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






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

Weinfest der Zeller Schwarze Katz / Wine Fest of the Zell Black Cat June 24 to 27, Zell




A charming village by the Mosel River is the setting for this convivial wine fest offering quality wines, culinary treats, live bands and grandiose fireworks.

July 15 to 17, Garmisch-Partenkirchen



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


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
KLOSTER EBERBACH

n enchanting afternoon awaits visitors to Eberbach Monastery, located in the Hesse region and one of Europe's most wellpreserved medieval complexes. A quick 25-minute drive outside of Wiesbaden or a longer 1 hour-and-15minute drive from Kaiserslautern, this 900-year-old monastery is open to visit and enjoy one of its oldest occupations: wine.

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
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a day at KLOSTER EBERBACH

Founded in 1136 by Bernhard von Clairvaux with 12 French monks, the Eberbach Monastery has long been associated with fine wines of the Rheingau, as it was a primary occupation of the monks. Their winemaking quickly grew and by the 15th century, the Eberbach winery was the largest in Germany. Although Eberbach was secularized in 1803, the wine industry continued to live on.

All About the Rieslings

Speaking of wines, there are many opportunities for tasting during your visit. On site, you can take a guided tour of the monastery and wine facilities, accompanied by a tasting. The wine shop is located in the former wine press house, and is fully stocked with wine for purchase and staff eager to advise you on which wines to take home. For a relaxing way to sit and sip, check out WINEBAR 1136 on-site and be sure to check their calendar of events for special wine tastings and experiences.

The winery's grape varieties include Riesling, Pinot Noir, Pinot Blanc and Pinot Gris, and the wine-making process continues to mirror the values that the monks first established: gentle processing and respect for the environment. Because the Riesling is one of the region's most popular grapes, you won't be surprised to hear that Eberbach focuses on this grape and produces some of the finest in the world.


Beyond the medieval complex of the winery, you can also find the winery's vineyards spread out in the area. These are some of the most coveted grape-growing locations and are open to visit and sip wine, such as the wine terraces on the Bergstrasse or Steinberg domains of Eberbach. Back at the main site, you can even make your visit a full weekend affair because Hotel Kloster Eberbach provides the hospitality for a complete Eberbach experience. Now for a bit of trivia. Do you know what movie was partially filmed at the Eberbach Monastery? The famous actor Sean Connery starred in "The Name of the Rose," and you can visit the movie's filming locations at the monastery during your guided tour—offered with German and English audio guides.

Gastronomy at the Monastery

After your history lesson and a preview of the wines, you may be a little peckish. Luckily, the monastery property has a few different options for you. Stop at The Gatehouse for quick and easy bites or enjoy a beautiful meal at The Monastery Tavern. Serving Cistercian cuisine, the restaurant focuses on regional and seasonal ingredients—what the monks and those in the abbey would have eaten, but with a modern and contemporary twist.

Things to Know

You can easily purchase wine or souvenirs on site, but the online wine shop also makes it easy to stock up or order gifts for wine-loving friends. Be sure to research any entrance restrictions or requirements prior to visiting, including purchasing visitor day tickets online.



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

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A LITTLE HISTORY

ales has been inhabited for hundreds of thousands of years, with evidence showing Neanderthals once roamed through the region. Wales has been part of numerous kingdoms and empires in more modern times. In the 1500s, King Henry VIII passed legislation to fully incorporate the country into what is now known as the U.K. While it has had a heavy English influence, the Welsh have steadfastly and proudly retained their culture and language.

In the 19th and 20th centuries, the plethora of iron and coal found in Wales led to an economic and industrial boom. Steelworkers and coal miners from around the U.K. settled in Wales. In the post-World War II era, the demand for steel and coal decreased drastically. As the times shifted, Wales became a devolved nation—one that is part of the U.K. but can decide how to spend and administer its budget and create many of its own laws.

MAGNIFICENT NATIONAL PARKS

Wales is home to three of the 15 national parks in the U.K.; Snowdonia in the north, Pembrokeshire Coast along the southwest shores and Brecon Beacons in the south-central part of the country. Known for its craggy peaks and namesake, Snowdon (the tallest mountain in Wales), Snowdonia is a popular spot with visitors all year. Avid hikers can ascend to the top of Snowdon for stunning views of the countryside. Centuries-old castle ruins and crumbling abbeys dot the landscape, making for fascinating hikes and treks through the park.

Further south, Brecon Beacons offers lush meadows, rolling hills, lakes and some spectacular waterfalls. Evidence of ancient Roman stone circles, burial mounds and other prehistoric landmarks can make your imagination run wild. For those who love stargazing, Brecon Beacons was the first national park in Wales (and the U.K.) to be designated as an International Dark Sky Reserve. On a clear night, visitors can look up and see an incredible blanket of twinkling stars stretching across the horizon.

Pembrokeshire Coast National Park follows 186 miles of pristine coastline in southwest Wales. Outdoor enthusiasts can hike along the shoreline in its entirety or break it up into smaller chunks. Rocky beaches teeming with marine life and waterfowl are a nature lover's paradise. Visitors can pitch a tent, rent an RV or do a little glamping along the coast.



