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


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






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

Germany's TRADITIONS

Get ready to sing "O Tannenbaum, o Tannenbaum, wie treu sind deine Blätter!" to get in the holiday spirit in Germany! From St. Nicholas Day all the way to Christmas Day, there are many reasons to look forward to the coming of Christ.

In Germany, St. Nicholas is based on the Catholic saint, St. Nicholas of Myra – a wealthy, benevolent saint who had a penchant for secretly leaving gifts, particularly under the cover of darkness. Born into a wealthy family on March 15, 270, Nicholas quickly developed a reputation for secret gift-gifting as well as a variety of miracles. He died Dec. 6, 343 A.D., hence the reason his feast day is observed on Dec. 6.

One legend tells the story of St. Nicholas secretly helping a man who had three daughters, but could not afford a proper dowry for them. With no dowry to offer a potential husband, the father feared for prospects of his daughters. Nicholas heard of the father's plight and secretly threw three bags of gold through the man's window. The story gave rise to the tradition of secret gift-giving under the cover of night.

In preparation for St. Nicholas, German children leave cleaned and polished boots and shoes near doors and windows on the evening of Dec. 5 and awake to find presents and goodies. To this day, along with other gifts and sweets, children will often find oranges in their shoes, as a nod to the bags of gold left by St. Nicholas so many years ago.

Dec. 6 is often the "big day" for presents and gift-giving in German culture, with a smaller celebration on Christmas Eve. Although St. Nicholas traditions may vary a bit in Germany by region, it's common for many villages to host a St. Nicholas Day parade, and many churches observe a St. Nicholas Day mass.

SPENDING TIME WITH FAMILY IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT, SO MANY TRAVEL ON THIS DAY AND MOST BUSINESSES ARE CLOSED.

Christmas Eve is dedicated to putting up the tree and attending mass. "Weihnachtsbäume," Christmas trees, are generally fir, spruce or pine and is decorated with tinsel, glass ornaments and a star or angel christening the top. Nativity scenes are placed below the tree. Gifts are opened and many people go to mass on Christmas Eve, traditionally at midnight, though earlier services are provided for families. Spending time with family is extremely important, so many travel on this day and most businesses are closed.

Christmas Day is a time for indulging in a feast with family. Eating traditional dishes like carp and potato salad or roasted goose stuffed with apples, chestnuts, onions or prunes brings families together at the dinner table. Both Dec. 25 and 26 are legal holidays and businesses are closed. Dec. 26 is a quieter day and time for peaceful contemplation of the presence of the Christ Child.

With so many opportunities, you can celebrate all month long! Share the story of St. Nicholas with your children, attend a Christmas Eve mass and spend some quality family time together eating a Christmas feast. Germany has some fabulous traditions we can all adopt!

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GERMANY DAY TRIP

Winter is a spectacular time for a day trip to Cochem. Spend the day basking in the romance of a magnificent medieval castle while meandering through the cobblestoned streets in this charming town in the Moselle River Valley of Germany.

A LITTLE HISTORY

Situated in the middle of the Riesling wine region, the town of Cochem is full of beauty and splendor during the winter months. The half-timbered buildings topped with slate roofs give a quintessential small town village vibe, while the narrow winding streets lead visitors to paths unknown. Even more drama is added to the landscape as snow blankets the town and a low, hovering fog creates an air of mysticism. Christmas decorations adorn the town, creating a festive ambiance as the tree in the town square sparkles with lights and ornaments. Above it all, the Reichsburg Cochem stands tall and proud.

This imperial castle, originally built around 1000, overlooks the town and river from its perch on a vine-covered hill. Though it was once a medieval structure of defense, it has since been renovated in the late 1860s to reflect the Neo-Gothic style. Visitors can awe at the many towers from the outside, or take a guided tour of the interior.

Castle tours in English from Nov. 5 - Jan. 6 are daily at 1:00 p.m. From Jan. 7- Feb. 16, tours are on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays at

2 p.m. Feb. 17 - Mar. 8 tours are daily at 2 p.m. During Advent, there is a special Christmas program where actors dress up as Mary and Joseph and search for shelter. The archangel announces the birth of Jesus to the world, accompanied by the sound of trumpets. If you just can't get enough Christmas magic, head to the Christmas market in the town, where the Glühwein grapes are locally grown, brewed and of the highest quality.

