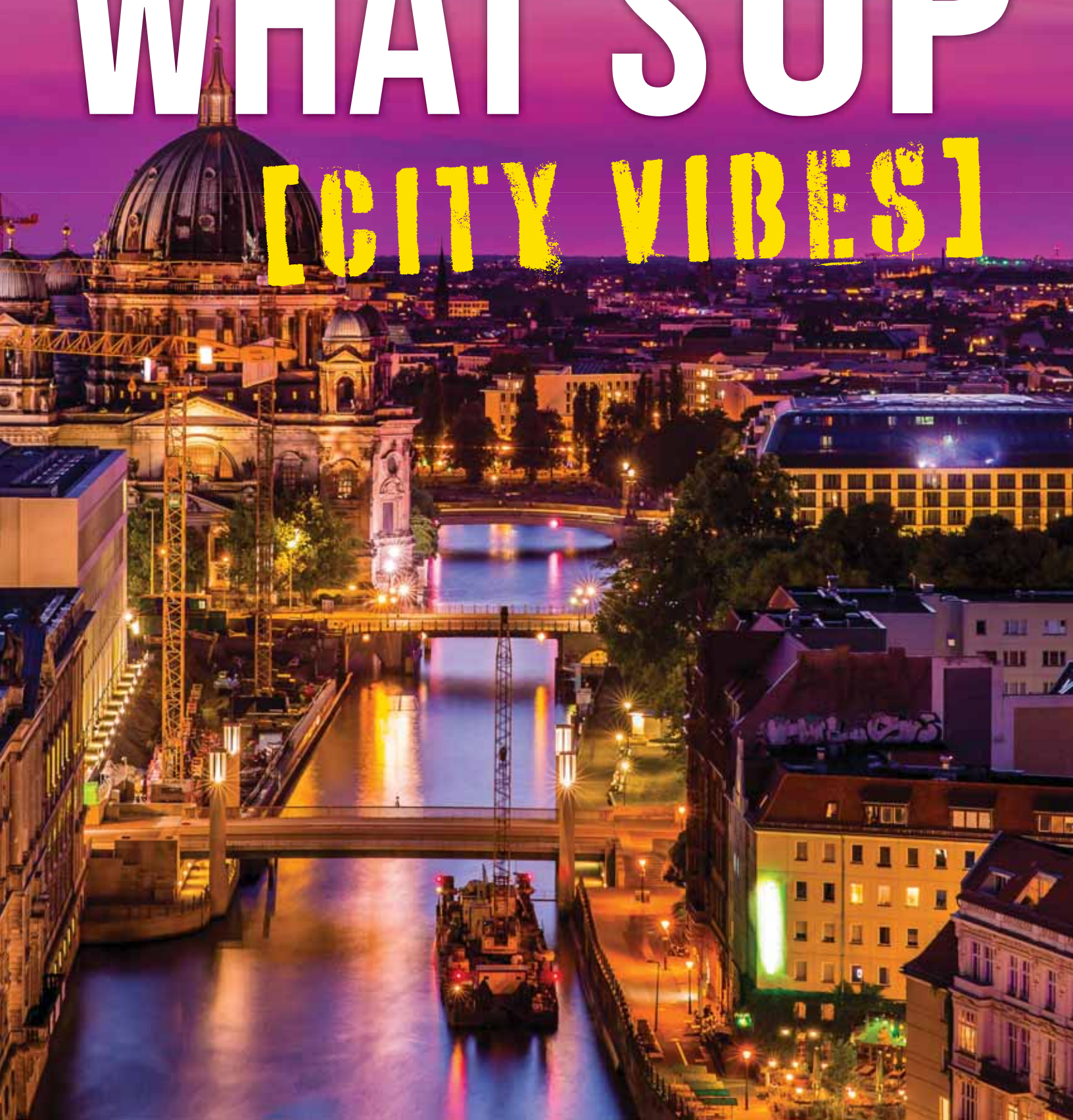


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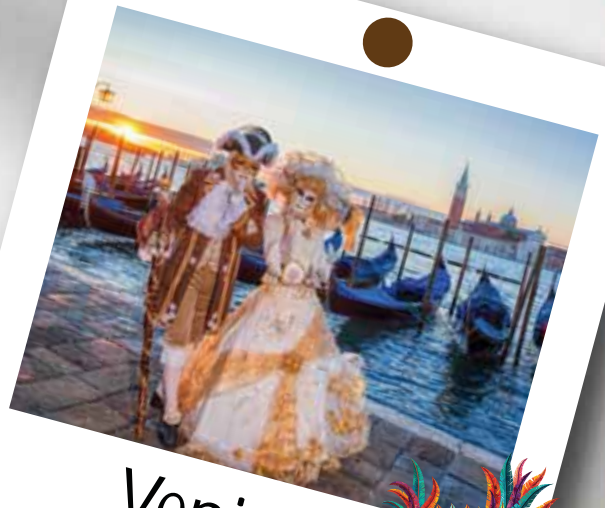
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# PLAN AHEAD

