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

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


PHOTO of the month


The Ponte Pietra in Verona, Italy is a bridge that has been destroyed and renovated many times since the Romans built the crossing in 148 B.C. After a fifth complete rebuild following the destruction of World War II, it was reopened in 1959, and it keeps faithful to its original Roman archways. The Verona Cathedral lies beyond, which was finished in 1187 in the Romanesque style with later added gothic accents and contains marvelous frescoes from Renaissance artists.

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
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




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
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Heidelberg Castle



eautiful, historic Heidelberg Castle is the perfect destination to spend a day with a romantic getaway, shopping, or a family-friendly adventure.

UNIQUE TRADITIONS OF THE HEIDELBERG CASTLE

Heidelberg is known throughout the world for its romantic castle ruins. While the first indication of castles dates back to 1225, the first reference to Heidelberg Castle dates back to the 1600s. With its largely turbulent history, the castle was severely damaged three times by invading armies and ravaged by fire after being struck by lightning twice in a single night. This last event marked the point of its abandonment and subsequent ruin. Culturally, the castle embodies many traditions and stories, including the annual Castle Illuminations, the great Heidelberg wine barrel and the legend of Perkeo the Court Jester.

A CELEBRATION OF RUIN AND RENEWAL

Every summer, traditionally on the first Saturdays of June, July and September, Heidelberg prepares a spectacular fireworks show centered on Heidelberg's Castle and Old Bridge (Alte Brücke). A tradition since 1860, the Castle Illuminations event begins with the castle slowly glowing red with flares, symbolizing the flames of the multiple misfortunes and specifically its largest periods of destruction by the French in 1689 and 1693. After the flares die down, attention turns to the Old Bridge. An elaborate fireworks display is shot off from the bridge. The original event celebrated the arrival of Elector Palatine Friedrich V's newlywed wife, Elizabeth Stuart of England, for the first time to Heidelberg in 1613. Today, the Heidelberg Castle Illuminations attract thousands of guests to the city.

THE KING OF KEGS

Within the cellars of Heidelberg Castle sits an impressive and relatively unknown claim to fame for the city. The Heidelberg Tun (Groβes Fass) is considered one of the largest wine barrels in the world. It is specifically known as the Karl-Theodor-Fass, the fourth rendition of the enormous barrel, and was installed in 1751 (the first, known as the Johann-Casimir-Fass, in 1591). Throughout history, the Heidelberg Tun has been famously referenced by multiple authors, including Mark Twain, Jules Verne, Victor Hugo, Herman Melville and Washington Irving. The barrel no longer holds wine, but the public may view the barrel and even climb a stairway to a dance floor installed on top.



LIFE OF WINE

From the pages of history, the legendary Perkeo remains the most famous of the Heidelberg Tun's custodians. Born Clemens Pankert in South Tyrol, Perkeo was an Italian dwarf who caught the interest of Elector Palatine Charles III Philip and was taken to Heidelberg to act as his cupbearer and court jester. His ability to drink large amounts of wine despite his small size, and his classic response to those offering him wine, "Perché no?" (Italian: "Why not?"), earned him the nickname of Perkeo. There are many amusing stories and songs of Perkeo's exploits, but by far the most famous describes how after living 80 good years of drinking only wine, he suddenly grew ill. Doctors advised the jester to drink water for the first time, yet ironically after doing so, he died the next day.

In modern day Heidelberg, Perkeo has become an unofficial mascot, traditionally mentioned in songs and festivals, and you can look for him being playfully referenced by institutions, hotels, restaurants and businesses in the region as you are shopping.



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
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DISCOVERING POIROT'S TRAIL

I grew up watching detective shows as a joint pastime with my mom, who could often figure out the whodunit before the episode's end as I sat back in wonder. Like Poirot, she would conquer my expectations of the plot as he would conquer the expectations of those around him as a boastful, diminutive foreigner. He laid out evidence that he had been meticulously collecting the whole time, often rooting out the killer and motivations surrounding heinous crimes. I found it interesting that he was transplanted from his homeland of Belgium and solved many cases in his adoptive England, and also around Europe and North Africa. He became an idealized world traveler to many readers, set on providing justice for many wrongs committed.

SPA, BELGIUM

There are two theories that Belgians and Christie fans have about where Poirot came from and one is the town of Spa in the Ardennes mountains, about 40 minutes from Liège. Spa's actual history lends credence as to why Poirot left Belgium, which was represented in the form of the German Army taking up headquarters in the town during World War I. Poirot shared that he left his homeland to escape the ravages of the Great War, but not without the silver-swan tipped cane that he was known to carry throughout his many cases.

As the name suggests, Spa is a place renowned for its "healing" mineral springs, and visitors aim to relax with recreational activities amongst nature. Today's town allows visitors to get lost in the woods at fun loca-



tions like SpaForest, an adventure park with treetop free falls, survival workshops, treasure hunting and mountain biking. Spa is part of the network of RAVeL hiking and biking trails that totals more than 900 miles (1,480 kilometers) of paved paths that never have more than a 2 percent gradient, perfect for kids and adults to traverse.