SERIOUS LEISURE TIME

While strolling through the town during winter, revel in the chilly air while you look for unique details like a merman on the side of a building or a knight carved out of wood holding a restaurant menu. If you're tired of being out in the cold, head to Family Winery Rademacher for a wine tasting and cellar tour. The winemaker will share his knowledge on the craft of creating delicious white wines. Various options are available, but the standard wine tasting lasts just over two hours and is 12.60 euros to taste six wines.

If the family is in tow, head to Moselbad, an indoor water park that is great for both adults and children. Kids will love playing in an area

with a waterslide, indoor wave pool and adventure pool. Adults can escape to two dry saunas, a steam sauna or the "samarium," a hot steam bath, for some peace and quiet. There is also a cozy log fire burning that invites visitors to grab a cocktail and stay a while.

GETTING THERE

Cochem is approximately two hours northwest of Kaiserslautern and an hour and a half west of Wiesbaden. Visit for the day or spend the weekend exploring the wine region.

From an ancient medieval castle to a modern waterpark, Cochem is not to be missed when planning your winter travel itinerary. Wander through the Christmas market stalls or stroll by the river. No matter what you decide to do, you'll always have special memories of time well spent in Cochem.

FAIRYTALE CHRISTMAS MARKET, KASSEL

Inspired by the Brothers Grimm, this fairytale market will focus on "Little Red Riding Hood" from Nov. 25 - Dec. 30. Throughout the market you'll find odes to the story added to the traditional holiday decorations. Children will love the Heaven Workshop, where they can tinker, paint and craft to their heart's desire. Wander through Königs, Friedrichs and Opernplatz at a market that has been celebrated since 1767! On Thursdays at 6 p.m. take a guided tour of the market and the former royal residence. A hot drink is included in the tour price of 11 euros. Admission to the market is free and is open daily from 11 a.m. - 8 p.m. The food stands are open until 10 p.m. Closed Dec. 24-26.



WINTER WORLD, BERLIN

Visit the Potsdamer Platz from Nov. 1 - Jan. 5, to experience Berlin's largest winter sports center with Europe's largest mobile toboggan run, ice skating rink and curling. The toboggan run is 230 feet long and 39 feet high, while the ice skating rink is over 5,000 square feet. This is a great area for kids who want to take free skating lessons on Saturdays or Sundays. Open 10 a.m. - 10 p.m. daily, Christmas Eve until 2 p.m. Admission and ice rink use are free, toboggan run is 1.50 euros.

BOGENHAUSER CHRISTMAS MAGIC FOREST. MUNICH

The area of Cosimabad is transformed into a magical Christmas forest from Nov. 22 - Jan. 6. Here you'll find unique jewelry, wooden figures, ceramics and handcrafted lamps amongst brightly-lit pagodas. Don't miss visiting one of the larger tents for the integrated Glühwein Festival that offers 25 different mulled wines, varying from alcohol-free to organic. Open Monday - Thursday from 3 p.m. - 9 p.m., Friday 3 p.m. - 10 p.m., Saturday 12 p.m. - 10 p.m., Sunday 12 p.m. - 9 p.m. Holiday hours vary. Admission is free.



CHRISTMAS MARKET, BERCHTESGADEN

Situated in the Bavarian Alps is a charming village that's enough to draw visitors in. Add some holiday cheer and you're in for a truly magical time while you take in the views of the snow-covered mountains and browse through Christmas decorations. Here you'll find original Berchtesgaden Christmas tree decorations crafted in the spirit of centuries-old, folk-art traditions. Check out a performance by the local brass ensemble in front of the royal castle or view the live nativity scene. Go for a horse-drawn carriage ride or just listen to merry carolers singing songs of joy and peace. Open Nov. 28 - Dec. 31. Open daily until Dec. 23 from 12 - 8 p.m., on Dec. 26 from 12 - 6 p.m., Dec. 24 and 31 from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. Closed Dec. 3, 4, 10, 11 and 25. Admission is free.