## BAVARIA

BavariaCon 2026, Munich | Feb 14–15, 2026

“Pack your dice bag, grab your little brother, and then it’s off to... **BavariaCon 2026!**” This event is for everyone: from those curious to learn more about tabletop gaming and role-playing games to serious gamers. Special role-playing sessions are held for kids. Visitors can explore Artist Alley, sign up for role-playing sessions led by game masters, shop plenty of vendors to stock up on loot and attend a workshop or reading from special guests. Last year’s event sold out, so be sure to secure your tickets early.



## KAISERSLAUTERN

Gimmeldinger Almond Blossom Festival | Feb. 21–April 6, 2026

Every year, the soft pink *Pfälzer Mandelblüte*, or Palatinate almond blossoms, line the German Wine Street. You can take a self-guided stroll or bike ride along the route, which is 100 kilometers from Bockenheim through the wineries in the Palatinate to Schweigen Rechtenbach. The main event is the Gimmeldinger Almond Blossom Festival, where visitors are invited to walk along the pink trail of more than 2,000 trees. Winegrowers, restaurateurs and other vendors set up stalls to offer regional wines like fitting pink Rosé and almond-inspired delicacies.



## SPANGDAHLEM

Cologne Carnival | Feb. 12–18, 2026

This week-long event is a staple in German culture. For six days before Lent, there will be parades, parties and balls. While all the days are packed with costumes and fun, the highlight is the **Rose Monday Parade** on Feb. 16, which has been one of the largest parades in Germany since 1823. Enjoy watching miles of dance performances, foot groups and decorated floats. Listen to music by the “*Blaue Funken*” while trying to catch sweets and flowers thrown by the parade members.



## STUTTGART

Stuttgart International Bach Festival | March 13–28, 2026

This annual festival of classical music is presented by the International Bach Academy. Famous Baroque composer, Johann Sebastian Bach was a German musician. The 15-day event showcases aspiring and seasoned musicians from around the world performing Bach’s music along with the works that inspired him. There will be soloists and ensembles. In 2025, the theme was “Bach and Latin America.” 2026’s theme is yet to be determined; however, it is recommended to purchase your tickets in advanced.



## WIESBADEN

23rd Wiesbaden Easter Market | March 20–22, 2026

The Hesse region is known for its Batik eggs, where beeswax is used to resist the dyes to create interesting patterns and designs. At the Easter market, you can enjoy shopping from 70 stalls for hand-painted eggs and Easter decorations. There is also a craft and fabric market to explore. Stilt walkers and Easter bunnies will hand out candy, and kids can ride the carousel, get their faces painted or participate in crafting activities. Frankfurt will also have an Easter market around this time, located at the Dominican Monastery. ■



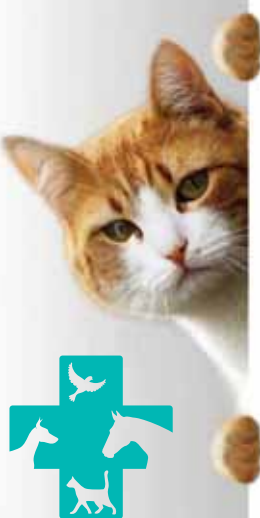

## Köln Karneval

**A**round the world, Christians of various traditions party hard before the somber period of Lent. It may be called Carnival in Rio or Mardi Gras in New Orleans, but in the Rhineland of Germany it is called *Karneval*, in Bavaria it is *Fasching* and in Baden-Württemberg this celebration is known as *Fastnacht*.

The city of Köln (Cologne), however, hosts the biggest Karneval in Germany, and this place does not hold back. It is a must to be dressed up in some kind of crazy costume, especially for the biggest event: the *Rosenmontag* (Rose Monday) parade, held this year on Feb. 16, 2026.

