Venture into the Arctic this winter at the northernmost city in the world. Alta, Norway hugs the rugged coastline of the Altafjord and is the gateway town for adventurers heading into the Finnmark Plateau, the cultural home of the Sami people.

Rock carvings from 7000 years ago have been found along the shoreline throughout the area showing the prehistoric reindeer herds of the Stone Age people who called this area home. There are scenes of hunting, fishing, and sailing in elaborate boats; activities that still draw tourists to the area.

In winter, the Polar Night of northern Norway, there are roughly six weeks when the sun does not peak above

the horizon. However, the daytime hours are immersed in a perpetual twilight of magical bluish luminosity as the sun's light reflects off the sky, sea and snow. The aurora borealis, or northern lights, also adds beautiful luminescent greens, blues and sometimes pinks to the dark night sky.

Each winter, the Sorrisniva Arctic Wilderness Lodge along the Alta River builds the world's northernmost igloo hotel from ice harvested in the valley upstream. Offering all kinds of Polar Night fun like snowmobiling, dog sledding and snowshoeing, the igloo hotel makes a luxuriously frigid home base for winter exploration.

The on-site bistro at Schönburg Castle offers breakfast for hotel guests to get you started, along with coffee and cake options for visitors. In favorable weather, it is pleasant to sit outside in the castle courtyard with its views over

the mountains and the Rhine River. A fine dining restaurant is also open Wednesday through Sunday for the ultimate datenight experience. Various dark-paneled rooms, spaces lit through leaded glass windows and romantic terraces give the restaurant the ambience of a medieval castle. They offer a daily four-course menu for a set price with gourmet options such as spaghettini with truffle cream, veal fillets, local rainbow trout, and spinach dumplings. There is something for every taste pallet.

For a romantic night in the village of Oberwesel, there is Opperman's **Restaurant**. Opperman's offers delicious fine dining with a varied menu from the vegetarian wok pan sauteed in local honey and hot sesame oil, to the SooNahe Kronprinzen-Pfanne which is fried in hot butter and served with organic cream and vegetables. Why not finish the night with a delicious crème brulee or their trilogy







Schönburg Castle is a four-star hotel featuring over 25 rooms for everyone from the solo visitor to the entire family (except the dog). For a romantic stay, they offer options with canopy beds, huge windows for beautiful natural lighting, tower rooms with balcony views, and suites with bath-

tubs for relaxing. For convenience, breakfast is included in your room rate, and you can pre-book the four-course daily dinner. If you are celebrating a special event or want to add that extra bit of romance to your stay, you can arrange for half a bottle of wine and two glasses to be set in your room upon your arrival followed by a five-course dinner with wine at the restaurant that evening. Rooms fill up far in advance, especially on holiday weekends, so plan ahead by visiting www.hotel-schoenburg.com/en.

The castle garden at Schönburg Castle is pleasant in nice weather. Meander through the garden and discover fountains, wooden figures, plants, abandoned walls, bridges, creeks, tree houses and swings. In addition, the Tower Museum is open from mid-March to mid-January on Tuesdays

through Sundays. The museum takes you through 700 years of castle history and has an observation deck with a gorgeous view of the Rhine Valley for those willing to climb the stairs. Hotel guests can visit the museum for free.

Those who wish to discover more about winemaking can schedule a "small Riesling journey." On this journey, an Oberweseler winemaker takes you on a two-hour drive through Oberwesel and the vineyards followed by a winery tour where you taste four Rieslings made in the Rhine Valley.

Oberwesel dates back to the Middle Ages and there is plenty for you to do. For a historic romantic walk, stroll along the city wall. You'll have a great view of the river and see different parts of the town at the same time. If you happen to be in town on a Friday, catch the weekly market where you can buy some local fare from fish to flowers, meats, cheeses, fruits and more. ■

The atmosphere is filled with the comforting scent of well-worn leather upholstery, aged timber, and a hint of malt from the ales on tap. A pub is the perfect place to enjoy a round of pints and top-notch grub.



*So, what's a*___ PUB CRAWL?

At its essence, a pub crawl is when you visit a few pubs and have at least one drink in each. It's about meeting new people and enjoying shared experiences. There is rarely any actual crawling unless you drink so much that you eventually can no longer remain upright. In Cambridge, a pub crawl offers a delightful experience with over a hundred pubs, conveniently located a few yards apart.

Pub Srub

Curb your hunger with these quintessentially British pub foods.

PIE & CHIPS

Savory pies make a hearty meal and are usually served with a side of peas and chips. Pies are baked with a shortcrust pastry and are filled with a combination of delicious chunky meat and veggies. For something traditional, try a steak and kidney or ham and leek pie.

SUNDAY ROAST

Typical Sunday fare, a roast may be made with beef or lamb. A roast usually comes with potatoes of any variety: mashed, roasted or fried. You can also expect a nice robust gravy, and, possibly, a side of vegetables or a Yorkshire pudding. GOOD SLEEP. GOOD DAY. GOOD LIFE.

Statting STARTED

My first pub crawl was spontaneous. My friends and I casually moseyed from one pub to the next and enjoyed a brew at each one. Enticed by crafted signs showcasing whimsical and eccentric names, we ventured into each establishment with no knowledgeled expectations.

My familiarity with British ales and cider was nonexistent. I asked a ton of questions while staring at the wide selection of drinks available. I may have, not-so-politely, resorted to ordering by way of pointing in an "I'll have what he's having" fashion.