NEW YEAR'S MARKET, SPEYER

Located in front of the Alten Münze (Old Mint) on Maximilianstrasse, this quaint New Year's Market basks in the glory of the imperial cathedral Kaiserdom. From Jan. 1-6, you can browse festively decorated wooden stalls hosted by eight towns, watch artists and craftsmen at work and shop until you find the perfect trinket. Behind the stalls are beautiful pastel-colored gabled houses, cafes and boutiques. Feast on roasted almonds, bratwurst, gingerbread cookies and mulled wine. Admission is free. If you've got extra time, stroll along the Rhine River or visit the cathedral, which is the oldest of three remaining Romanesque cathedrals in Germany. If you want to get out of the cold, find a wine tavern and enjoy some regional specialties.

If you plan on visiting during New Year's, the market is open on New Year's Eve from 11 a.m. - 3 p.m. and New Year's Day from 1 - 9 p.m.





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Winter Wonders of SWITZERLAND By Jessica Zen





Switzerland has something for everyone. Plan your winter getaway

to some of the best resort towns the country has to offer.



The charming Swiss village of Grindelwald is located at the base of the north face of the Eiger Mountain. Grindelwald's quaint shops, numerous restaurants, and abundance of winter activities make it a perfect location to explore the wonders of Switzerland. Enjoy the surrounding mountainous views while you ski, hike or simply relax in the village.

A part of the Jungfrau region, one of Europe's most popular skiing destinations, Grindelwald is directly linked to the Wengen ski area and offers 132 miles of ski terrain with over 50 ski runs and 20 chairlifts. Skiing enthusiasts of all ages and skill levels will appreciate the vast array of ski runs in the Bernese Alps. Families often find Grindelwald a prime location for children to learn to ski. The Bodmi slopes are gentler for beginners and the ski school can be easily accessed from the base village. While the beginners enjoy the tamer slopes, intermediate skiers can be assured that there is something for them as well. The majority of runs are red and blue. Though experts may find that there aren't many black runs, they will find plenty of-run and glacier skiing.

Skiing isn't the only draw to Grindelwald in the winter. For those who prefer not to be strapped into ski boots but still want some fresh air, dazzle your senses with a hike on the First-Waldspitz-Bort trails. This series of mountain trails feature simultaneous views of snow-covered huts, forests, and valleys, all while the cliffs of the Wetterhorn and Eiger dominate the backdrop. The hike takes approximately two and a half hours, but don't worry about getting hungry. The mountain restaurant Waldspitz is just waiting for you to refuel on the patio while delighting in the lake scenery. Don't miss the First Cliff Walk, a lookout platform for thrill seekers that hovers 147 feet above the valley, offering a marvelous view of the Eiger.

If you are seeking a winter getaway that doesn't include traipsing through the snow looking for an adrenaline rush, consider relaxing at Belvedere. This four-star hotel is home to a spa and wellness center that will melt away all your problems. The spa area has a swimming pool, whirlpool, salt water jacuzzi, Finnish sauna, glacier steam bath, heat mine gallery, and much more. In addition to the pools and saunas, the spa offers massages for a total relaxation experience. Finish up with a facial and feel fresh as a spring daisy, despite the cold weather.

ZERMATT

Surrounded by the peaks of the Pennine Alps, including the famous Monte Rosa and Matterhorn, Zermatt also offers a plethora of activities. Though the small town only boasts three main streets, Zermatt has numerous cross-streets filled with restaurants and hotels just waiting for tourists to come knocking on their doors. It takes a mere 30 minutes to walk across this remarkable town, which is convenient, as only a very few battery powered cars are allowed. However, electric shuttles are available.

To begin your Zermatt adventure, hop on the world's first fully electrified cog railway, the Gornergrat Bahn. It is Europe's highest open-air cog railway and transports passengers from Zermatt station to the summit of Gornergrat. After a scenic 30 minute ride to the top, be prepared for a photo opportunity of a lifetime. The panoramic view showcases Monte Rosa, Switzerland's highest peak, Gorn Glacier, and the Matterhorn.

If you don't want the experience to end, consider staying at the 3100 Kulmhotel Gornergrat, where you will find a restaurant, astronomical observatory, chapel and shops.