ZIPLINING AND FOREST ADVENTURES

Adrenaline junkies will have plenty of opportunities to get their thrills. Ziplining, which consists of strapping into a harness and zipping through the landscape on a wire, is popular in Wales, and Zip World operates at four different locations in the country. Visitors can choose to soar over old mining quarries, beneath the ground through caverns or through the lush forest canopy. Zip World Penrhyn is home to the world's fastest and Europe's longest zipline. Measuring at more than 1.5 kilometers and with speeds above 100 mph, Velocity 2 will give you an adrenaline jolt like nothing else.

If ziplining is a little too extreme, but you're still looking for an outdoorsy experience, head to the town of Llangollen. This northern area offers plenty of stunning scenery and activities. The Pontcysyllte Aqueduct is one of the tallest canal aqueducts in the world, with an array of hiking trails nearby. Visitors can also partake in gorge walking—hiking along the river's edge, with plenty of sliding down rocks and rappelling along the canyon walls. Or take a less intense trek to Horseshoe Falls and enjoy all that nature has to offer.






GALIVANT THROUGH THE CAPITAL CITY

Sometimes the urban jungle is more appealing than the rugged great outdoors. Dating back to the 1st century, Cardiff has been at the forefront of trade and export for Wales. The history, culture and traditions woven together make the capital an alluring destination to visit. Sitting atop a former Roman fort, Cardiff Castle is a great place to start. Visitors can explore the Norman Keep, Castle Apartments and tunnels used as air-raid shelters during the war or simply walk the gardens and enjoy the beautiful exterior of the imposing fortress.

The Norwegian Church is another timeless spot in the city. During the height of the Industrial Revolution, Norwegian seafarers often used the church as a landmark to guide them to port. In WWII, it was used as a refuge and meeting point. The famous Welsh children's author, Roald Dahl, was baptized and often attended services at this beautiful house of worship.

Theater and musical art aficionados will want to make a beeline to the Millennium Centre. Built with materials sourced exclusively from Wales, it's a breathtaking homage to Welsh culture. Emblazoned with the inscription, "In these stones horizons sing," in both Welsh and English, this performing arts venue is worth a visit.

When planning a trip to the U.K., veer off the beaten path and see just how enchanting and wonderful Wales can be. This tiny hidden gem of a country will not disappoint with jaw-dropping thrills, incredible countryside, coastlines and cities. ■

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













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
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ou're driving through the Welsh country-side with your best friend, family member or travel companion, surrounded by green rolling hills with sheep grazing in the fields. You think back to the delicious Welsh rarebit and bara brith fruit cake you shared, as well as the pints of beer or Welsh whiskey you tried. Memories of driving along the coast and exploring the city of Cardiff together fill your camera. Learning bits of the Welsh language and meeting locals, it is safe to say you've been charmed by this country, and you think, "what can I take home to remember this special trip?"

A Welsh lovespoon could be exactly what you're looking for. This tradition goes back to 17th-century Wales where beautifully carved spoons were given as tokens of affection, often in a romantic gesture. The spoons would be carved with symbols representing love and friendship, and it was important for the woodworking to show the skill

of the carver. Some believe that the origins of the lovespoon come from the carved "cawl" spoon, which was used to sip Welsh broth. Today, the tradition goes beyond just romance and often, spoons are gifted for special events like birthdays, anniversaries or the birth of a child. Certain symbols represent different things, such as the horseshoe meaning good luck or a ship hoping for a smooth passage through life.

Although you can find similar traditions and items elsewhere in Europe, it is believed that the tradition came from Wales. The earliest dated spoon can be found in St. Fagans National Museum of History, near the city of Cardiff. Woodcarvers and craftspeople today continue the tradition, which has expanded beyond spoons to larger pieces. One part of the lovespoon that makes it unique is how it appears to be made of multiple pieces of wood but is actually crafted from only one.

Where to Find Lovespoons

Although you could easily find a lovespoon online or even at different souvenir shops, seek out some of these shops and galleries to truly appreciate the craft and artists who are continuing the tradition today. If you're taking a road trip around Wales, why not make it a lovespoon tour and stop along the way to explore lovespoon shops and see different designs and meet craftspeople? Many shops will offer personalized items such as name engravings or symbols.

The Lovespoon Workshop:

Try your hand at making your own thanks to the resources and ideas from The Lovespoon Workshop, located near Tenby of Pembrokeshire. This family business has been hand carving spoons since 1975.

Welsh Love Spoons:

Located in the southern valleys of Wales, woodcarvers handcraft a range of intricately designed lovespoons. Carvers use lime wood from Monmouthshire to create their pieces.

The Lovespoon Gallery:

See over 300 unique lovespoons at the gallery in Mumbles, Swansea. This one-of-a-kind gallery holds the largest collection of these spoons from artists all around Wales and has been sharing and selling these pieces since 1987.

Welsh Lovespoon Studio:

This family-run business in South Wales offers both lovespoons and Celtic wall art, carved by designer Phil Arnold. They are inspired by traditions of the Celtic Nations, creating beautifully designed gifts for any occasion.



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