In Köln, the Karneval cheer is “Alaaf!” It is short for “All af Kölle,” which means everything (all) below Cologne. Yell this at floats as they pass by and you can expect candy, or maybe even a rose, to be thrown in your direction. ■

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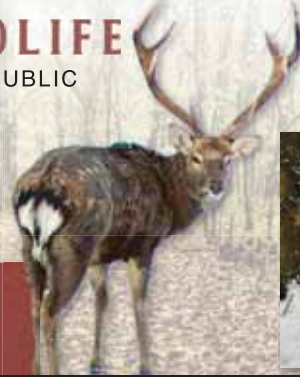
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# WANDERING IN WÜRZBURG

Baroque architecture, rooms draped in royal adornment, a wine bridge and a historical fortress. All of this can be found in Würzburg, Germany, a charming Bavarian city with a dynamic buzz. It is an emblem of history, having a Celtic origin, briefly serving as the unofficial capital of the Holy Roman Empire and surviving extensive bombing during World War II.

## ROYALTY AND GARDENS

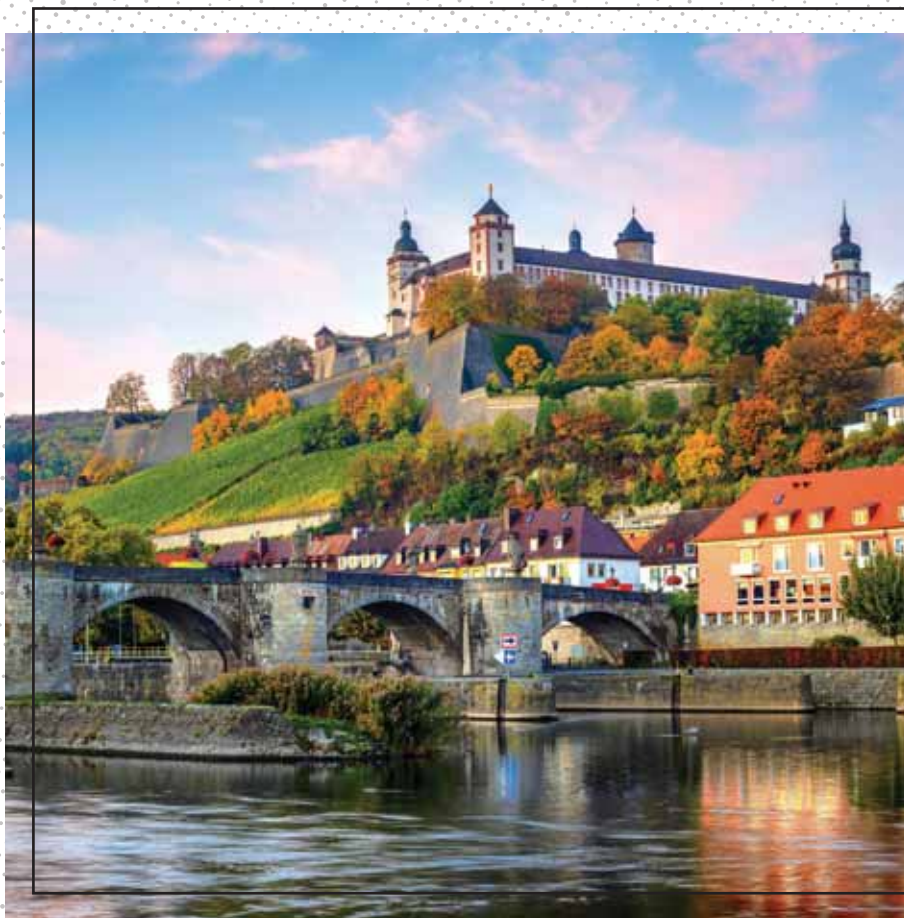
I began my day by parking in front of the **Würzburg Residence**, one of Bavaria's most extravagant palaces. Before I reached the entrance, I was drawn to an open gate, leading into an extensive garden that was free to enter. Along the sculpted paths, I found hidden artworks—fantastical stone-carved characters like a faun playing a pan flute at the base of dense, manicured hedges. I spied a row of benches under some shady trees and sat for a while admiring the flowers and views of the Baroque facade of the residence. Behind the residence, the garden expanded into a labyrinth of pathways, fountains, groves and stairs. I could have spent my entire day amongst the lush greenery, but alas, I still wanted to view inside and later, get a sense of the city.

