails on the 300 meters of freestyle slope, and then quickly take the chairlift back to do it again. You'll get a lot of airtime here! There are even freeski courses to help you move those terrain park skills to the next level.

For total newbies, there are plenty of ski course options and equipment rentals available right at SNØ. Most beginner courses take place over two days, with formal instruction for 90 minutes each day. This is a great place to hone your abilities. Classes cover all levels of alpine skiing, plus snowboarding, cross-country skiing, and even ice climbing.

How can they fit all that in one facility? Well, the cross-country course is ingeniously suspended on a mezzanine in the rafters of the enormous building. At one kilometer in length, it's a no-joke workout space perfect for snow lovers with twists, turns and hills to climb and descend. The total elevation change is an impressive 32 meters.

The Mammoth Wall is an ice-climbing wall. The 15-meter-high ice block is one of the biggest in Europe. With a front-facing beginner area and rear technical zone for drop-in pros only, it's a wonder to behold. The wall is especially monumental in the heat of summer when ice climbing enthusiasts, and learners alike, can still train on real ice.


For off-piste fun, visit the JumpYard where trampolines run the show. This full-body fun and exercise zone has it all: rock climbing walls, ropes courses, obstacle runs and more. For a more traditional workout, you can visit the modern Sportytude gym.


The SNØ structure was built with environmental sustainability in mind. In fact, the building produces energy, sending an excess of 23 percent into Snøbyen—the area around the facility. This means that both the heat generated from the machinery at SNØ and its extra cooling is not wasted. The Snøbyen district is a sports-minded planned city that currently has a large shopping area and business park.

For those who want to soak up the wintry atmosphere, the adjacent Thon Hotel Snø is a must. With ski-in / ski-out rooms right on the slope, there is a true resort feel. In addition, there is a café and two winter-inspired restaurants on the premises. The Snøfonna offers a big, varied lunch buffet, while the Rifugio della Nonna keeps things alpine with northern Italian favorites.

The best part about visiting SNØ is that there will never be a white out nor will the summer sun ever melt your dream of a perfect ski day out.

HISTORY OF COMIC CONS

In 1964, the first one-day comic convention (comic con) was held in New York City, drawing around 100 attendees. The event was organized by Jerry Bails, the "father of comic fandom" and creator of The Academy of Comic-Book Fans and Collectors (ACBFC).

In Europe, the Italian Lucca Comics & Games held its first gathering in 1965. This classic comic con is now the second largest in the world and a must for die-hard comic book and role-playing game fans.

In 1968, the U.K. held its first ComicCon. Many of the first British Comic Art Conventions (as they were officially titled) were organized by Bram Stokes, the "godfather of British fandom," and owner of the iconic Dark They Were and Golden Eyed Bookshop in London.

However, it wasn't until July 1, 1970, when the Golden State Comic Book Convention opened its doors that the world of fandom hit the mainstream. In 1973, it became the iconic San Diego Comic-Con.

Throughout the 1980s and 1990s, comic cons grew into massive pop culture events around the world. With the incorporation of comic book plotlines into mainstream media, film and TV, their popularity popularity in the 2000s has swelled.



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WHAT HAPPENS AT COMIC CON?

When I walked into my first Comic Con in Dortmund, Germany, I was shocked at how big the event was.

There were hourly discussions and guest panels with famous individuals on the main stage. Plus, there were talks on the smaller stage that ranged in topic from props to the psychology of Star Trek. During panels, an open microphone was available, and I learned to line up early when I had questions for my favorite cast.

A big part of the convention was given over to personal interactions with the actors and personalities. It cost extra for these brief meet-and-greet sessions with the actors, and prices ranged based on their popularity. I opted for a professional photo with my favorite actor, and it is prominently tacked to my office wall. Autograph sessions and quick selfie time were also on offer.

Later, I wandered a massive marketplace where vendors sold all kinds of items related to comic culture, film and TV, and gaming. There were T-shirts, collectors' items, comic books, cosplay outfits and even realistic weapon replicas. Link's Master Sword was calling to me.

An entire section of the convention was dedicated to cosplay with sets created for free picture taking. A few had small additional fees for extras like a photo printout. I was happy to pay one euro for an ice cream cone (a real one: I ate it) to go with my Scoops Ahoy pic.

It took me a while to understand that pictures were welcome from personal cosplayers as well, I just needed to ask. After that, I took selfies with every Jedi, superhero and Genshin Impact character I came across.

Another large part of the convention was dedicated to an artisan's market where I made a few purchases from very talented individuals. There were jewelers, painters, digital artists and crafters all with their own style and take on film, comic or game art.

Even die-hard fans get hungry, so food trucks were parked throughout the convention center, plus there was a food court with picnic tables and seating.