From the top of the Gornergrat there is access to multiple hiking trails. Strap some snowshoes on your feet and explore Challenge Trail. This leisurely trail is close to the railway and descends about 985 feet, for a pleasant hour-long hike. Exceptional views of the railway and the snow-covered landscape are guaranteed.

After all that fresh air and exercise, pamper yourself with some serious down time at one of the many local spas. Hotel Eden Wellness has an indoor pool and spa to ease the most tense of muscles. Book an appointment in the evening for a massage, holistic therapy, gemstone therapy and much more to wrap up a successful winter day.

ST. MORITZ

Nestled in the Engadin valley, the glamorous village of St. Moritz has earned international fame for hosting the Winter Olympics not once, but twice. Lake St. Moritz adds even more village appeal with its White Turf horse races, snow polo, and ice cricket tournaments. Throw in some devilish ski runs, après ski clubs, and a bobsled run for the perfect combination of winter activities. This swanky village resort area has something for everyone.

For a skiing experience you won't soon forget, check out Diavolezza. Legend has it that once upon a time a lovely, redhaired she-devil lived on this mountain. If the legend is true, she certainly left some particularly hellish runs for the more experienced skiiers. The runs on Diavolezza include over 13 miles of red and six miles of black. This snow-covered behemoth is not for the faint of heart!

For some aprés-ski activities, consider going to the Alpina hut on Corviglia Mountain. This rustic hut sits on a large rock overlooking the town and the lovely Engadin valley. Relax with a drink from the snow bar outside while you soak up some rays on the sun terrace. If you are craving more than just a drink, the hut restaurant serves local specialties and traditional home-style Swiss dishes.

A trip to Switzerland just isn't complete without trying traditional cheese fondue and an Engadine walnut tart. Reserve a table at Restaurant Engiadina for a truly spectacular taste of local cuisine. Their menu offers a variety of cheese fondues, along with other traditional favorites. After enjoying the fondue, finish off the night with dessert at Confectionary Hanselmann. Here you can find the famous Engadine walnut tart, a local favorite that confectioners have been perfecting for years. Filled with crème, caramel and walnuts, this sweet treat is sure to leave you feeling satisfied.

Switzerland has so much to offer during the winter months, from skiing to relaxing at the spa, there are enough activities to keep everyone entertained for days. Spend some time exploring where Swiss watches, army knives, chocolate, banks and yodeling originated. You'll return from your trip invigorated from all the fun you had flying down the slopes and over-indulging in delicious food. Why wait? 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
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European Getaways

Off-the-Beaten Path

Home to iconic sights and landmarks, living and traveling in Europe is a dream. The lovely canals of Amsterdam, the remarkable works of the Sistine Chapel in Rome, the Acropolis in Greece – the list goes on and on. You've probably got a few of these postcard-worthy spots on your bucket list, but so does almost everyone else. If alpine villages, snow-capped jagged peaks and serene lakes sound appealing, discover these three off-the-beaten path destinations.



GRINDELWALD, SWITZERLAND _____

Enveloped by impressive mountains and sheer limestone cliffs in the Bernese Swiss Alps is the charming village of Grindel-wald. Tucked at the base of Eiger Mountain, this village is a prime location for adrenaline junkies all year long. In the winter, visitors can whizz down pristine slopes on one of the 12 surrounding mountains. Grindelwald also hosts the International Snow Festival in January, complete with intricate ice and snow sculptures. During the summer, take a journey back in time on the Jungfraubahn. The train travels a steep 9 kilometers from the base of the mountain to the highest railway station in Europe. Once at the top, head to the Sphinx Terrace and drink in the stunning vistas from the viewing platforms. If you're craving a little winter sports action, pop over to Snow Fun Park, where visitors can enjoy sledding, skiing and snow-boarding in the middle of the summer.