I paid my 10€ entry fee and ascended a grand staircase where a fresco of horses and chariots danced across the ceiling. It was painted by Venetian artist Giovanni Battista Tiepolo and is considered the largest fresco in the world. Each room in the residence had lavish decor. Some included: impressive murals stretched across the walls, marble columns with designs dripping down to the floors and one Southern Imperial apartment was nearly entirely adorned with mirrors trimmed in gold. One of my favorite rooms, a Northern Imperial apartment, was coated in a rich green lacquer. The residence oozed royalty—a perfect accumulation of Baroque, Rococo and Neoclassical design.



# KAFFEE, BRÖTCHEN AND BRIDGE PUB

After touring the residence, I made my way through the city for a coffee break. There were plenty of cafés and cute shops. I settled on **Brötzeitbar**, where instead of the traditional *Kaffee und Kuchen*, coffee with spreads on bread like an open-faced sandwich were served. The shop owner did have a couple of pastry selections, which is what I was craving. I tried a gluten-free lemon almond cake. The lemon frosting paired perfectly with the latte I ordered. As I continued my journey, I saw another café offering *Brötchen und Kaffee*, perhaps a new tradition in Würzburg. About a 20-minute walk from the residence, I climbed some steps leading to the **Alte Mainbrücke** (Old Main Bridge) and the **Brückenschoppen** (Bridge pub). To me, this felt like the heart of the city—a place where locals and tourists gathered, enjoying the views over the Main River, sipping on the specialty bridge wine and soaking up some sunshine.



## THE MARIENBERG FORTRESS

The bridge leads to the **Marienberg Fortress**, a quaint castle perched atop a hill of vineyards. A symbol of Würzburg, it was the original castle on the Marienberg settled during Bronze Age. Prince-bishops resided there prior to the Würzburg Residence. Short on time, I admired the fortress from the bridge. If I had been able to, I would have hiked up the hill to visit the **Museum of Franconia** to see impressive artworks such as the world's largest collection of Riemenschneider sculptures, the bronze cult chariot from Acholshausen and paintings by masters like Tiepolo. Then, I might have ended the day with a coffee or Bavarian-style beer at the cafe at the top. This might be the best spot for panoramic views of the river and the entire city. I imagine at sunset it would be especially beautiful to look out at all the rich history and culture you experienced that day. ■

## BERLIN

It's the metropolis that embraces some of Germany's most distinctive restaurants and shopping, art and night-clubs, with special venues for any subculture imaginable. It is also full of evocative historical WWII sites that can leave you feeling ruefully reflective. There are over 200 museums in Berlin, each telling a unique story as varied as the city itself.

## TAKE THE TRAIN

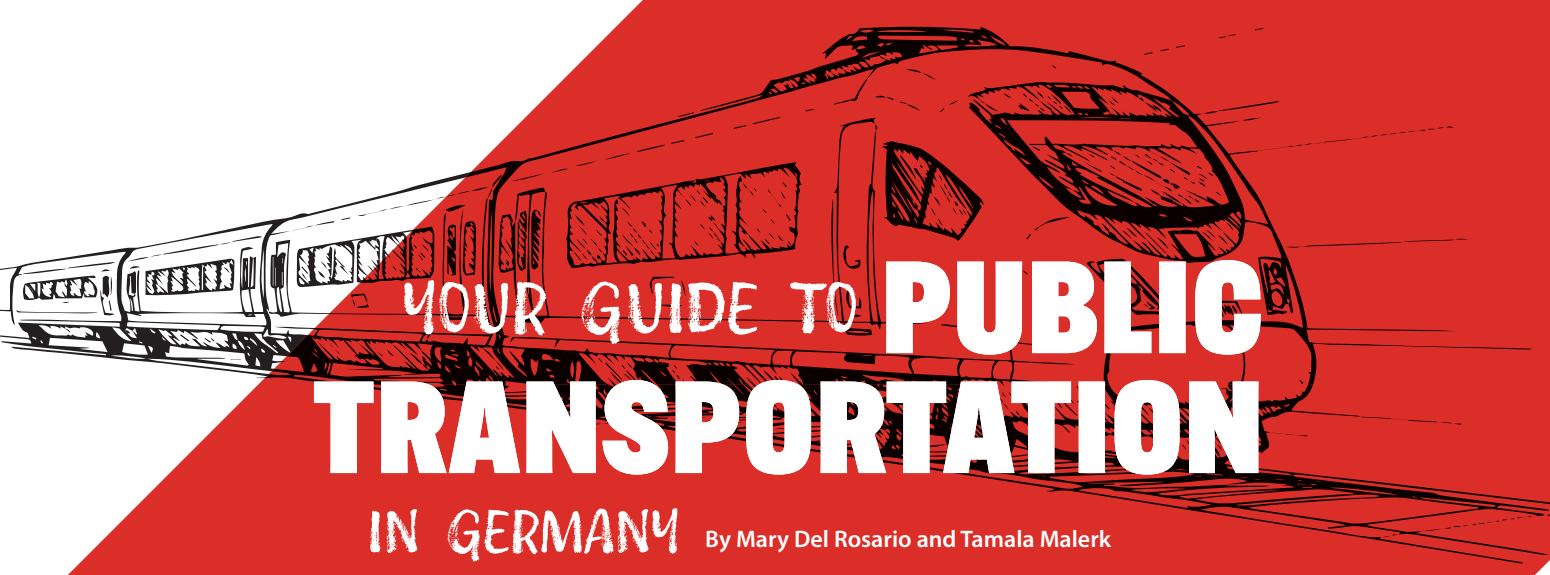
It may be tempting to drive to your new favorite city, but taking the train is often the best way to experience urban life. Many German cities have air quality restrictions requiring you to have a green low-emission vehicle compliance sticker in the *Umweltzone*. In addition, city parking is expensive and can be stressful with busy streets and underground parking lots designed for small cars.