If you aim to release tension from a hike in the woods, the Thermes de Spa is located in the town center and has promoted aristocratic self-care since the 16th century. Spa has made the UNESCO World Heritage List as one of the top 11 European spa towns, and that sure sounds relaxing to me.

A 15 minute drive away from Spa, the Château de Franchimont still reigns over the landscape, despite being in ruins. The castle-side La Brasserie de Franchimont offers cozy interior or exterior seating to grab a local beer, and a nice meal like raspberry sauced duck with chive pureed potatoes. In other words, a perfect place to muse over this region's timeless beauty and what it must have been like to grow up here.

ELLEZELLES, BELGIUM

The town of Ellezelles also claims Poirot as a native of their town and has paid tribute to him with a relief sculpture of him, hands on his vest pockets as if reaching for his pocket watch or glasses. The town also proudly possesses his birth certificate, stating his parent's names on the document. Best of all, Poirot's birthday is declared to be April 1, 1850, or April Fools' Day. Even one of the best-known actors to portray Poirot, David Suchet, made sure to visit this Belgian town on a nostalgia trip.

There's plenty close by to round out your trip, including the town of Ath, which has the Gallo-Roman Museum containing 2,000-year-old shipwrecks with countless artifacts of ancient life. Afterward, be sure to take a tour of the Brasserie des Légendes, which brews an English-style stout called "Hercule" in honor of the mustachioed figure, who is emblazoned on the flip-top bottle. The zoo and botanical garden Pairi Daiza is also an 18-minute drive from Ath, and in a unique twist, allows guests to stay overnight beside the animal habitats. If you've ever thought, "I want to hang out with wolves, bears or penguins," here's your shot!




BRUSSELS, BELGIUM

A notable portion of Poirot's sleuthing career came from his experience as the Chief of Police in Brussels. If you have not yet walked through its Grand Place in front of the Gothic-style 15th century town hall, you should dedicate at least a day to wandering the streets of this vibrant city. The city is full of Art Nouveau architecture, museums and one of my favorites, the St. Michael and St. Gudula Cathedral. Be sure to sample and bring home a box of rich Belgian chocolate... as long as it is not poisoned like the one in the Poirot episode, "The Chocolate Box." This was the failed case that Poirot lamented to Arthur Hastings that he was never able to solve in his early days.

When Agatha Christie inevitably wrote her longest-lived character's end in the 1940s, she kept the manuscript in a safe for three decades until 1974. The beloved Poirot was the only fictional character at the time to be given an obituary in The New York Times. After Christie's 33 novels and 54 short stories sharing him with the world, the adventures of Poirot came to an end. His deeds now live on through the love of his character, both in Belgium and around the world.









The Manneken Pis, the famous little boy fountain, has several outfits themed for various holidays displayed in the nearby City Museum.




FIVE

There is no such thing as a "Belgian waffle" to a Belgian. The Liège waffle is the sugar-crusted one, and the Brussels waffle is the yeasty, powdered sugar, whipped cream or fruit-topped one. Either way, both are a must-try.



Brussels is a haven for urban artists. You can follow the Street Art Trail depicting a variety of art styles in countless murals.



The food scene features creamy chocolate and street fries drizzled with Andalouse sauce, but also make sure to feast on steaming fresh mussels, a specialty of the region for hundreds of years.

Lace & Tapestries

Centuries-old production in Bruges, Belgium has made it a hub for any type of intricate lace pattern or tapestry you could be on the hunt for. If you or someone you know has a flair for vintage lacey styles from different eras, 't Apostelientje is a perfect pitstop, or even just to get an idea of how long these intricate masterpieces take to construct. Mille Fleurs Tapestries is a 12-minute walk away and has both traditional wall tapestries (like an Alphonse Mucha one that I fell in love with). You can also find other quirky applications of this skill, including throw pillows with dressed-up animals in silly portraits. I can see them fitting right in with a cottage-core or maximalist aesthetic.

Comic Books & Memorabilia

Belgian urban areas boast at least one great comic shop, but Brussels shows its affinity for the art style with more than 50 comic strip murals throughout the city. Memorabilia and loads of comics abound at various shops and boutiques, including characters of Belgian origins, such as Tin Tin and his fox terrier, Snowy. Check out the Comics Art Museum in Brussels while you're there, so you can walk through the history of this long-lasting form of entertainment. In Ghent, the World's End Comic & Games has a large selection with titles in English, manga, a bar and a gaming area, so you can relax and dive into your newfound pages.

Chocolate

Crunchy pralines hail from Belgium, and the decadent truffles and ganache are truly divine. Belgian chocolate uses 100 percent cocoa butter and a higher percentage of cocoa is used in the confections, according to www.visitflanders.com, a website that covers what to see

and do in Northern Belgium (Flanders region). There's a Chocolate Museum in Bruges, where you can sign up for an adult or youth workshop and even make your own sweet treats! You, your family and friends will surely love that you either made or hand-picked a box of Neuhaus, Leonidas, Côte d'Or or Godiva chocolates right from their homeland. You're still safe if you've forgotten by the time you leave, because the Brussels Airport is where you can find the most Belgian chocolate sold in any single location.





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