During another visit to Cambridge, we booked an organized crawl. Our guide, William (nope, not that William), was so much fun and knowledgeable about the history of each pub. Our itinerary, near Parker's Piece, included unique and cozy pubs like The Clarendon Arms, The Elm Tree, The Free Press, The Tram Depot, and The Old Bicycle Shop. All are notable pubs with great atmosphere. Our group sipped through a selection of real ales, draught beer and wines, all while feasting on hearty British favorites such as fish and chips and Shepherd's pie.

Off-the-beaten-path recommendations from our guide added a layer of adventure. The Old Ticket Office, near the Cambridge Rail Station, is pure eye candy with its stunning restoration and a diverse lineup of craft beer, cider and spirits.

The Eagle, dating back to the 14th century, stands out as one of the oldest pubs. During World War II, Allied airmen used wax candles, lighters, and lipstick to write their names and other doodles onto the ceiling. Boasting even more historical significance, it was here in 1953 that scientists Francis Crick and James Watson



announced the discovery of DNA, thus immortalizing the pub forever.

The pub crawl captures the essence of Cambridge's history and provides a memorable exploration of the city's rich drinking culture. Each pub is unique. The walls tell stories, and every piece within seems to have a history. Even if you have no interest in drinking, it's worth a peek inside.

BANGERS & MASH

A 'banger' is typically a pork sausage, while the 'mash' is short for mashed potatoes. For this dish, a couple of bangers are often perched atop a pile of mash before the whole thing is doused in gravy. Perhaps there will also be peas.

FISH AND CHIPS

Likely the most well-known pub fare, fish and chips are a fried and salty taste treat perfect for pairing with pub beverages. The fish may be cod, plaice or haddock and is at its best when spritzed with salt and vinegar. On the side, you will find tartar sauce and a pile of mushy peas.

SHEPHERD'S PIE OR COTTAGE PIE

Neither of these special pies has a pastry crust. Instead, a minced meat and vegetable filling is placed in a small stoneware dish, topped with mashed potatoes and baked to perfection. The difference? Shepherd's pie has mince of lamb, while cottage pie has a mince of beef.





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Fan the Flanges Fan the Flanges at a German Therme By Kat Nickola

> ou can't live in Germany and not take a dip into sauna culture by visiting a therme (tare-muh). Defined by its use of natural hot springs, a therme will have spring-fed pools, saunas and relaxation spaces. Typically, the thermal pool area is for people of all ages wearing swimsuits, while a separate spa or sauna space is 'textile-free' and for adults only.

> While the pools are a fun way to test the waters, it's really the spa and saunas that my husband and I love for a romantic getaway. These are spaces full of relaxation beds, themed rooms, smaller spring-fed pools, outdoor spaces, and a variety of saunas. Treatments like massages aren't a huge part of the experience but can be added. If nudity is uncharted water for you, it's fine to keep on a wrapped towel in the sauna, and wearing a robe while walking around is the norm.

How to visit the spa

- Book tickets (and hotel) ahead.
- Bring a robe, towel and flip-flops.
- Sauna spaces are co-ed, and nudity is required (no swimsuits).
- Undress and store your items in the locker room.
- A wristband will allow purchases; pay on your way out.
- It's cool to wear your robe or towel when walking around.
- Take off your robe to enter a sauna, but use your towel to sit on.
- Cell phones are prohibited; books are welcome.
- Sauna experiences, which are included in your entry fee, will be scheduled on a board near the entrance.



For readers who are wet behind the ears, here are some highly-rated therme's for your first plunge.

Mineraltherme Böblingen, Stuttgarts

Near Panzer Kaserne south of Stuttgart, this relaxed therme is a local favorite. With five indoor and outdoor hot thermal waters, and even a music-themed floating pool, it is super relaxing. The spa area has lots of themed saunas, including some fun ones out in the pretty landscaped garden. It's a great local spot for a first dip. www.mineraltherme-boeblingen.de

SchwabenQuellen, Stuttgart

Located in the SI-Centrum entertainment center, this huge therme is usually a fully textile-free spa, but the first Saturday of each month allows bathers with swimsuits. With around-the-world theming, you can swim in the Caribbean, relax in an Egyptian hot tub, nap in the Japanese lounge, bake inside the Canadian log cabin or try the Tibetan meditation sauna. The surrounding SI-Centrum makes this a weekend getaway with two hotels, stage performances, movie theaters and numerous restaurants to choose from. www.schwabenquellen.online

Taunus Therme, Bad Homburg

North of Frankfurt, this Asian-themed therme leans into the theming so much you may just feel like you stepped off the airplane on the other side of the world. You can swim in the heated outdoor pools of the Japanese-inspired garden, relax in the colorful Persian-inspired rooms and feel the heat of the many saunas. www.taunus-therme.de Defined by its use of natural hot springs, a therme will have spring-fed pools, saunas and relaxation spaces.



Weidener Thermenwelt, Weiden



The hot springs in Baden-Baden were first used by Celts before the area was built up as a wellness destination by the Roman army. To relive the history, visit the Friedrichsbad therme where a set ritual along 17 stations is said to rejuvenate the body. If relaxation is more your style, visit the modern Caracalla Therme down the road with its large thermal pools and unique sauna spaces perfect for a calm day together. Both facilities use the local mineral-rich thermal water, and there are plenty of local hotels to choose from. www.carasana.de

Therme &rding, Munich

In northern Munich, this tropical resort claims to be the world's biggest spa. In addition to the thermal pools, the erlebnisbad is and adventure pool area full of water slides. However, it's the Roman-themed 'Sauna World' that makes this a couple's paradise. With a massive thermal pool, a plethora of themed saunas, swim-up watering holes, and unique scheduled experiences, it's easy to while away a special day.