The Deutsche Bahn ([int.bahn.de](http://int.bahn.de)) often offers ticket rates comparable to fuel and parking fees and eliminates concerns about traffic congestion. Kids up to the age of 14 are typically free when their tickets are booked with an adult, and young adults travel at discounted rates. The earlier you book, the cheaper your train fare will be.

For large groups, driving and parking outside the city may be the most cost-effective way to arrive. Using the local transit network can then be quite easy as most cities offer day passes and ticket kiosks in many languages. ■







# YOUR GUIDE TO PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION IN GERMANY

Tired of driving on unfamiliar roads? Planning your next three-day weekend getaway? Relax and soak up the views of Europe as a passenger on the bus, train and tram.

## TAKING PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION ACROSS GERMANY

### TRAINS:

Germany's rail systems are efficient, comfortable and affordable. You can go to Paris for as little as €44 if you remember to book in advance. The **Deutsche Bahn (DB)** railway system is first-rate, and you can choose from four types of trains depending on your destination, schedule and budget.



The **Inter City Express (ICE)** connects to major European cities, such as Munich, Hamburg and Paris. It is usually the quickest way to get from point A to point B, but it can be expensive. I took the ICE from Mannheim to Berlin, and it cut the commute from a seven-hour drive to a five-hour train ride.

The **Regional Express (RE)** connects regional destinations with larger cities.

The **Regional Bahn (RB)** connects smaller cities and towns.

The **S-Bahn (Suburban Train)** stops at every station.



### BUSES:

Buses can be an efficient way to get around in the bigger cities. One-way trips can be as cheap as two euros within cities. I discovered it was quicker than driving to use the bus while in Frankfurt.



### HELPFUL TIPS:

If you are skeptical about public transportation, check out these apps and websites to make your travels in Germany a piece of cake.

**DB Navigator** is a free app where you can book tickets, get up-to-date information concerning delays/canceled trains, and, best of all, use the fare saver finder to look for the cheapest fares available.

**VRN Ticket** is a free app for the Rhein-Neckar region which gives real-time schedules for regional buses, pedestrian routes, ticket prices and local traffic. You can find out which bus number to take, when it departs and where to get on/off.

**TaxiFareFinder.com** is a website that helps those who want to calculate taxi fares between two destinations. For example, the estimated fare from Ramstein Air Base to Kaiserslautern is €30.69.

Purchase rail tickets for long-distance travel at your local station and use a value-added tax (VAT) form to save a percentage on fares within Germany. If you have travel flexibility, check out the last-minute deal section of the Deutsche Bahn website ([www.bahn.de](http://www.bahn.de)).

**Google Maps** has been indispensable for me when navigating public transportation across Europe. Whether I am on a bus, train or tram, this app informs which routes I can choose from and how many stops will be made. You can even search in advance to plan out the route for the day. If cell service could be an issue, download a local area map prior to travel.

Always carry cash, including small bills. Some buses or trains let you use a credit or debit card to board; however, sometimes only cash is accepted aboard busses and at ticket stands. Often machines will only accept small euro or local bills. ■

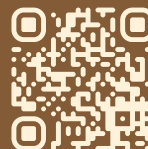