LINZ, AUSTRIA

The third-largest city in Austria rests along the Danube almost exactly halfway between more well-known cities such as Vienna and Salzburg. Once home to Mozart, this enchanting city is full of cobblestone streets, imposing cathedrals and plenty of museums. Named a UNESCO Creative City, Linz also has an incredible up and coming arts scene. The Ars Electronica Museum is home to innovative and futuristic technology. Visitors are encouraged to explore the hands-on, interactive exhibits. Or if you'd rather discover the city, take a ride on the Pöstlingbergbahn — an old cog wheel railway which takes riders to the top

of Pöstlingberg. Experience breathtaking views and sweeping panoramas of the city and the countryside below.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, GERMANY _____

A little closer to home for those stationed in Germany, the lake-side hamlet of Friedrichshafen on the shores of beautiful Lake Constance is a worthy contender. For aviation buffs, significant German aviation history was made in this industrious city. Ferdinand von Zeppelin established his factory for making the gigantic namesake steel airships. Today, the Zeppelin Museum houses a replica of the infamous Hindenburg which visitors can walk through. If younger kids get a little restless, take a small 20-minute drive northeast to Ravensburger Spieleland. This amusement park has plenty of rides and attractions to expend their energy. Need a slower pace? Stroll along the Uferpromenade Friedrichshafen. Gaze across the water (yes, you're looking at Switzerland over there) and enjoy local delicacies as the sunsets.

Living in Europe affords the opportunity of a lifetime with travel. You can conquer the bustling halls of Parliament and Big Ben in London, view Paris from atop the Eiffel Tower and witness singing gondoliers in Venice. However, you can skip the lines and crowds and head to more magical, yet slightly more obscure destinations. You never know what treasures you'll find when you travel off-the-beaten path.

Switzerland, the land of picturesque villages, outdoor adventures and various forms of tasty cheese is a must-visit for many people. Whether you're on an epic road trip or an express bus tour going through the country, it would be a shame to miss the scenic village of Grindelwald!

WHAT TO DO

Travel to the top! Spend most of your time on Grindelwald's First, a small summit on the slopes of the Schwarzhorn, a mountain part of the Bernese Alps. There's an abundance of activities for everyone to enjoy. However, with only 24 hours to spend a top this summit, choose from this definitive list of great activities in Grindelwald:

Hike to Lake Bachalpsee

The iconic Lake Bachalpsee is a less than one hour hike from the cable car station atop the summit. Follow the signs towards Bachalpsee to reach this secluded natural masterpiece.

First Cliff Walk

The famous lookout platform protrudes 45 meters from the First summit, giving travelers a breathtaking view full of the beautiful alpine forest and sparkling waterfall below them. Travelers must walk on a bridge

placed along the cliff side of the summit.

First Flyer

Soar through the clouds on Grindelwald First Flyer, the exhilarating zipline. Don't worry, riders are safely harnessed, so even those afraid of heights should give it a try. The adrenaline rush will kick in after the initial launch!

First Mountain Cart

What do you get when you combine a sled and go-kart? A mountain cart! Zip down the mountain for a thrilling experience. The First Mountain Cart attraction is suitable for children up to a little over 4-feet tall.

Toboggan Run

If you have the time, head back down from the First summit and head towards the Pfingstegg station to hop on a chairlift to reach the start of a toboggan run, which is 736 meters long and has you riding down 58 meters the mountain at speeds of 40 kilometers. The run goes in a loop meaning you can ride it as many times as you want!

Driving to Switzerland: Purchase a vignette.

Currency: Swiss francs (CHF). Euros may be accepted at various places.

ATMs: Train station and any bank.

Perfect souvenir: Swiss knife, swiss watches, cowbell trinkets.

Acrobats, trapeze artists, clowns, tigers, dogs and ponies are amongst the performers set to dazzle audiences in a heated tent set up at the Gibber Kerb.



CHRISTMAS MAGIC

Dec. 25 - 30 in Triberg

An icy waterfall illuminated by thousands of glittering lights is the centrepiece of this spectacle made up of concerts, shows and dazzling fireworks displays.



NEW YEAR'S RUN

Dec. 31 in Trier

This Brazilian-inspired running event set to the sounds of samba drums attracts Germany's top athletes and amateurs alike. Men run 8 km, the ladies 5 km.



CRAFT BEER FESTIVAL

Jan. 10-11 in Karlsruhe

Sip and sample the innovative and tasty creations of some two dozen of Germany's most creative brewers, ideally accompanied by the hot and tasty street food available on site. Bottled beers to enjoy back home are also on sale. Tickets go for 8 euros.

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
